TROJANS WILL MEET EDGEWOOD FRIDAY NIGHT REGIONAL PLAY

Talco Trojans will play Edgewood Friday night at Sulphur Springs at 7:30, instead of White Oak as previously announced. White Oak has been declared ineligible to continue in the play-offs.

Hawkins and Edgewood filed a protest with TIL, following a game between Edgewood and White Oak, in which they were defeated 70 to 14.

Postmaster Urges Early Mailings For Christmas

Predicting Christmas mail this year will set an alltime high record, the Postmaster announced a 1958 "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign.

It is always a good idea, he said, to make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, or post office box number, rural route and box number, but it is especially important to do so during the Christmas season.

Christmas cards carrying the first class postage of 4 cents, or 7 cents for air mail, may include a personal message, he continued. Nothing more than a signature is authorized on cards mailed at the 3 cent rate. By tying your mailings in two separate bundles for local and out of town with addresses all facing one way, you can greatly expedite delivery.

It is also important to plan your Christmas mailings so that those to distant points are mailed first. Try to get all your out of town cards and gifts into the Post Office before December 10, and those for nearby points by Dec. 15, in order to avoid the rush which is usually worst between the 10th and 24th.

REBUILDING OF U. S. 271 FROM PATTONVILLE TO BOGATA SOON

U. S. Highway 271 from Pattonville to Bogata, a distance of 13 miles, will be made six feet wider than its present 20 feet, and to that will be added eight feet of shoulders on either side, making it 42 feet wide, B. P. Burner, Red River County Resident Highway Engineer, told us Friday morning.

TALCO WINS BI-DISTRICT GAME WITH HONEY GROVE 20 TO 15

A "Trojan Norther" who goes by the name of Johnny Hood, whipped through Honey Grove last Friday in a bi-district game won by Talco at PJC Stadium in Paris 20 to 15. Hood raced 105 yards in the fourth quarter as he took the ball 5 yards deep in his own end zone and scored the deciding touchdown in a hard fought thrilling contest.

Honey Grove returned the Talco opening kickoff to the Tribe's 34 and on second down and seven Bobby Eaton sprinted 63 yards on a pitchout play for a touchdown. Attempted conversion was no good. A fumble in the Trojan backfield following the Tribe's touchdown forced a Trojan punt to the Warriors' 38, but Talco took over on downs on the Honey Grove 25 midway of the first quarter and a sustained Trojan drive followed.

Hood carried all but four yards in a 75 yard march on the Warrior goal line, but an off-side penalty gave the Trojan workhorse an extra down, much needed as Talco had bogged down on the 1 yard line. Hood carried over for the score on this second chance. With the try for extra point failing, the game was tied at 6 and 6 at the first period's ending.

Honey Grove scored again in the opening minutes of the second quarter and a fumble in the backfield on the attempt to convert made the score 12 to 6 in favor of the Warriors. Gerald Morris intercepted a Honey Grove pass near the end of the first period of play and sprinted 55 yards to the paydirt to end the first half scoring, but the try for points was unsuccessful. Talco was threatening the Tribe's goal line as they were on H. G. 34 as the half closed with the score knotted at 12 to 12.

Third period action was tough and defenses were even tougher as neither force struck the end zone. The Tribe controlled the pig hide for the most part of this set and as the fourth quarter got underway the Warriors had third down and goal to go. Jere Parrish broke up a pass play and Honey Grove's Gene Thurman kicked a field goal on the next play. With that three point edge the Tribe seemed to relax just a bit on their kickoff to Talco.

Behind some fine blocking and a burst of speed on his 45 yard stripe, Hood stirred the breeze as he left all defenders behind on a 105 yard gallop. Only four of his mates were within 10 yards of him for half of the distance. Morris passed to Martin for the only conversion made in the bi-district tilt. Midway of the final quarter Martin ran 65 yards for

a touchdown, but a holding penalty against Talco nullified the play. A 75 yard touchdown run was made by Cecil Loftin preceding Martin's but he stepped out of bounds on his own 35.

Honey Grove blocked a Talco punt with less than three minutes of playing time remaining and the Trojan lead of 20 to 15 looked mighty slim as the Warriors had the ball on the Talco 25. But Martin hauled in another Honey Grove pass on the one yard line and the Trojans were able to hold on to the little oval in the fading moments of the game.

Johnny Hood, the hard-charging, broken-field Trojan fullback, ate up a lot of yardage and played a tremendous defensive game as well, shared the spotlight with Talco quarterback Gerald Morris, who showed no signs of injuries he received in the game with Mt. Vernon. He mixed up the plays well and played a great defensive game, intercepting two passes; one was returned 55 yards for one of the Talco touchdowns and the other in the final period when Honey Grove was threatening to pull ahead. The Trojan defensive secondary was also bolstered by Jackie Martin, Jere Parrish and Freddie Stephenson.

The fighting Trojan forward wall opened some big holes for the backs and charged in on Honey Grove's Kenn Gregory and repeatedly caused rushed passes to go astray. Reggie Thompson, Dale Funderburk and Charles Blackburn led the Talco defenders and were aided by Donald Gibson, Joe Clark, Roger Simmons, and Loftin.

Gregory and Bobby Eaton carried the heavy load of the Tribe's offense as Charles Avery, John Allen and Joe Huffer gave Talco's offense a tough go. The Warriors put out a good balanced attack with pass and pitchout combinations, but couldn't match the fighting Trojan speed. Both of the high schools' marching bands performed at half time and their performances were enjoyed by the fans as they were genuinely applauded.

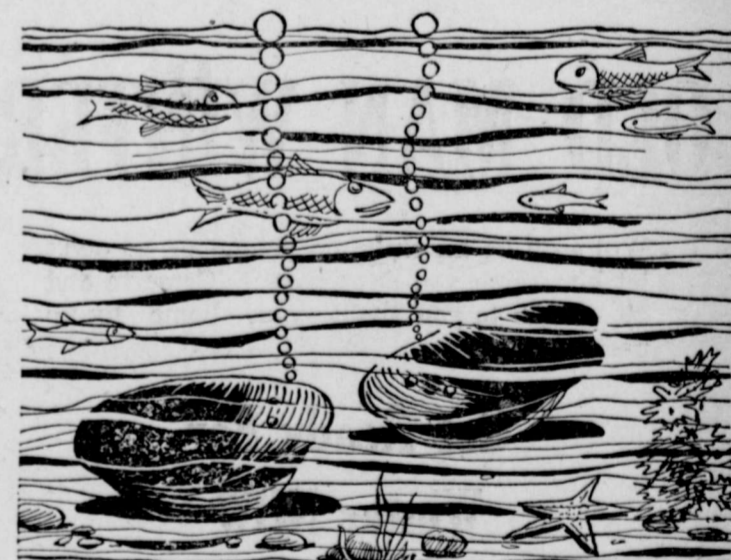

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$670,000 for farm-to-market and ranch-to-market road betterment in District 19 during 1959. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, has announced.

On FM 2149 from St. 8 southwest to Moss Springs Church, a distance of 2.4 miles, level up and seal coat.

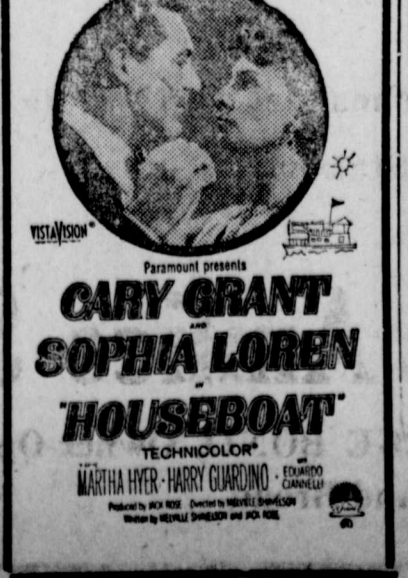

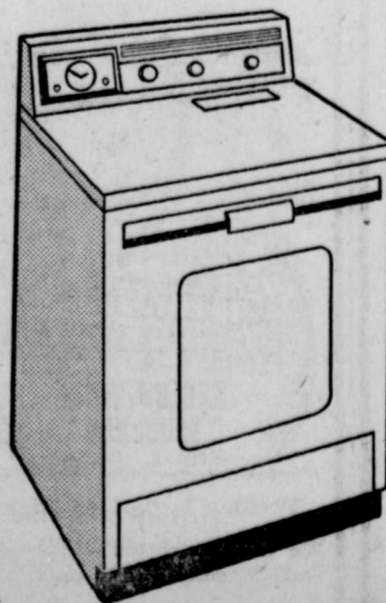
