Talco's Mickey Via is Named All-District

Talco High's brilliant cager, Mickey Via has been named by District 14-A coaches on the All-District team.

Via, a senior who averaged 15 points per game in 14-A play this season, was a pick on the first team. Another senior, Cecil Loftin, was named to the league's second team.

Unanimous choices for the all star team's first string Johnny Warren of James Bowie and Bobby Maples of the champion Mt. Vernon team. Bob Harris of Liberty-Eylau and Jerry Mac Alexander of Queen City, round out the first unit.

Loftin, who counted 14 points per game for the Trojans, shared second teams berths with David Powell of Liberty-Eylau, Billy Shafer of Mount Vernon, Butch Maples of Mount Vernon and Mackey Reed of James Bowie.

The honorable mention list includes Jerry McDaniel of Hughes Springs, Wayne Thomas of James Bowie and Jerry Terry of Queen City.

District coaches made the selection at Hughes Springs. Delbert Ballard is Talco High basketball coach.

Auto Inspections Reported Slow

In Red River County there were 6,280 registered vehicles, yet only 2,469 or 39 per cent have been inspected.

In Titus County, there were 3,250 registered vehicles, yet only 2,600 or 32 per cent have been inspected.

It was pointed out that vehicles should be inspected early in an effort to avoid a last minute rush to meet the April 15 deadline. Motorists are subject to a fine of \$100 to \$200 if they are stopped operating a vehicle without a valid inspection sticker attached.

Wilkinson Youths Being Questioned

Two Titus County youths were held in jail Monday at Mt. Pleasant by the sheriff's department for investigation in connection with the loss of a quantity of oil field supplies from two trucks in the Sugar Hill community Sunday.

Drivers of two Haliburton trucks parked their vehicles at Wilkinson at noon Sunday and went to Talco to get lunch. When they returned they missed part of their cargo, including a number of valves and other fittings.

The items, valued at about \$450, were later found by a deputy sheriff in an automobile belonging to a 17-year-old boy, who was accompanied by a 16-year-old boy. Both were said to live in the Sugar Hill community.

Sheriff Alvis Redfeam said that one boy had admitted theft of the material, but that the older boy refused to make a statement.

Group Appointed Ask Maintenance Business Loop

A committee was appointed at a recent meeting of the board of directors of Talco Chamber of Commerce to go to Austin on March 26 and ask the State Highway Commission to take over maintenance of Talco's business loop.

Half of the loop now consists of U. S. Highway 271 and FM 71. The other half was paved with a city bond issue back in 1937. The committee will ask the Commission to take over and maintain that portion paved by the city. It is a reasonable request and will doubtless be granted.

Named to the committee are Mayor Jerry Jones, Harold Bonham, A. L. Sikes, County Commissioner Gene Mankins and School Supt. W. R. Young. State Senator A. M. Aikin Jr. will be asked to support the measure.

Hospital in Pines Given Iron Lung

The Hospital in the Pines near Daingerfield has received an iron lung from the National Foundation.

The 2-month-old hospital was selected by the foundation as located for the special equipment, which will serve the six counties of the First Senatorial District of Texas. Counties in the district are: Cass, Morris, Titus, Marion, Franklin, and Upshur.

Allen Would Tax Green Stamp Cos.

The Revenue and Taxation committee had a heated meeting recently in the Texas House of Representatives. The bill, which would tax Green Stamp companies and other stamp companies 10 per cent of their gross sales, was written and introduced by Representative John Allen of Longview, and Representative Joe Chapman of Sulphur Springs.

Witnesses of various stamp companies spoke against the bill, stating that they were helping the people. Representative John Allen stated that stamp companies did not help anybody but themselves. He said that they lead people to think they get something for nothing with stamps when actually they are paying the 2 per cent that it costs a merchant to keep stamps in his place of business.

Allen says legitimate advertising mediums like newspapers, radio stations and TV stations pay local and state taxes and that the stamp companies should also pay taxes. In some places they have no redemption centers . . . and in places where they do have them, they are competing directly with local merchants who pay taxes and help support our cities and our state.

"Stamp companies help nobody but their own fat purses and they should be willing to pay taxes on the business they do in Texas," Allen said.

Suspects Returned To Titus Co. Jail

Joseph N. Clark Jr., sentenced to three years on a plea of guilty at Baird for the burglary of a drug store in February, has been taken to the penitentiary. The sentence was to run concurrently with a similar sentence passed by the 76th District Court in Mount Pleasant for burglarizing two business houses in Talco last Jan. 13. Clark entered a plea of guilty.

Clark's companions, Jerry Johnson, Billy Joe Sewall, and Mary Valentine, have been returned to Titus County, where Johnson and Sewall are under indictment for the Talco burglary.

Subsequent to the apprehension of the quartet in West Texas in February they were brought to Titus County for arraignment on the Talco burglary. While in Titus County's jail awaiting to be returned to Callahan for arraignment there, Sewall and Johnson escaped and eluded law officers for more than 24 hours in one of the biggest manhunts in this area in recent years.

Farm Operations Are Underway

Farm operations, which have been at a standstill for some time because of wet weather, were resumed by farmers this week. Pretty spring like weather the past week dried out the soil and farmers are distributing fertilizer, planting corn, and other early grain crops. Cotton acreage is being prepared for planting of seed within a few weeks.

Seed planted in gardens several days ago, are coming up, and other vegetable and flower seed are being planted for an early crop.

Spring will officially arrive Saturday, March 21. Fruit trees are in bloom, trees are putting out, and grass is getting green, a good sign spring is here.

Hollingsworth & Travis Drill On Sam Harper Land

Hollingsworth and Travis of Longview, are drilling an oil test on the Sam Harper land, a mile and a half northeast of Talco business district. John B. Stephens of Mt. Pleasant, is doing the drilling and the proposed depth will test the Rodessa around 7200 feet, unless production is encountered in other sands.

Hollingsworth Brothers are said to own 3600 acres of mineral leases between the Talco field Paluxy production and Sulphur river and this well will test for sands encountered in other wells recently drilled.

Sam Harper of Talco, one of Titus County's oldest citizens, observed his 92nd birthday last Friday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. A. Davis, with whom he has made his home since he fell two years ago and broke his hip. He has been confined to his bed since that time, but is otherwise well and happy.

A pair of crutches was necessary for him to get about for several years prior to the accident. Upon numerous occasions The Talco Times man has seen him in town, riding a horse with a pair of crutches across the saddle

horn.

Samuel Robert Harper was born at Evergreen, Ala., March 13, 1867, and came to Texas with his parents, the late Dr. and Mrs. Samuel G. Harper, by steamboat—down the Mississippi, up the Red and through Big Cypress Bayou to Jefferson—when he was two years old.

The family homesteaded some land at old Marshall Springs near Mt. Pleasant, and Dr. Harper practiced medicine all through this area.

Sam Harper married Miss Sally Kirk at Marshall Springs, December 22, 1887, and they had

five children, one daughter, who married Guy Smelser of Bogata, died in 1947. The others, Gilbert Harper and Huie Harper, Mrs. J. A. Davis and Mrs. Maggie Barnard, all live in Talco, as do two of the Ben Morris' children, whom the Harpers reared as their own, after their parents died. Jim Morris and Howard Morris, with families of their own, remained here, their sisters living now in California.

Mr. Harper has one sister, Mrs. Harold Arnold, living in Mt. Pleasant.

Mrs. Harper passed away in 1939, but he continued to live in their original home until he fell and broke his hip. Mrs. Barnard who lives next door to Mrs. Davis, assists her sister in caring for their father.

In 1903, Sam Harper bought several hundred acres of land in this area. In 1912, when the Paris & Mt. Pleasant Railroad was completed through Talco, 13 acres of his land became the Talco townsite.

That year, he had built a nice home on the farm which had been cleared and cultivated by Ben Morris and family, Mr. Harper having settled them on the tract when he bought it. When the railroad was constructed, he cleared more land and built a number of rent houses, giving many men and their families work to do during the years.

Mr. Harper has never been lucky enough to get a producing oil well on his property, though he pooled 300 acres of his land to get the first one drilled in 1936. But he says he is going to live to see the day that he does get a producer, and he may do just that, because Hollingsworth Drilling Company moved a rig onto his farm last week to drill several wells.

Red River-Titus Accident Report

Rural traffic deaths increased rapidly in the Northeast Texas Highway Patrol District in February as compared with the same month in 1958. Eleven people were victims in February this year; whereas, seven were killed last year.

Traffic accidents in Red River County caused an economic loss of \$1,200.00 with no deaths, but three injured in February. The following breakdown of accidents included two property damage and two injuries.

Traffic accidents in Titus County caused an economic loss of \$530.00 with no deaths, but four injured in February. The Highway Patrol in District 1-B, Northeast Texas area contacted 5,084 motorists violating rules.

Traffic Accident Toll is Rising

Three persons were killed, five injured and \$1,450 in property damage estimated as the result of four automobile accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol during February in Lamar County.
