The commissioner's court met in regular session Tuesday of this week and among the regular business to come before the court the following business was transacted.

The Pool Hall election which was held at Sagerton on September 2nd, was canvassed and the results were declared to be 49 to 21 in favor of closing the pool hall.

An extension of time was given to the owners of the Haskell County School land located in Hockley county, on the past due interest which should have been paid on September 1st, the time being extended until October 9th.

The County Tax Assessor's rolls were examined, approved and ordered filed.

A contract was awarded to the Haskell Free Press to publish the delinquent Tax list for the year of 1915.

W. H. C. Brown a Pioneer Farmer

Eight years ago W. H. C. Brown came to Haskell from Brown county and bought the farm he now lives on, and began his successful career as a model farmer in his section. He is a native of the state of Georgia, but has been in Texas many years. He is now 71 years of age and can get about like a young man. He owns 200 acres of good sandy land on which he has a good growing crop of corn, maize, cotton, melons and stock peas. Of this crop he has 20 acres in peas and June corn, the peas planted between the rows of corn have completely covered the ground and are beginning to bear. He has some fine mules and horses 100 head of hogs, Rhode Island Red chickens and 10 head of Jersey cattle. His success can be attributed to energy and good judgment coupled with a strong will. Oil Mill Most Modern In State

The Western Cotton Oil and Gin Co., will have, when completed, one of the most modern and up-to-date plants in the State. Since the fire in June which destroyed the seed and hull houses, rebuilding has been going on continually, and while they were at it, Manager Earl Cogdell, decided that the best would be none too good, and they built it from the best material, in the best manner, and installed nothing but the most modern machinery, not only in the new buildings but throughout the whole plant.

In the boiler room, a new 400 h. p. Murray boiler has been installed, which will give more power, and be more safe than the old boilers. The heaters, and all connections, pumps, etc. are all either new or have been thoroughly overhauled. Oil while be used for fuel.

The giant 250 horse power engine was installed new last year, and needed but very little attention when it came to overhauling being amply powerful enough for all requirements.

The Press room machinery has been overhauled, and made complete by rebuilding and new parts.

In the mill room has been placed new, modern machinery, which will grind the meal finer, and better, and which will of course make better satisfied customers.

Upstairs have been placed new Murray ball bearing linters, and machinery in separating is new.

The new 100x50 hull house has been completed. This is the only mill in the state equipped with the new blower method of handling hulls. The hulls are blown through a pipe from the mill to the hull house, and are loaded into cars in the same manner.

The seed house is said to be the best in the state with the exception of one, after which this one is modeled. It is 180 x 80 feet, and 50 feet high. Has baffled walls, 20 feet high, with a baffle of 10 feet. It is connected to the mill by the new steel box conveyors. The method of unloading cars has been improved upon, for instead of screw conveyors, the seed will be unloaded onto belts, which carry them into the seed house.

The mill has its own water and lightning system. Its water system is indeed complete, having a pressure of about 50 pounds, coming from a high water tower. Ten fire plugs surround the mill.

The six steel storage tanks for cotton seed oil were bought new last year. These have been repainted. They hold 9,000 gallons of oil each.

Seed is being unloaded in the seed house, and the mill will probably start running the last of next week.

Superintendent J. R. Sorrells, who is in charge of the mechanical parts of the mill, and who was kind enough to show us through it, came here about five months ago from Abilene, where he has been Superintendent of the Continental Oil & Cotton Co. for the past sixteen years. Mr. Sorrells likes Haskell and will make this his future home.

Stamp Tax Is Now Removed

When the new general revenue bill became effective Sept., 9th, business men throughout the country were relieved of stamp taxes which they had been paying since December 1, 1914, and which were to have continued until December 1 of this year.

The general revenue bill replaced the emergency bill stamp taxes and the internal revenue bureau has ruled that revenue stamps will not be required after today. Those were paid on telegraph and telephone messages, trolley seats and berth tickets, bonds, debentures, certificates of stock, transfer bill of sale, promissory notes, express and freight bills of lading, bonding instruments, conveyances, insurance policies, entry of goods, passage tickets, powers of attorney, protests, perfumery, cosmetics and chewing gum.

During the first seven months' operation of the emergency revenue law these stamp taxes yield more than \$23,000,000. These taxes are removed collectively and not under individual heads.

Majority for Culberson is Cut to 46,700

Senator Charles A. Culberson's official majority over former Governor Oscar B. Colquitt in the run-off race for senator will go down on the records as only 46,700, though newspaper returns give the present senator a majority of 67,000 over his opponent.

The Democratic executive committee met at the Westbrook hotel in Fort Worth Saturday afternoon to canvass the returns and declare the result.

More than forty counties failed to make any reports at all, among them being McLennan, which, according to newspaper reports, gave Culberson a vote of 3,685 against 1,903 for Colquitt. A number of other heavy Culberson counties were among those which failed to report.

Baylor County Mass Meeting Bars Negroes

Negroes will not be allowed to return to Baylor county. This was decided by a mass meeting of citizens from all parts of the county held at the court house in Seymour. The vote against permitting their return was overwhelming.

Negro residents fled Baylor county following the killing of Sheriff W. L. Ellis by Steve Brown a negro, on Aug. 6th. Since then there has been some discussion as to whether they would be permitted to return and a mass meeting was called to determine the question. The meeting was called by some who favored their return. Those against the plan used campaign methods to get a crowd to the mass meeting. Handbills were printed and distributed throughout the county, messengers on horseback were sent to remote parts of the county and rural telephones used to summon voters from the more densely populated sections.
