Fire ,was discovered in the Hudson building on Depot street about 3 o'clock Tuesday morning, in which considerable damage was done to the building and contents. The ground floor of the building is occupied by Jake's Place and the City Meat Market. In the upper apartments, F. Thomas keeps rooms for rent. All the occupants suffered damage but, Mr. Thomas suffered the greater loss in personal effects. All the familiure except his cook stove in his kitchen were a total loss, together with a large amount of groceries. The fire seemed to have originated in the coal bin of Jake's Place and spread through a window to other parts of the building. None of the occupants can give a clew to the origin of the fire and it is believed by some that it might bave been incendiary.

Mr. Hudson estimates the damage to Just as the flames had reached the top of the building and had burned a small hole through the roof the fire boys arrived and by heroic effort and good water pressure the fire was soon put under control and extinguished. The fire was confined to the rear of the building or else the damage would have been greater.

D. 1920, shall be as follows, to wir: A Senior Fifty Yard Dashthree-pound or 48 ounce loaf, a two pound or 32 ounce loaf, a 1 1-2 pound or 24 founce lonf; a one pound or 16 ounce Yoaf; and it shall be unlawful for anyone engaged in the business of sell or offer for sale, from and after March 1st. A. D. 1920, bread in any other size loaves, save and except those established by this order.
