

WHAT'S THE NAME? We don't really know just how the article that has appeared in so many publications about the SARCHET name got started, but we do know that we didn't really meet at a family reunion last summer and vote to change the pronunciation of our name. It is a name that has been changed-in spelling and in pronunciation -down through the years, and I know that this same thing has also happened to other family names.

The Sarchet family originally came to settle in Ohio from Guernsey Island, which is located off the coast of France. The famiy history says that the name was originally spelled SOUCHET, but it doesn't tell us how it was pronounced when it was spelled that way. Being a French name, it is presumed that it was called SOU-SHAY.

Later, and for reasons that none of us know, the spelling was changed to SARCHET, and was called SAR-SHAY. Later, for still unknown reasons, it came to be called SAR-CHET. Now, since all of the family that still lives in Ohio, and Pennsylvania calls the name SAR-SHAY, most all of Charles' brothers and nephews have gone back to this pronunciation. It seems that it is easier for most people to understand.

Many people call the name SAR-GENT, and it has come to the point where our family answers to almost anything.

No one could ever remember which father belonged to which girl (not related), and I answered to Betty Ann, Betty Jane, Mary Ann, Mary Jane, Mary, Ann, Mary Sue, Susie Q and even Hey You!
