M. E. CONFERENCE HAS ADJOURNED

Actual Work of the Body Finished Saturday—Sunday Devoted to Religious Services

The North Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, adjourned at Clarendon Sunday night. Sunday was devoted to religious services. The love feast was held Sunday morning.

Bishop J. H. McCoy preached at the Clarendon Methodist Church at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, and all available space in the large and roomy building was occupied. During the afternoon Sunday memorial services were held, at which services the lives and characters of the late Rev. W. L. Harris and Dr. G. C. Rankin were appropriately memorialized.

Of especial interest to Haskell folk will be the announcement that Rev. Ed R. Wallace was returned to Haskell for another year of church work. During the time Rev. Wallace has been pastor of the local church he has made many staunch friends, and has demonstrated that he is a man of great business ability, as well as being a good pastor. He has had many obstacles to overcome during his stay here, and he has met everyone squarely, never flinching or dodging. He has worked hard to lift the church debt during his stay here, and his work along that line has been highly satisfactory. Rev. Wallace announced prior to his departure for Clarendon to attend the conference, that in the event he was returned to Haskell it would be his earnest endeavor to raise five thousand dollars more of the church debt during the coming year. OFFICERS MADE RAID ON SATURDAY NIGHT

Gang of Gamblers Rounded Up in Vicinity of Rochester—Negro Seriously Wounded.

Officials from the sheriff's office went out on a raid Saturday night last, near Rochester, that resulted disastrously for at least one negro who received a serious bullet wound. The officers flushed a gambling game about two miles south of Rochester, in which it is said many men were engaged, both white and black.

When the officers broke in on the crowd there was a general scramble in the attempt to elude arrest. During the scramble, one officer was viciously struck at with a large knife. He was uninjured, but his coat was cut nearly off of him. When this happened a shot was fired that seriously wounded the negro. It is believed the wounded negro is the one who attempted to slash the official with a knife.

As a result of Saturday night's raid, there is at present five men, one white and four negroes, confined in the county jail. They will likely be arraigned on charges of gaming.

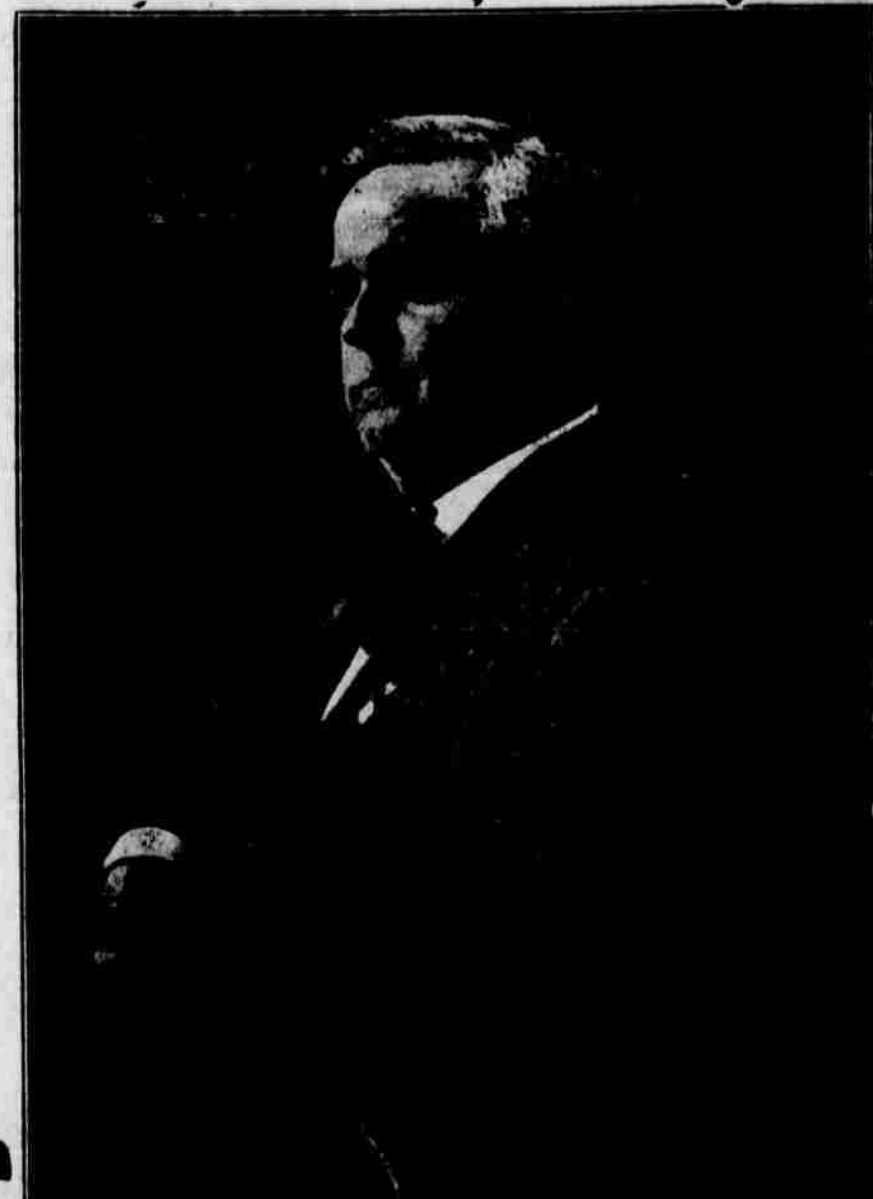

Principal Farm Crops Valuable This Year

Washington, Nov. 8.—The nation's principal farm crops this year are worth about five and a half billion dollars, exceeding by more than half a billion dollars their value in 1914, the previous banner year in the country's crop history.

There has been an unprecedented harvest, many of the crops exceeding their best records and high prices due to the influence of the European war have contributed to swell the total value. Statistics announced today by the department of agriculture in its November crop report base values on prevailing November prices. Corn, with a production of 3,090,509,000 bushels—34,000,000 bushels below the record crop—is worth \$1,913,325, 071, the most valuable corn crop ever grown. It exceeds the former biggest value crop, that of 1914, by \$190,000,000.

Wheat, with the largest production ever known in any country, 1,002,029,000 bushels or about one-fourth of the world's wheat crop, this year is worth \$932,888,999, or \$54,000,000 more than the record made in 1914.

The oat crop also was a record one both in point of production and value. The harvest was 1,517,478,000 bushels, almost 100,000,000 bushels better than the record of 1914 and its value, \$532,599,822, is \$53,000,000 more than the record value of the 1914 crop. Barley, rye, sweet potatoes, hay and rice were record crops in point of production and tobacco almost equalled its best production.

PEOPLE'S SOCIAL SERVICE

Much of the effort honestly and
 consciously made to improve ru-
 ral conditions is not effective be-
 cause the social service worker
 does not understand rural people.
 Improvements brought about by
 city people or by those whose in-
 terest in the rural community is
 general and economic, rather than
 human and local, have always
 been temporary. The history of
 such movements have shown that
 as a general rule rural leaders are
 not ready to take the place of
 those who started reform and who
 often undertook to solve problems
 they did not thoroughly under-
 stand.

Rural reform must be slow and
 improvements made only when
 the people themselves are ready.
 Whenever something new and
 strange is begun in a community
 it may have hearty support at
 first, but unless a majority of the
 people accept the plan and pre-
 pare themselves for it, failure is
 likely to be the result.

The people of the community
 must be in sympathy, harmony
 and cooperation before great
 progress can be made in rural im-
 provement. Those whose unself-
 ish services have done much may
 do the most good by suggestion
 encouragement and inspiration
 with a view of getting the people
 to act upon their own problems
 and with leaders who are citizens
 in the community. There is more
 or less suspicion of those who
 come into the community to "re-
 form the country" and until rural
 leaders are found and are willing
 to lead progress will be slow.

The more social workers who
 come into the community the bet-
 ter, provided the people can be
 persuaded to begin rural welfare
 work.—Farm and Ranch.

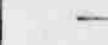

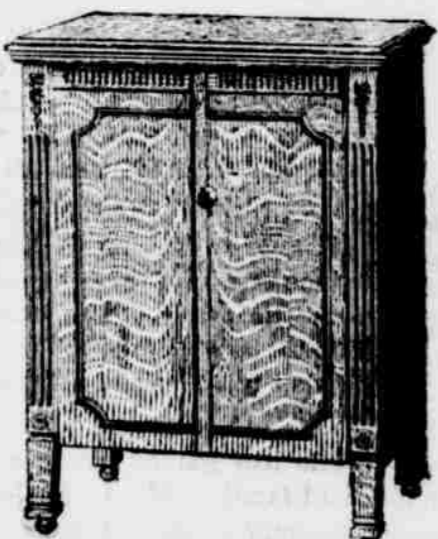

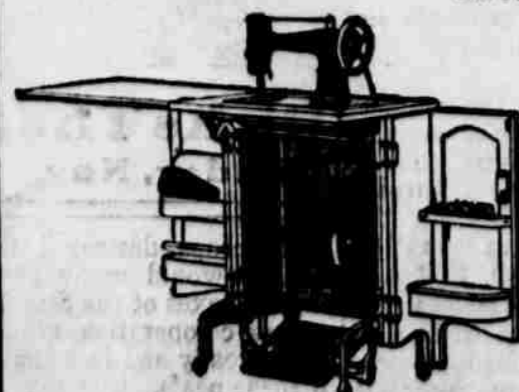
