Filing for a place on May ballots now open

If serving in public office is on your bucket list, then here is your opportunity.

The date for city elections, as well as school board elections has been set for May 10, 2014.

Filing for a place on the ballot began Wed., Jan. 29, and will continue through Fri., Feb. 28 at 5 p.m.

In the city of Haskell, voters will elect a mayor and two aldermen. Council seats held by Jill Druessedow and Dan Hoover, along with the mayor's position will be up for election.

On the Haskell CISD school board, place #2 and #3, currently held by Debbie Earles and Joey Thomas, will be on the ballot. Both are three year terms.

The city of Rule will vote on a mayor and two councilmen, now being served by Jerry Cannon, Patrick Pace and Bobby

Robinson.

The Rule ISD school board has two positions up for election. Incumbents are Sam Grindstaff and Shane LeFevre.

Dunagin Transport to locate service yard in Haskell

Dunagin Transport already has begun ground work on their new service yard for Haskell county. The yard will be located one and a half miles west of Haskell city limits on U.S. Hwy. 380. The six acres for Dunagin Transport's

newest yard was purchased from Haskell native Sam Pace. "It is not easy to come to a decision to sell any piece of land, especially land that has been in a family for three generations like this tract; however, I knew that this would be good for both the City of Haskell as well as Haskell County. It will bring jobs and economic growth to our area and that's a very good thing," said Pace.

Dunagin Transport is based out of Merkel and has six other service yards throughout Texas. They are a family-owned operation and provide oil and gas services including vacuum trucks, saltwater disposal, freshwater, chemical and tank cleaning.

Bo Dunagin, owner of Dunagin Transport, said the company has plans to move in four to five trucks this year and hopes to increase the number of employees on staff as their services expand. "We are pleased to be in the Haskell community and hope to see a steady increase in oil and gas exploration like it is increasing in other areas of Texas," said Dunagin. The Haskell yard will service approximately a 75 mile radius.



HANDWASHING: THE MOST IMPORTANT DEFENSE

Keeping hands clean through improved hand hygiene is one of the most important steps we can take to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others. Many diseases and conditions are spread by not washing hands with soap and clean, running water. If clean, running water is not accessible, as is common in many parts of the world, use soap and available water. If soap and water are unavailable, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol to clean hands.

When should you wash your hands?

- Before, during, and after preparing food
- Before eating food
- Before and after caring for someone who is sick
- Before and after treating a cut or wound
- After using the toilet
- After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet
- After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- After touching an animal or animal waste
- After handling pet food or pet treats
- After touching garbage

What is the right way to wash your hands?

- Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold) and apply soap.
- Rub your hands together to make a lather and scrub them well; be sure to scrub the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
- Continue rubbing your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.
- Rinse your hands well under running water.
- Dry your hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

How do you use hand sanitizers?

- Apply the product to the palm of one hand.
- Rub your hands together.
- Rub the product over all surfaces of your hands and fingers until your hands are dry.
- Hand sanitizers are not as effective when hands are visibly dirty.






SBA economic injury disaster loans available to Texas small businesses

Small, nonfarm businesses in 162 Texas counties and neighboring counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma are now eligible to apply for low-interest federal disaster loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). "These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by the drought that began Nov. 1, 2013, in the following primary counties," announced Tanya N. Garfield, Acting Director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.
 Haskell, Baylor, Jones, Knox, Stonewall and Throckmorton are among some counties on the Primary Texas counties list.
 "SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster," Garfield said.
 Small, nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have

been met had the disaster not occurred.
 "Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4% for businesses and 2.625% for private, nonprofit organizations, a maximum term of 30 years, and are available to small businesses and most private, nonprofits without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Garfield said.
 By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Tom Vilsack declared this disaster on Jan. 15, 2014.
 Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises

should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.
 Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure Web site at <https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela>.
 Disaster loan information and application forms are also available from SBA's Customer Service Center by calling SBA toll-free at 800-659-2955, emailing disastercustomerservice@sba.gov, or visiting SBA's Web site at www.sba.gov/services/disasterassistance. Individuals who are deaf or hard-of-hearing may call (800) 877-8339.
 The deadline to apply for these loans is Sept. 15, 2014.



 Last Tuesday's District 9-1A girls basketball game was a much anticipated rematch between the Haskell Maidens (16-7, 3-3) and the 16th state ranked Hamlin Lady Pipers (18-2, 6-0). Haskell led 25-17 going into the fourth quarter. Unfortunately, the Maidens were outscored 16-7 in the fourth quarter and ended up losing by one point for the second time to the Lady Pipers 33-32.

The Maiden's man to man defense really clamped down on the Lady Pipers offense all night long. Hamlin had a poor shooting night going (7-30) from the field for 23%. Most of Hamlin's points came from the free-throw line where they shot (18-24) for 75%. "Defensively, I thought the girls were locked in and really focused on taking away the high percentage shots near and around the basket against Hamlin. The only thing I wish we would have done better on that end of the floor would obviously have been not to foul as much," Haskell head coach Blake Eddleman said.

The Maiden offense was led by Reagan Hadaway's 14 points and Kenzie Shelton's 10 points. Jacie Klose had a team high 5 assists followed by Destiny Pierce with 3 and MyKaylee Wilhite with 2. The Maiden's finished up

the night shooting (14-38) from the field for 38% and (3-12) from the free-throw line for 25%. "Offensively, I thought the girls did a great job handling Hamlin's press and we got good looks from the field. And, I was so proud of MyKaylee's big time free-throw makes late in the game. We just need to find a way to knock down a few more shots from the field and free-throw line. We will continue to work on it and I am confident that we will shoot better in the future," Eddleman said.

Shelton and Pierce led all rebounders with 5 each and Hadaway had 4 and Bassett 3. Leading the team in steals was Klose with 3, Pierce 2, and Bassett 1. "Overall, it was so disappointing that we gave up another lead and came up short again in district play. We have three district losses this year by a combined four points and we led all three games going into the fourth quarter. I have been so proud of this year's team. They have given us a chance to win every district game and I really can't ask for anything more than that. Now, we just have to find a way to win those close games and I am confident we will in the future," Eddleman said.


