

During the past decade Haskell erected three enduring school buildings. One three story stone on the north side of which the high school occupies part of the second and third stories. One ty's pioneer farmers and wheat growers brick of two stories is on the south edge of town; another two story brick is about a mile east of the town square. On these about \$45,000 worth of bonds are still out, and they are not fitted for present day school work. Twenty cents of the school tax is required for the bonds.

WHO ARE LIABLE TO PAY INCOME TAX

Austin. Texas. Jan. 1.—The following information relating to an individual's liability in making income tax reports and paying the tax is issued by the Collector of Internal Revenue for the District of Texas.

All married persons whose net income during the year 1919 equals or exceeds \$2,000,00, and all single persons whose net income equals or exceeds \$1,000,00, are required to make an income tax report. If you were married or head of a family on the 31st day of December, 1919, you are entitled to an exemptio nof \$2,000.00; if single and not head of a family you are entitled to an exemption of \$2,000.00; if single and not are also entitled to a further credit, whether single, married or at the head of a family, of \$200,00 for each person (other than husband or wife) dependent upon and receiving his or her chief support from them during the year, if such person is under 18 years of age or is incapable of self support by reason of mental or physical disability.

The normal income tax is at the rate of 4 per cent upon the first \$4,000.00 of the net income in excess of the credits allowed, and 8 per cent upon an excess of that amount. A person receiving a net income in excess of \$5,000.00 is also liable to a surtax of 1 per cent upon income from \$5,000 to \$6,000; 2 per cent from \$6,000 to \$8,000, \$3 per cent from \$8,000 to \$10,000; etc.

All amounts received from the sale of crops, dairy products, eggs, fruit, live stock products, live stock whether raised on the farm or not, and all other farm products, and all amounts received for board of persons, board and pasturage of animals, labor of men and teams, hire or use of machinery, and all other earnings arising from farming operations must be reported in the tax return.

These are some of the deductions allowed from the gross income in arriving at the net income: Taxes paid or accrued during the taxable year, ex-4. Physiology charts and globes for cept Federal income, war profits, and excess taxes, and taxes assessed against local benefits of a kind tending to increase the value of the property assessed; interest paid or accrued within the taxable year: losses sustained during the year and not covered by insurance. A reasonable allowance for obsolesence: contributions not in excess of 15 per cent of net income to religious, charitable, scientific or educational institutions. Amounts paid for labor during the calendar year covered by report in preparing land for a crop. cultivating. harvesting and marketing of the crops cost of feed and fertilizer used; amount paid for feed during the year covered by report; repairs for farm buildings (not dwelling), fences, farm machinery, etc.; cost of farm tools which are used up in the course of a year or so; and the amount paid for the rent of a farm, are classed as necessary expenses and are deductible from the gross in-

> These items are not deductible from the gross income: Personal, living and family expenses, any amount paid out for buildings or for permanent improvements made to increase the value of the property; amounts expended in restoring property or in making good the exhaustion thereof for which allowance is or has been made.

Income tax returns must be made out and filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Texas, not later than March 15th, 1920, for the income during the year 1919, and the entire amount of the tax may be paid at that time or in four installments; one fourth on March 15th, one fourth June 15th, one fourth September 15th, and one fourth on December 15th.

Income tax blanks will be mailed, without application, to all persons who filed an income tax return for the year 1918, and all other persons, who under the provisions of the laws, should make a return should apply to the Collector of Internal Revenue, Aus.tin, Texas, for blanks after Jan. 20th, 1920.

Persons who fail to make out income tax returns as provided by law are liable to a fine of not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisonment not to exceed 12 months, or both, in addition to





The suffering of soldiers in the Crimean war first directed the world's attention to the merit of systematic care for the wounded. In 1859 M Henri Dunant was visiting Italy and witnessed the carnage of the battle of Solferino. He organized volunteers to help take care of the wounded. Out of his work grew the conference at Geneva, in 1863, and another in 1864. These conferences were the formal beginning of the Red Cross. The name and insignia were adopted. Scientific investigations go to show that the roaring waves and the mightiest billows of the ocean repose, not upon hard and troubled beds, but upor cushions of still water; that every where at the bottom of the deep sea the solid ribs of the earth are protected from the abrading action of its currents.

Record Hurricane Damage. The worst hurricane of which any record exists was that of October 10, 1780, which started in the Barbados. An English fleet anchored off St. Lucia simply disappeared. Nearly every building on the island was blown down and 6,000 people buried.
