## NE W RULINGS RELATING TO SELLING OF WHEAT FLOUR.

The foliowing rulings have been sent
out to all the grocers in Haskell county sold on the same basis as wheat
flour, except that you may sell it on by County Food Administrator R. V. . the basis of six-tenths of a pound of Robertson under the instructions of the state Food Administrator. These rul-
fings are compulsory and must be fol-
lowed by the grocers.
"The following rulings. will supercede of whent flour to consumers."
"Tou may sell wheat flour to your
customers, city and country, on the customers, city and conutry, on the
basis of 6 pounds per person per month. basis of 6 pounds per person per month,
and if necessary as much as a months
supply at a time. Provided this six apply at a time. Provided, this six
pounds is not more than 70 of the normal requirement.
