JOHN D. WRIGHT WILL PRODUCE SECOND RODEO AT 7-W RANCH

A parade in down-town Talco will open the second annual 7-W John D. Wright Rodeo on Wednesday afternoon of next week at 4:30 o'clock. All cowboys and cowgirls are invited to ride in this parade.

At 7:30 o'clock that evening the first performance of the 7-W Rodeo will get underway at arena, two miles south of Talco on U. S. Highway 271.

Again this year the Talco Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Rodeo Queen's contest. Talco merchants sponsor girls who will be judged as they appear in the rodeo arena and on Saturday night a Queen will be announced. Miss Barbara Grayson was last year's queen.

John D. Wright of Talco, is preparing for his second annual rodeo on his new 7-W Ranch on U. S. Highway 271, two and a half miles south of Talco on the south bank of White Oak creek.

It will be held four evenings, beginning at 7:30 o'clock on May 6-7-8-9. There will be bulldogging, Brahma bull riding, calf roping, bare-back riding and a ladies barrel race.

An added attraction will be a Children's Calf Scramble. Admission price will be \$1.00

for adults and 50 cents for children.

The show will be produced by Clyde Crenshaw of Broken Bow, Okla., who has a reputation of putting on good shows.

John D. Wright owns a substantial rodeo arena and grand stand, at his ranch. It is built largely of steel pipe and steel sheeting and is the best in this area.

Attention of the reader is directed to an advertisement in this edition regarding the rodeo.

Needless to say Talco folk are pulling for a successful affair with their second rodeo, and are behind it 100 per cent. They invite folk from neighboring towns to see all four of the shows. The price is very reasonable—\$1.00 and 50c.

Talco Chamber of Commerce and citizens generally are going "all out" to help John D. Wright make a success of his second rodeo, all four of the last days of next week.

The rodeo will open with a down town parade on Wednesday afternoon.

If the weatherman will be kind on rodeo dates, Talco should have a successful affair of its second rodeo. The first one last August was very successful.

A 16-year-old Detroit High sophomore, Shirley Ann Harris, remained in critical condition at Paris Tuesday following an accidental shooting at her home late Monday. The girl told doctors she was playing with a .22 rifle when it accidentally discharged.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Wills, with whom she makes her home on the Flying K Ranch near Kiomatia in Red River County, heard the gunshot and rushed into the house to find her slumped beside a divan.

She was taken by ambulance to a Paris hospital where she remained after surgery. The bullet went through her stomach and emerged from her back.

Two Men Wounded In Gun Battle At Wilkinson

Titus County law officials are investigating the shooting which occurred at the home of Jess Waldrum at Wilkinson community Friday night, which resulted in the wounding of Cotten Johnson and J. E. Wadrum, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Waldrum.

An argument between the two young neighbors erupted later into a gun battle.

Listed as in critical condition is J. E. (Mike) Waldrum, 22, from wounds received from at least two shotgun blasts, one at close range. Hospital officials said that he has a fair chance of recovery.

Also hospitalized was Charles (Cotton) Johnson, 21, with bullet wounds from a .32 caliber pistol fired by Waldrum's father, Jesse Waldrum, 65, who approached his son's home while the fight was in progress about 9 p. m. Friday.

Sheriff Alvis Redfearn said he did not know the motive of the fight.

According to preliminary investigation, he continued, Johnson and young Waldrum had an altercation at Johnson's home Friday afternoon. After nightfall Johnson, accompanied by Wesley Barnes, is said to have ambushed Waldrum at the latter's home where Johnson fired thru a window, with a 16-gauge shotgun, hitting Waldrum in the shoulder.

Subsequent events were not clear, Redfearn said, but it was thought Johnson then entered the house and pumped another shot into Waldrum's abdomen at close range.

At about that time, Jesse Waldrum, father of the wounded man, came up and grappled with Johnson for possession of Johnson's gun. In this tussle, the elder Waldrum twice wounded his son's assailant with a pistol, one shot hitting him in a shoulder and the other in an arm.

Johnson was released from the hospital Sunday. He was charged with assault with intent to murder and released under \$10,000 bond. Barnes, who Redfearn said claimed he went with Johnson to try to break up the trouble, also was charged with assault with intent to murder. He was released under \$3,500 bond, officers said.

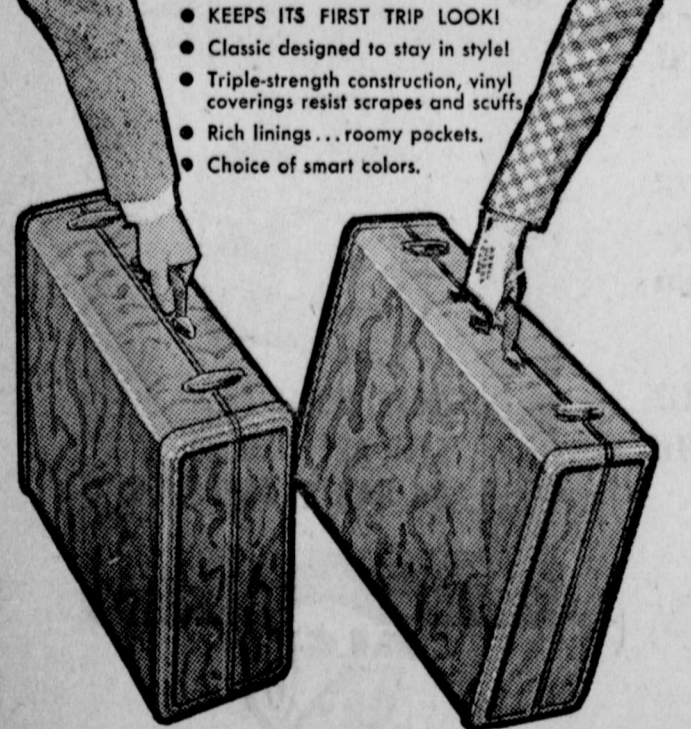

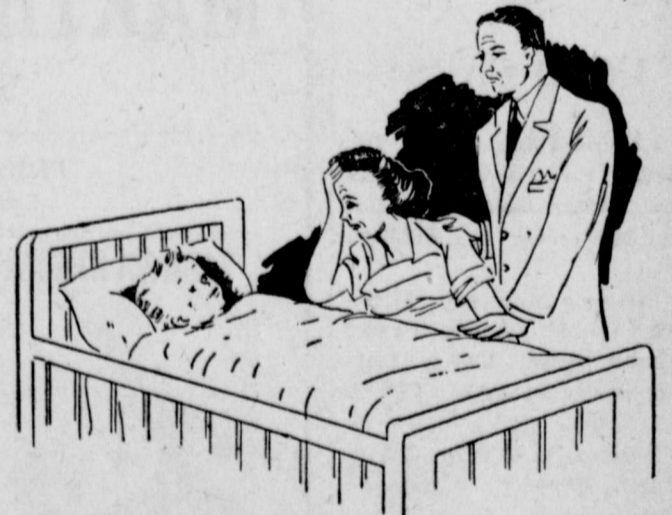

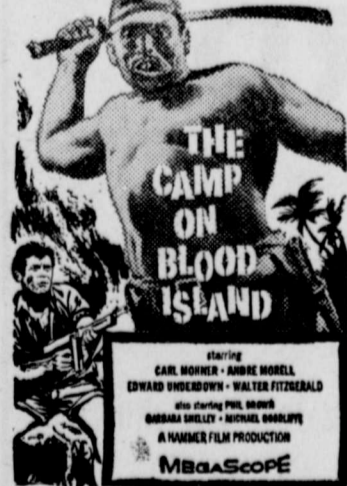
