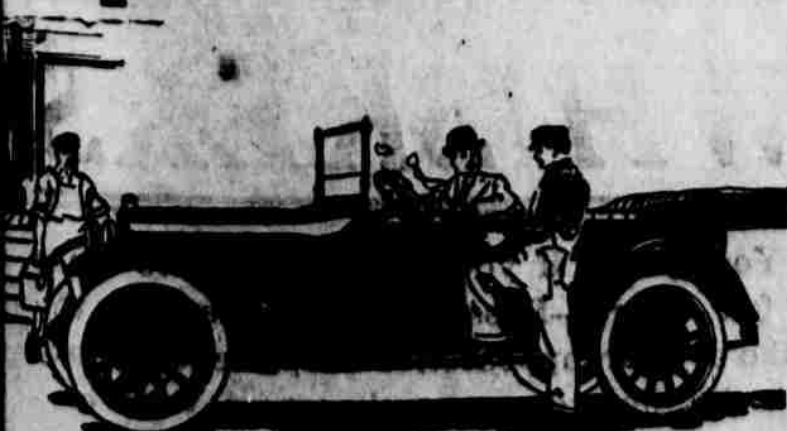

5. Produce meat for the family by increased attention to poultry and hogs. Plan to gradually increase and breed up the cattle and other livestock so as to consume the otherwise waste products and make the waste lands productive.

6. When the living has been provided, grow cotton for the main money crops. If this done there will always be a few eggs and chickens, a pig now and then, and occasionally a steer for sale.

**Motor Rural Carrier Examination**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Haskell, to be held at Stamford on March 11, 1916 to fill the position of motor rural carriers at Haskell and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from post offices in the above-mentioned county. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory supplied with mail by a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Forms 2121 and 1977. Form 2121 may be seen posted at any post office in the county for which the examination is held, and Form 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices at which the vacancy exists and where the examination is to be held, or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. The appointee to this position will be required to furnish, maintain, and operate a modern motor vehicle with a carrying capacity of not less than 800 pounds and a cubic capacity of not less than 80 feet. Applicants must file with their applications a statement of the equipment they will be able to provide in the event of appointment. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

## City Council Meets Wednesday

The City Council met in regular session this week with Mayor Cahill presiding and all the Councilmen present. Quite a lot of new business was transacted at the meeting among which the city entered into contract for five hundred more feet of new hose to be used on the New Motor Truck when it comes.

The Arson Ordinance was passed in which the city offers a \$100 reward for the arrest and conviction of any one guilty of arson within the corporate limits of the city of Haskell. The passage of this ordinance will give the city a reduction of 2 cents in their key rate. With this reduction and the four cents reduction that the city will get when the fire truck is installed will be a nice saving to people of Haskell that carry fire insurance.

It was decided by the City Council to replace the four inch mains on the south and west side of the square with eight inch mains, with the eight inch main around the square the city will be entitled to another reduction of their key rate of six cents.

The city secretary and treasurer was also instructed to pay off the \$2000 of city bonds. These bonds are not due for twenty years but the city has the money in the sinking fund and by paying them off now it will be a saving to the city in interest. The city paid off \$3500 of their bonds two years ago.

The city finances were checked up and found to be in good shape, with money ahead in all the funds except the general one. The city council is to be commended on the way they have handled the city affairs and it looks now like it won't be long until the city will be out of debt and on a cash basis.

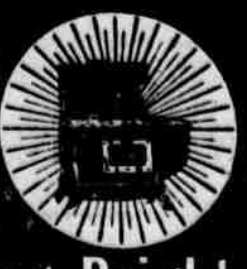
