## **Mackenzie Lake Lots** To Be Ready Soon

Lots at Mackenzie Lake will be platted and ready for lease sometime in April or May, according to Lon Davis of Floydada, president of the Mackenzie Water Authority board.

He said the lots would be around 25,000 square feet and larger than the ones at White River Lake. He said the lease per lot per year cost would be similar to that charged at White River.

Davis also stated that Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has built a new \$20,000 boat ramp on the south side of the lake near the dam, at no charge to the water authority. The all-weather road across the dam has been completed and the lake is about 40 feet deep and stocked with fish; however, no one is admitted to the lake area without special permission.

"REA is cooperating with our overall development plan by keeping electric poles to a minimum and we want to keep the natural beauty of the lake area as original as possible," Davis added. He said the live springs that feed into the lake are maintaining a lake level ballance in spite of the loss of water due to evaporation and seep-



If you own a piece of old wood furniture that would look better cleaner, but you aren't sure it can be washed, try working on a small inconspicuous spot first. If the test zone becomes streaked or blossoms a whitish haze, abandon the project and seek the help of an expert.

Should the testing prove safe, use mineral spirits to remove old wax. Prepare a solution of four tablespoons detergent or soap to a half gallon of warm water. Dip a soft-bristled brush into the sudsy solution, lightly shake out exmoisture and proce fully. Wash, rinse and dry small areas at a time.

Wait at least 24 hours to be sure the furniture is completely dry; then apply a hard-paste furniture wax and buff with a soft



#### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature. Provide that the amount

a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivsions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of bene-fits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."
