Some of our friends who are in business in Tulia tell us that Silverton people are their very best customers. One Tulia merchant told us the other day that 40% of his business is from Silverton. Yet, I recall when our son and the other members of the Silverton Annual Staff made requests for advertising to support the school's yearbook some of these people were nice enough to buy space and some of these people not only turned them down but also treated our kids rather shabbily-one in particular with whom the kids themselves had done business.

I think there is a group of people in Tulia who are so eager for Lake Mackenzie to be their very own now that it is a reality (in spite of the fact that some of them fought the project in the beginning), that they have lost their perspective. Of course, Silverton is only 26 miles east of Tulia, but since it is about 30 miles by the roads from Tulia that is the description of the location being given. Let's be fair, people in Tulia: town and we don't think you should try to smother ours.

Now we learn that Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Company is making plans to run lines from Vigo to Mackenzie Lake, and that it will be a local call from the lake to Tulia, and a long-distance call from the lake to Silverton. If this weren't so sad it would almost be funny that a group of lobbyists could have talked the telephone company into something like this. It is sad enough that people like the Flowers, Arnolds, Cogdells, etc. who live in Briscoe County and their children to scho Silverton must call Silverton long distance. Can you who live in town imagine how it would be if our kids had to call their school friends long distance? If our kids had to call long distance home from school?

If the present plan goes through, the Forbes, Mayfields, Wyatts and others who live just a stone's throw away would have to call long distance to the lake. Gary Martin is assistant lake manager, and lives just a short distance from the lake, but it would be a long-distance call from the lake to his home. 



TEXAS TALK



Q: I've been told some grocery stores have their own meat grades. Is there more than one sys tem for grading beef cuts? A: Some meat packers utilize

their own grading systems known as name brand or in-house grading. However the grade you see in the supermarket is almost always that assigned the meat by the Standardization and Grading Branch of the United States Department of Agriculture. Meat products will generally carry a label reading, "USDA Choice," "USDA Prime," or whatever the appropriate grade. USDA grading is done on the basis of carcass classification and is supposed to reflect the eating quality of the meat. A USDA grading system seldom noticed by consumers is the Yield Grade. Purpose of the Yield Grade is the determination of the relative cut-ability of the carcass. Specifically, how much of the carcass can be used in the four major retail cuts of beef. Highest Yield Grade for beef is USDA-1. Lowest is USDA-5.

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
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


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
