SOME INTERESTING PUBLIC SCHOOL ITEMS

More New Pupils

More than thirty new pupils have been enrolled this week. There is but one vacant room at the South Side and three vacant rooms at the East Side. It looks now as if extra teachers will be required after the Christmas holidays in order to accommodate the pupils. Many are asking concerning the compulsory school law. The Haskell trustees are more concerned about finding seats and teachers for the children who want to come to school than they are about compelling them to come whose parents do not want them to come. The district needs four hundred dollars worth of new seats at this time.

High School Boys Return From College Station

The Fifth Annual Older Boys Conference which met at College Station last week was well attended by high school boys from all over the state. Haskell had two representatives at the conference. The High school Literary Society paid one-third the railroad fare of one of the representatives and the other pupil paid his own expenses. Albert Lemon and Lowell Robertson were the two High School boys who attended. They brought back many good things for the boys of the high school and for the entire student body. People who are unfamiliar with the purposes and work of this great conference in Texas should make some inquiry relative to its great accomplishments.






