Third New Oiler Mt. Vernon Field Best Well Drilled

Third oil well completion listed for the Mount Vernon area may go down in the records as a new East Texas pool opener.

Finished for 178 barrels per day on pump was F. R. Jackson and S. H. Killingsworth No. 1 Parchman-Moore unit, George Richardson survey, 1½ miles southeast of Mount Vernon. The 38-gravity oil came from perforations at 7-003-09 in a sand section said to have been absent in the area's two prior completions about a mile northeast.

It was indicated the Longview operators will seek discovery rights with West Mount Cernon as the suggested pool name. It is the best completion for the area so far. The pool discovery pumped 144 barrels from 7-010-24 while a location northwest corner pumped 162 barrels. Both these wells produce from a Pettit lime section.

In Red River County initial gauge of 15 barrels of oil and 15 barrels of fresh water daily on pump is reported for Payne-William Stephens estate, P. D. Midkiff survey, Paluxy sand pay prospect four miles north of Bagwell. The fluid is coming from 1,621-28 feet.

Federal Court Hears About Deals At Texarkana

Texarkana.—The Federal Government Tuesday introduced documents indicating that Roy W. Adams, an Assembly of God minister, made \$54,770 in commissions from sale of stock in about three years.

Adams is on trial on charges of scheming to defraud stockholders in the Central Finance Service, Inc., and using the mails to do so.

The Mount Pleasant minister pleaded innocent to the 10 counts of the indictment.

The indictment charges that he and Council Mayo Forsyth, president of the firm, sold shares in the company at \$10 to \$20 which Forsyth had acquired for 35c.

Fred Wyrick, Fort Worth Securities and Exchange Commission investigator, related interviewing stockholders and Adams.

He said Adams told him he had an understanding with Forsyth that he was to sell shares for \$10, giving \$8 to Forsyth and keeping \$2.

The government introduced a list of salesmen working for Adams, but did not immediately say what commissions were paid them by Adams from the \$54,770 the government claims Adams received.

Another witness, James A. Justice of Dallas, said he and a brother organized the Central Finance Service and incorporated it at \$15,000. He said about 45 days later they transferred almost all the stock to Forsyth for \$8,600.

Forsyth formerly lived in Paris, where he sold insurance, before locating in Mt. Pleasant. He is also under indictment in connection with this operation.

TALCO TROJANS DEFEAT JAMES BOWIE 28-0 CONFERENCE PLAY

Fullback Johnny Hood, the hard-running 170-pound senior for Talco High, had one of those nights for the Trojans Friday at Simms.

Hood sped for three Talco touchdowns and added a bonus extra point to lead the Trojans past James Bowie's Pirates for their third consecutive District 14-A victory, 28-0. The Pirates have an 0-3 district record.

The husky Trojan was never better. He ran eight yards in the second quarter for the opening Talco touchdown. The try for extra point failed. Then Halfback Jackie Martin got into the act with a 32-yard scoring run in the second quarter. Hood got the extra point and it was 14-0 at halftime.

He hustled the second-half kickoff back 70 yards for a touchdown, then ran 19 yards for another touchdown in the third

quarter. Quarterback Gerald Morris passed to End Mickey Via for the other bonus extra point.

Bowie's only threat to score came in the third quarter when they drove to Talco's 21 before fizzling.

Talco's well-balanced line—with no star but a full lineup of steady gridders—played a fine supporting role to Hood and the other Trojan backs. Talco has lost only one game this season, that a six-point defeat by Class AA DeKalb.

Next for the Trojans will be a 14-A match with Bogata at Talco Friday night.

Founder and former president
of Lamar Creamery, Bedford B.

side by a .410 gauge shotgun. He
had driven to his dairy farm to

taking the shotgun from his pick-
up when the accident occurred.

A Negro employee at the farm
notified Mrs. Harlan, who called
a doctor and ambulance and he
was rushed to the hospital and
underwent surgery Tuesday
night.

Although he serves only in an
advisory capacity with Lamar
Creamery now, he was the com-
pany's founder and long-time
president, and is a director of
First National Bank, Paris.

Red River-Titus Accident Report

Captain Glen Warner, com-
manding officer, Texas Highway
Patrol, Tyler, released the rural
traffic accident summary for Red
