The first showing and public auction of these medallions will be held immediately following the barbecue in the City Park in Silverton on August 7. This will be a memorable occasion because it is the beginning of the three-day Briscoe County birthday celebration.

Artist of the winning design Ricky Hutsell of Silverton, will be introduced as he receives the first set of coins to come from the mint. The auctioning of the next sets of four coins will be directed by Bennie Reagan of Silverton. This is a limited edition of medallions and no further orders will be placed when these are sold.

The sets will be numbered and the sets with the lowest numbers will be very valuable. The Survey Committee wants everyone to have a chance to bid on these sets of four coins—one of bronze, one of antique silver, one silver, and one gold plate, all encased in plastic.

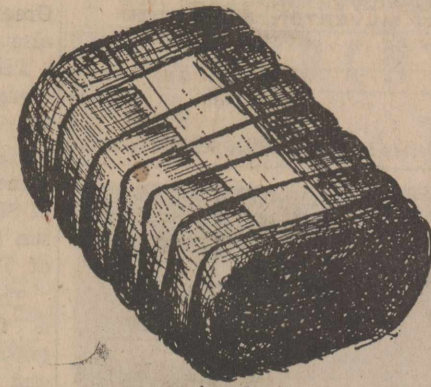

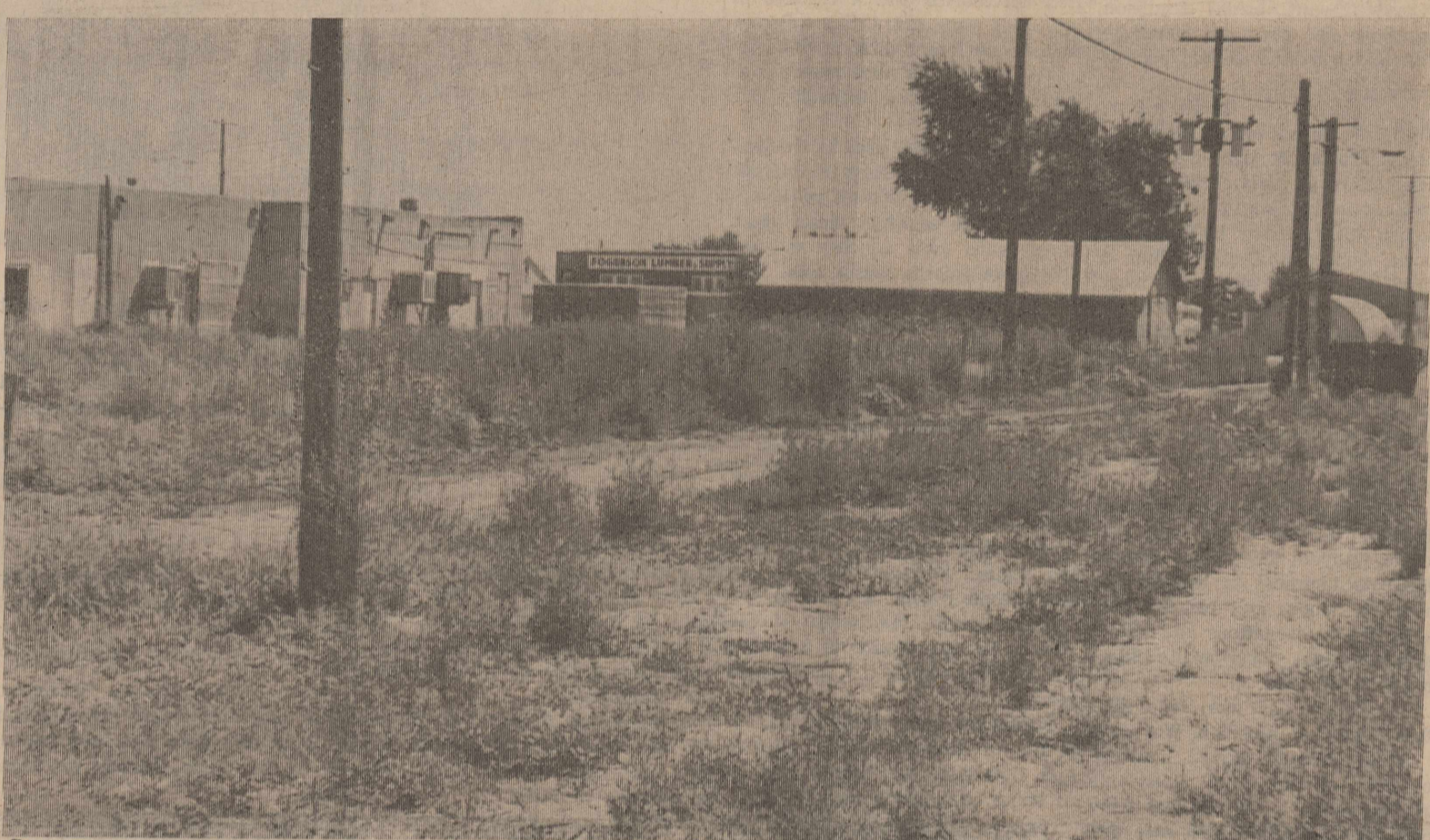

Briscoe County Birthday To Be Celebrated August 7-8-9



The annual Silverton Young Farmer Rodeo and Briscoe County Birthday Celebration will take place this year August 7-8-9 in Silverton. Activities will begin with a western parade at 4:00 p.m. August 7. Harvey McJimsey is the parade marshal.

There will be parade divisions for the best floats and riding clubs, and a section of the parade will again be devoted to the kids bicycle contest. The bicycle parade will form south of the hotel, just off Main Street, at 3:45 p.m. but each rider must go by the office of the Briscoe County News prior to the contest to pick up a parade identification number for the benefit of the judges who may not know all the participants by name. Prizes in the kids parade will be \$10.00, \$5.00 and \$2.50.

A free barbecue will be served at the City Park following the parade. During the barbecue, the Silverton Lions Club is sponsoring the Briscoe County Championship fiddling contest, with prizes of \$75.00, \$50.00 and \$25.00 for the winners.

Following the barbecue, Ricky Hutsell will be presented as the winning artist of the County's Commemorative Medallion, the coins will be shown for the first time, and the first numbered sets will be auctioned under the direction of Bennie Reagan, auctioneer. The Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee will be selling other commemorative medallions and souvenirs at the Plainview Production Credit Association community room after the auction.

Rodeo performances will be held each night beginning at 8:00 p.m. The first 30 contestants per event will be accepted for Tie Down Calf Roping, Heading and Heeling, Ladies Barrel Race, Bareback Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Kids Break-Away Roping, Bull Dogging and Saddle Bronc Riding. A Calf Scramble will be held during each performance, and an added attraction will be the Merchants Wild Cow Milking Contest. Stock will be furnished by Martin Rodeo Company of Spearman, and admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

Fred Strange is the rodeo secretary, and may be contacted at 806-823-2011. Rodeo books open at 12:00 noon August 5 and close at 12:00 noon August 7. Entrants must be 18 years old or have parents' release.

A team roping will begin at 1:00 p.m. Sunday, August 10.

Dances will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at the concrete slab, with music by Silverton's own REVUE.

A Rodeo Queen will be presented on Saturday night. This year's candidates are Cindy Walker, Suzette Fitzgerald, Debra Roehr, Twila Wood, Liz Brown and Arlene Lavy. The girls are assisting the Silverton Young Farmers by selling rodeo tickets, and will appreciate your courtesy when they call on you. The girl who sells the most tickets will be declared the Rodeo Queen, and will receive a cash award.

4-H Record Book Winners Listed

Twelve 4-H'ers from Briscoe County will put their years of experience and hard work together in one neat package for district senior record book competition Monday, August 4.

Only the best of each of the 41 program entries will be selected to represent District 2 in state competition next month, according to County Extension Agent Eddie Holland.

The record books will be forwarded to Texas A&M University to compete at the state level against the best books from 12 other districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Compiling their years of work into a binder complete with clippings, photos and records of achievements, the senior 4-H'ers are competing for scholarships, plaques, government bonds, a trip to the National 4-H Congress in November, and other awards.

Also to be judged during the event are junior record books. Blue, red and white ribbons are to be awarded for these entries.

"Record book competition is the critical measurement of achievements of these youths over the years," says Holland. Records reveal their consistency in achieving

goals, their experience in 4-H projects and activities, their experiences in leadership development, and their growth and development in personal, community and civic responsibilities.

The 4-H program in Texas is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Emergency Medical System To Aid Doctor - Short Areas

A heart attack or accident victim who is stricken while in isolated areas of the Panhandle usually finds himself at the mercy of inadequate emergency medical services.

Vast distances, weak links in communications, a lack of emergency equipment in vehicles and a shortage of emergency medical personnel combine to make rural areas of the Panhandle inconvenient places to fall ill.

A number of the sparsely populated counties are without doctors, nurses or hospitals.

Hope for a remedy to the situation lies in the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) system which is being developed by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Still in the organizational stages, the HEW-funded system will provide region-wide emergency transportation, trained medical technicians, emergency equipment and a radio communications network for the entire Panhandle area.

PRPC spokesmen estimate the system will be operative in varying degrees in from three to 18 months, pending the purchase and installation of equipment and training of personnel.

Both Silverton and Quitaque are participating in this program from Briscoe County, Silverton's Ambulance Service having requested the communications equipment, and the Quitaque Ambulance Service striving for a new ambulance.

The communications equipment needed for the Silverton ambulance, which will keep it in touch with hospital emergency room doctors during the entire run, will cost approximately \$6,000 which is to be shared 75% by the HEW grant and 25% by the local community.

Silverton Ambulance Service's part of this cost will be about \$1,800. Efforts will begin to raise this amount soon, and in the meantime, local residents are reminded of and encouraged to continue their memorial donations to the Silverton Ambulance Service. Memorials can be made to David Tipton at the First State Bank or to Charles Sarchet at the Briscoe County News. They can be in any amount, and an engraved acknowledgment of your memorial contribution is acknowledged to the family involved.

"In Texas during the past year, 50% of the people who died from health-related conditions never reached the hospital," said Betty O'Rourke, EMS director. "Doctors in California report that since their emergency medical service system has been in operation, 85% of those who would have died at the scene or on the way to the hospital are being saved."

The system will be made up of 82 member cities, counties, and hospital districts. HEW has contributed more than \$318,000 to be matched by local money. Because of a sliced budget, some facets of the system will be postponed until continuation funds are available next year.

How will EMS work? "To be effective," Mrs. O'Rourke said, "We must have a coordinated system with the capability of delivering the accident or stroke victim to the right place and at the right time with proper treatment by trained professionals. The result should be the elimination of needless deaths and disabling injuries."

"The backbone of EMS will be a communications system capable of coordinating emergency resources in allowing voice linkage between ambulance attendants and hospitals, emergency vehicles, the Amarillo Receiving Center and public safety agencies," she said.
