I live close to the ambulance service and I am proud of it, too. To me, there were a couple of miracles involved with the ambulance service and Doug Ellis.

The men who make up the volunteer ambulance service have a strong desire to serve their fellow man, and at whatever time a person is in need of an ambulance, there is an opportunity for service. The night of the wreck, New Year's morning, to be exact, was the first time the ambulance attendants had had occasion to use a particular piece of their equipment known to them as "the scoop." It was not a piece of equipment "that just came with the ambulance"; it was something they had been trained to use in their first-aid courses and had purchased to have when needed.

The volunteer ambulance attendants were alerted to the need for "the scoop" when they checked the young man's symptoms and discovered that he had no feeling in his legs. "The scoop" is a hinged carrier that is inserted under one side of the body at a time and fastened, so that the body doesn't have to be picked up off the ground to be placed on it. The volunteer ambulance attendants know now that if they had tried to pick him up with their hands they might have killed this fine young man.

So I consider that it was a miracle that this piece of equipment was available and that the men who had never used it knew how to use it correctly. "The scoop" cost the ambulance service \$195, and its being available for use this one time cannot be compared to the value of a single human life.

Some people know how many hours the people who respond to these ambulance calls spend away from their homes and businesses, but most do not. It was more than four hours for four men New Year's Day. Sometimes routine trips to the nearest hospitals with no transfers to other hospitals take several hours, because hospital personnel won't have an ambulance case moved off the stretcher into their facility until a doctor tells them what to do, and it isn't uncommon for the attendants to have to wait quite a while for the doctor to arrive. And keeping up with their pillows and sheets and blankets when they are whisked away with the patient is something else, too.

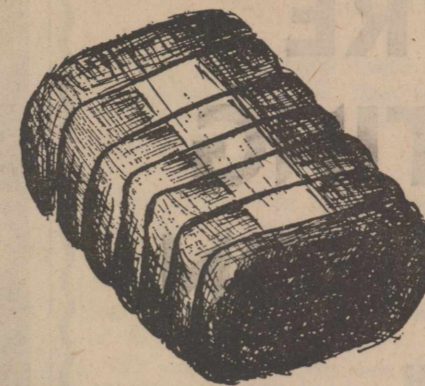
In addition to the time spent on actual calls, the ambulance volunteers also spend quite a few hours in class, studying how to identify illnesses and injuries and what first-aid to use in each case.

Last week several of the ambulance attendants drove to Dimmitt to make up a class they had missed when the Red Cross first-aid school was held here.

The ambulance volunteers who completed the Standard First-Aid and Personal Safety course of instruction and the special class in cardio-pulmonary resuscitation are Archie Ray Martin, W. D. Rowell, Jerry Patton, David Tipton, Roy Younger, Jay Towse, Charles Sarchet, Charlie Parker, Jerry Miller, Mabry Greenhaw, Stanley Fogerson and Emmett Tomlin. These aren't all of the volunteer ambulance attendants, but are the ones I know of who completed the most recent 21-hour first-aid course.

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County to Get State Park

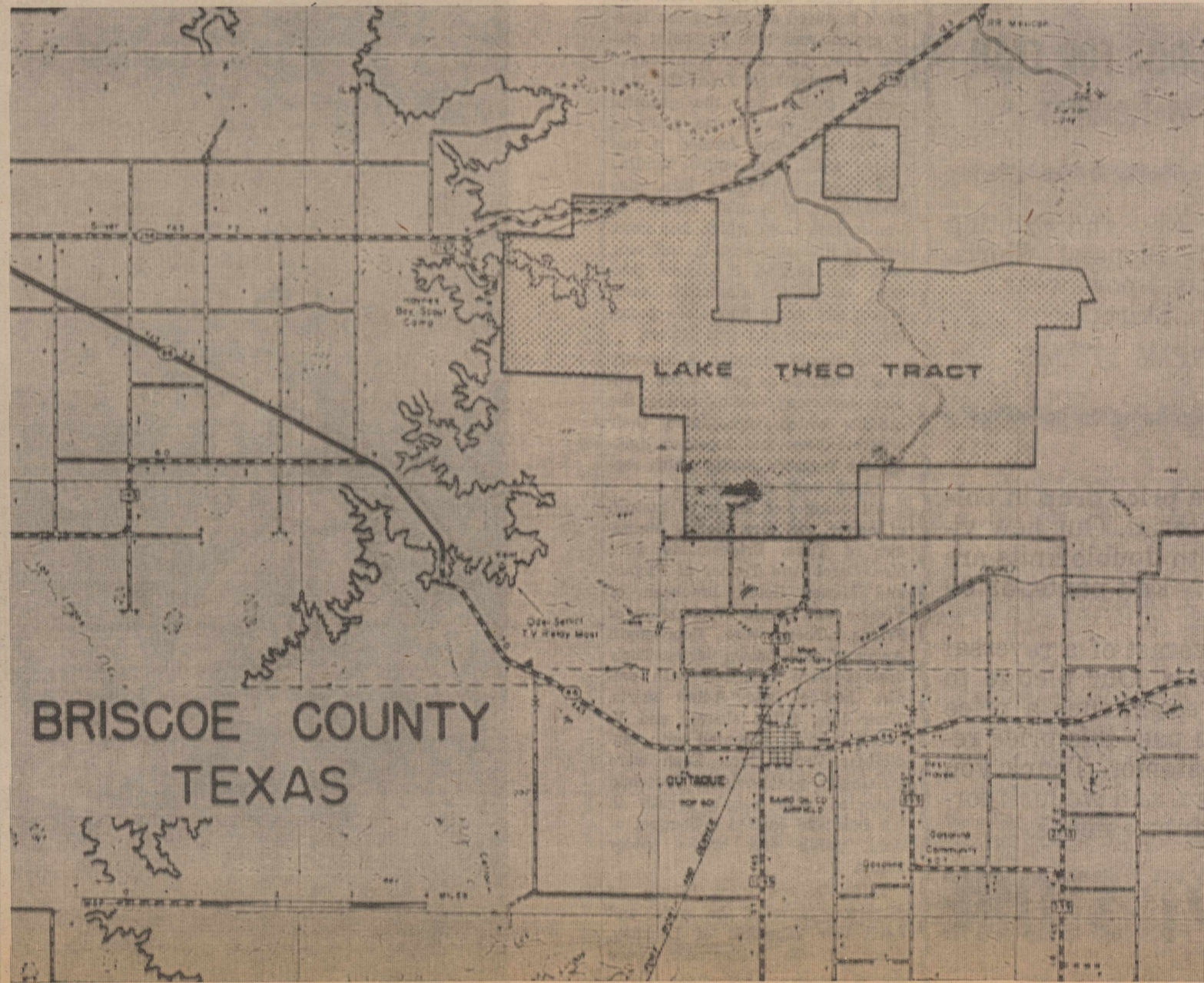
The creation of a new state park in Briscoe County of the Texas Panhandle has been announced jointly by Congressman Jack High-tower of Vernon, State Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, and Representative Phil Cates of Pampa. Located approximately 95 miles from both Lubbock and Amarillo, the site will be known as Lake Theo State Park.

Instrumental in acquiring designation of the site as a state park was former Senator Jack High-tower who is now serving his first term in Congress.

The state legislative delegation from the area expressed pleasure with the creation of the park. Senator Ray Farabee stated that he felt the park would be "a tremendous asset" to the area. Representative Phil Cates noted that the park would provide "an economic boost" to the surrounding area while preserving some of the "rugged beauty of the caprock."

The park, more properly known as the Geisler Ranch, is accessible via FM 1065 and a county road north of uitaque. The park contains in excess of 13,500 acres including two scenic caprock canyons, several thousand acres of roughland below the escarpment, the 130 acre Lake Theo impoundment, and several smaller lakes and tanks. The scenic features of the Lake Theo site are somewhat similar to Palo Duro Canyon, but enhanced by the existence of a small fishing lake and the potential for creating other water features.

The new Lake Theo State Park is shown in the shaded area on this map.

If you have voted one time in the past three years, you are still qualified (registered) to vote. If not, you will need to re-register by March 1, 1975, in order to be able to vote.

Each time you vote, you renew your registration for another three years; but if you have not voted and want to protect your right to vote, you should contact the Tax Assessor's office now.

Changes Must Be Reported in Ten Days

Michael Stoner of Floydada, Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division, has requested that drivers be made aware of a law that has been on the books a long time, but which will be enforced in the future.

The law states that anytime you change your name or address, within 10 days of such change you must report this to the Drivers License Division of the Department of Public Safety. Failure to do this may result in a fine up to \$200.00.

All you have to do to change your name or address is to pick up a duplicate license application at the Drivers License Office. The cost for this service is \$1.00.

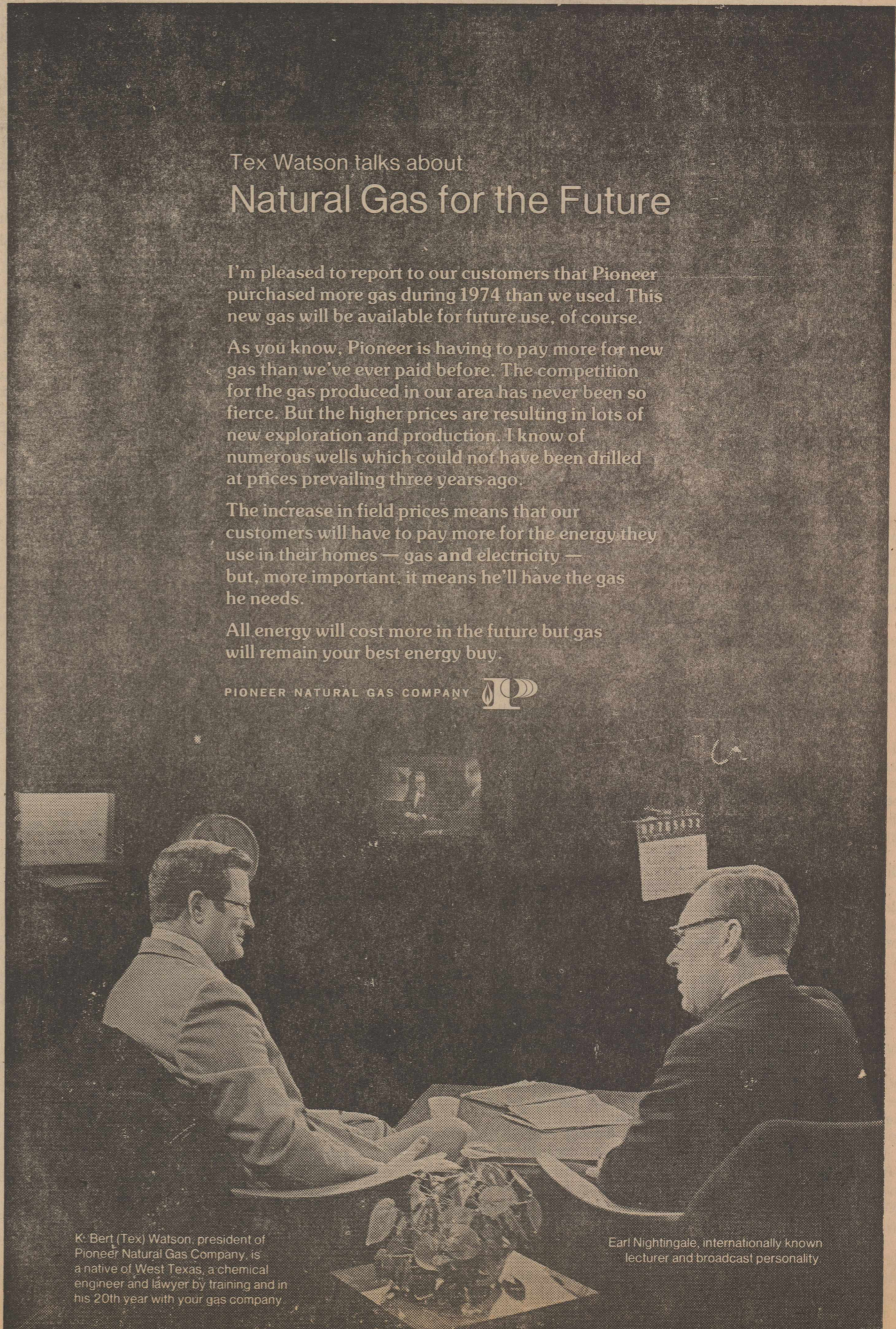

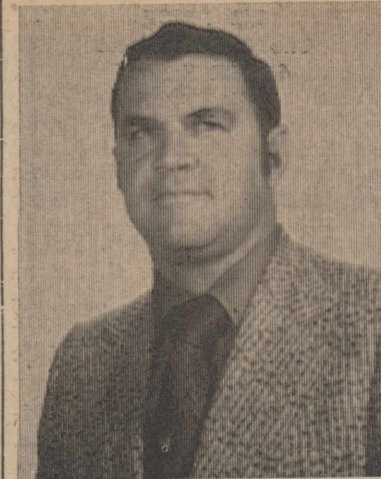

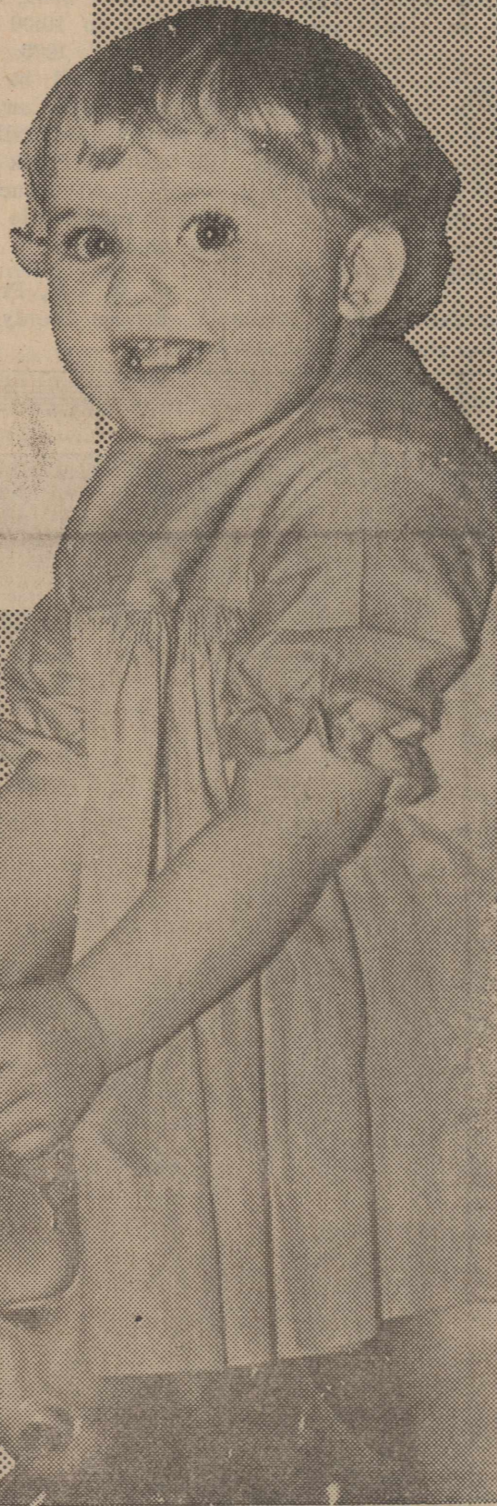
Take a Second Look

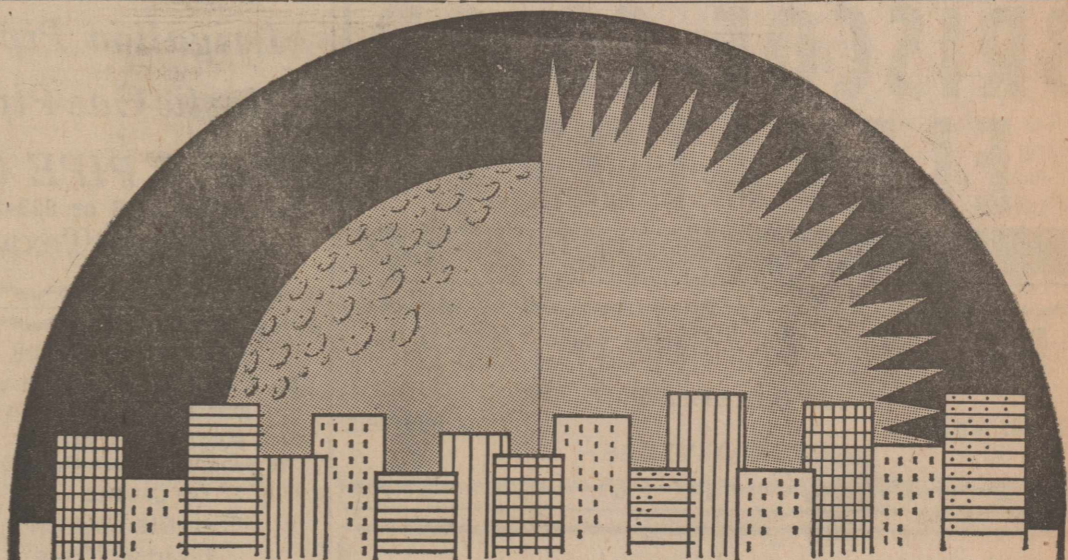

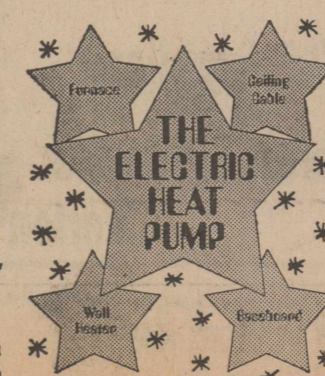

"Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee." Jeremiah 31:3.

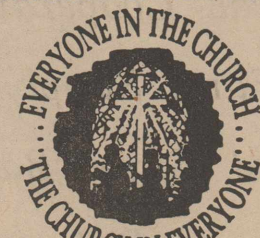
"For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."
