

Absentee Voting Underway In City, School Elections

Absentee voting is underway in Silverton, with the school trustee voting at the office of Verlin B. Towe and the city officers' voting at the City Hall.

All incumbents have filed for re-election and are unopposed on the ballot.

Mrs. Anne McMurtry and Harold Storie are the candidates for the two school trustee positions.

Fred Mercer is a candidate for re-election as mayor of Silverton, and incumbents David Tipton and Carl Bomar are listed as the candidates for the two city council vacancies.

In addition, there is a Briscoe County School Election ballot, on which the candidates are also unopposed. H. A. Cagle is seeking re-election as county trustee-at-large; Dallas Culwell for county trustee, Precinct 4, and W. J. (Pete) Rice for county trustee, Precinct 2.

Silverton's Owlettes won second place in the girls track meet held at Spur last Friday, only one point out of a first place tie with Paducah. 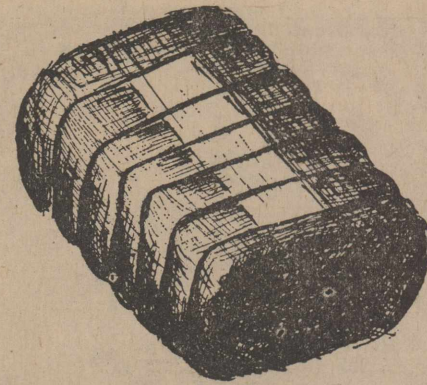
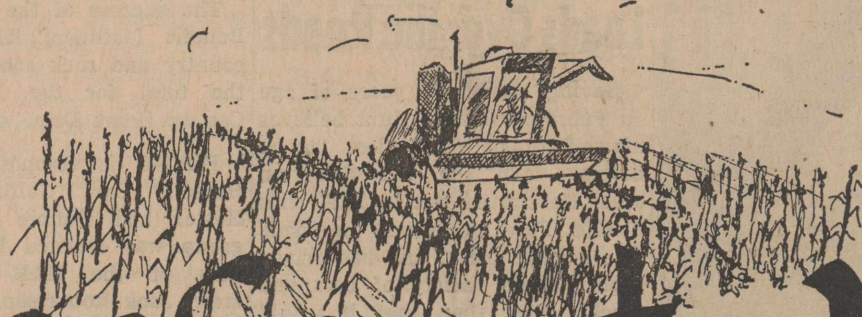
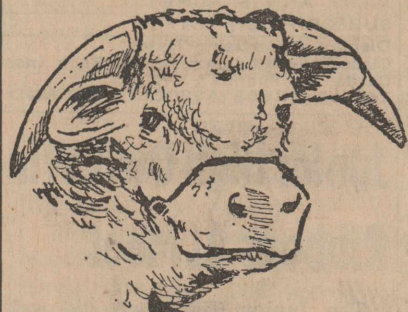
Twelve Briscoe County 4-H members participated in practice livestock judging contests in Lubbock Saturday, March 15.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS Agriculture is this nation's largest industry providing jobs, food, fiber and many other necessities that contribute to our very existence, I respectfully urge the people of Silverton in cooperation with the National Agricultural Marketing Association and Terra Cotta CowBelles, to acknowledge March 24, 1975 as American Agriculture Day in Silverton.

The Terra Cotta CowBelles are mounting a program for American Agriculture Day, March 24, 1975, to inform the public of the workings and economic of the modern American cattle industry, it was announced today by Mary Darnell, Terra Cotta CowBelles President. The Terra Cotta CowBelle organization is affiliated with the American National CowBelles, an auxiliary of the American National Cattlemen's Association.

"As representatives of the beef industry we are joining other agriculture-industry groups in a nationwide effort on March 24 to help urban Americans more fully understand the importance of agriculture and agriculture-related products to their way of life. We want to build a bridge of understanding between rural and urban Americans," Mrs. Darnell said. "After all, the two groups are inter-dependent—agriculture, the nation's largest industry, employs four out of ten non-farm workers. And in the beef industry segment alone, every dollar of cattle sales directly generates an additional \$5 to \$6 of business activity in the farm supply and food businesses," she said.

Terra Cotta CowBelles plans for Agriculture Day include a poster display of beef by-product and giving away a beef gift certificate.

BEEF BY-PRODUCTS

"Almost Everything Begins on the Farm" is the CowBelles theme for Agriculture Day, and they offer the following in substantiation of this claim. All products other than carcass meat are designated as by-products. Only 50% of the animal can be used as meat cuts for the public. Cattle alone produce 80 by-products. If it were not for this conversion of waste materials into saleable form, the price of meat would be much higher.

The bone is used for China crochet needles, dice, teething rings, brushes, handles, glue and fertilizer.

The hide is used for leather goods and shoes.

The horns are used for making buttons, handles of carving sets, rennet for cheese making, gelatin, marshmallows, photographic film, printer's rollers, cigarette papers, glycerin, cosmetics, medicine.

Many of these vehicles won't have ever been heard of by some of the younger readers.

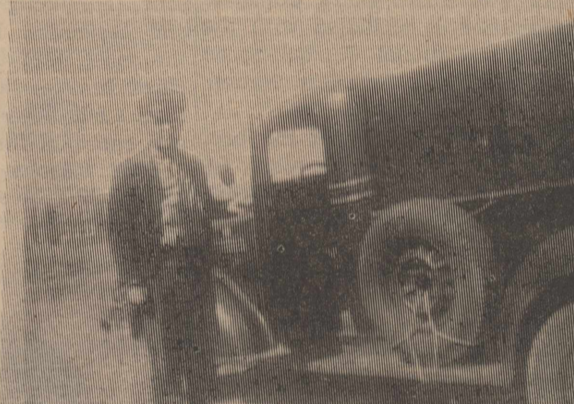
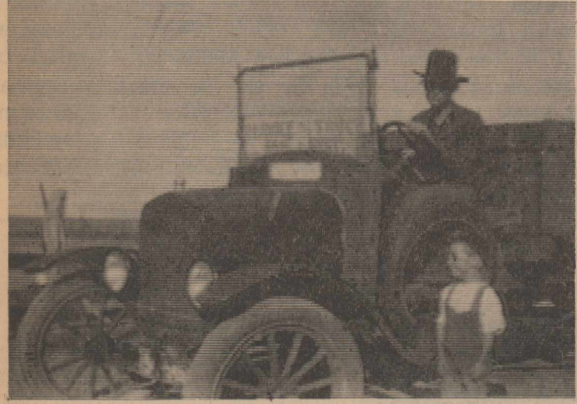
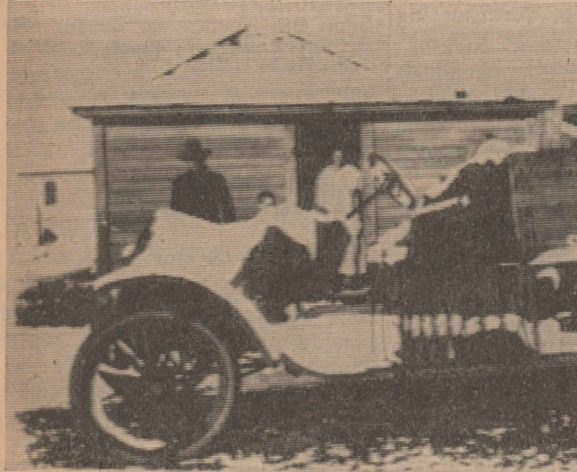

Mr. Hunt has been hauling something somewhere in a truck most of his lifetime. Q. What are some of the characteristics of a good breeding bull not necessarily required for good beef cattle?

A. Most notable characteristics for breeding bulls not necessary in beef cattle include: a masculine appearance, breed markings, constitution and a good weight-to-age ratio.

CONSTITUTION — Usually described as the positive tendency of an animal to perform well and survive during advanced age. Physical characteristics indicative of a good constitution are full development of the forequarters, wide-open and broad nostrils, a strong straight back and good body width and depth.

MASCULINITY — Evidenced by the appearance of the bull. General features to look for are a full neck, strong horns (when this is a breed characteristic), full forehead with good development of chest and shoulders.
