New Transmission Lines Constructed From River Crest

This area is now set up for real electric service. Ice storms and other elements cannot affect electric service like it has in the past. Just completed is a high line of several large aluminum wires, with a steel wire for strength, extending from Texas Power and Light Company's River Crest generating plant to Talco, Bogata, Deport, Pattonville and thence north to where the Community Public Service Company's line ties into TPL's line running east from Paris to Clarksville, just south of Blossom and on into that town. TPL has just completed construction of a high line from River Crest, direct to Clarksville. A great transmission line was built from the plant to tie in at Sulphur Springs and another to Paris when the plant was built several years ago. Lone Star Gas Company's big 20-inch line into River Crest from the south also has a tie-in with the lines that serve Bogata, Fulbright, Deport, Clarksville, Detroit, Blossom and Paris. This area is fortunate to have such utilities with plenty of electricity and natural gas.

INSPECTORS CAPTURE 13 ILLICIT STILL

The Texas Liquor Control Board inspectors in April reported the seizure of 13 illicit stills. With the stills, which had a cubic capacity of 955 gallons, inspectors captured 1,565 gallons of mash and made five arrests. 15½ gallons of moonshine liquor were destroyed. One still was taken in Camp County, two in Harrison, two in Marion, two in Red River, five in Titus and one in Wood.

Two Drilling Rigs Moved to Talco by Hollingsworth

Hollingsworth is reported to be moving in two drilling rigs, one to the Colfee tract, south of the John D. Wright lake, and the other to a site east and north of the Trix-Liz field. Application for these wells had not been made to the Railroad Commission office at Mt. Pleasant at 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The Harper well, a mile and a half northeast of Talco, drilled by Hollingsworth, was given an acid treatment of 12,000 gallons at the 6320 foot level in Monday. Several sands were encountered in drilling this deep test. Results of the acid test should be known within two to three days.

Resume of School Work, Teachers, Employees Hired

In order to acquaint you with the direct facts concerning your school, we are listing here some information that we think you will be interested in, says W. R. Young, superintendent. The Talco School closed a successful school year on May 22, with 32 graduating Seniors and 31 Eighth Grade graduates. The graduates of Wilkerson school of eight students have made application to transfer to Talco. First graders due to enroll in the Talco school this fall are 18. The average daily attendance for 1958-59 term of school was 370.26. Of this number 8.53 were ineligible students from a neighboring district. This compares with 379.95 A. D. A. for the 1957-58 term of school. We had an enrollment of 387 at the end of school against 402 at the end of school last year. This means a loss of one teacher from A. D. A. Bus drivers and custodians for the coming year are Mr. Clark and Mr. Cunningham, Mr. Edgar Easterling, Mr. Green and Mr. Griffin. Mr. Charles Grissom has been offered a regular bus driver's place. This will be one less full time man for the coming year. Mrs. Cordel Alexander has been re-employed as head cook, along with Mrs. Zela Neugent, Mrs. Rachel Sain and Mrs. Dean Jagers.

Troy Griffin Dies Lubbock; Burial At Beaumont



Troy Griffin, veteran Texas newsman, was found dead in his bed Sunday at Lubbock.

Griffin was to have left town on his vacation a week ago, but a neighbor found his body Sunday. Peace Justice George McCleskey said death was from natural causes. Funeral service for Troy Truxton Griffin, 47, of Lubbock, was held Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Beaumont and interment in a cemetery there. Griffin, son of Mrs. Hugh Griffin of Deport, died at his home in Lubbock, his mother being notified of his passing late Sunday afternoon. Surviving besides his mother are his wife, two sons, Jerry Griffin of the U. S. Navy and stationed at Oceanside, Calif., and Charles Griffin of Beaumont, two sisters, Mrs. Robert Temple of Lubbock and Mrs. Boyd Bailey of Ft. Worth.

Deceased, son of Verna (Day) Griffin and the late Hugh Griffin, was born at Rugby Dec. 5, 1911. He was married to Miss Josephine McCulley of Brownwood on March 20, 1937. He graduated from Deport High School in 1929 and Hardin-Simmons, Abilene, in 1933 with a degree in journalism. He returned to Deport and was employed by The Deport Times and The Talco Times. He was editor of the latter newspaper for a year. He taught school at Big Spring in 1937, but returned to the newspaper field a short time later.

In 1941, Griffin worked for the Brownfield News and from 1942 to 1945 worked for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. He worked for newspapers in Columbus, Ga., and Birmingham, Ala., in 1946. From 1947 until 1956, he worked for the Beaumont Journal and was news editor there part of that time.

He returned to the Avalanche-Journal in 1957. He had been ill for some time. In 1953 Griffin won second award among Texas daily newspapers published in towns of over 50,000 people for the best

Sulphur River to Be Re-Channeled From Omaha to New Cooper Dam

Says the Naples Monitor: A new channel for Sulphur River will be dug all the way from near Lake Texarkana to the proposed new Cooper dam. The river bed will be realigned on the Highway 26 crossing north of Omaha to a point near Cooper. The new channel may be extended later further into the Lake Texarkana area but no definite plans have been made to do that yet. County Judge Carlton Robison said the project probably would start next January, according to information he had received from the Corps of Engineers office at New Orleans. The Corps of Engineers requested that Judge Robison acquire easements on property which will be affected by the project. Only four or five landowners in Morris County will be affected, Judge Robison said, because a part of the new channel will be in Bowie County in this area. The new channel, to be built

as a federal flood control project, will be almost straight and will be about 50 to 60 miles long. It will follow the present course of Sulphur River but will eliminate the curves, cutting across the present channel frequently where it will shorten the distance. Some appropriations have been made to get the work started and others are expected so actual construction can get underway in January. There were some unverified reports last week that dredging of the new channel already had been started on the western end. Work has not been started yet on Cooper dam but the project has been assured. Although the Corps of Engineers is interested only in the flood control benefits of the new channel, fishermen will find another advantage from it. The abandoned channel will form a series of small lakes similar to Thomases Lake and its possibilities are being described as a future "fisherman's paradise."

Warn Delinquent City Tax Payers

Talco City Commission has a statement in this edition, addressed to delinquent tax payers, informing them that penalty and costs will be removed from delinquent taxes due the city if paid in May or June. On July 1, 1959, all delinquent taxes due the City of Talco that have not been paid, will be turned over to the Talco City Attorney for collection by law. This will add not only the penalty provided by law, but cost of the law suit. They urge all who owe taxes to the City to make payment before July 1, 1959, and avoid this additional expense.

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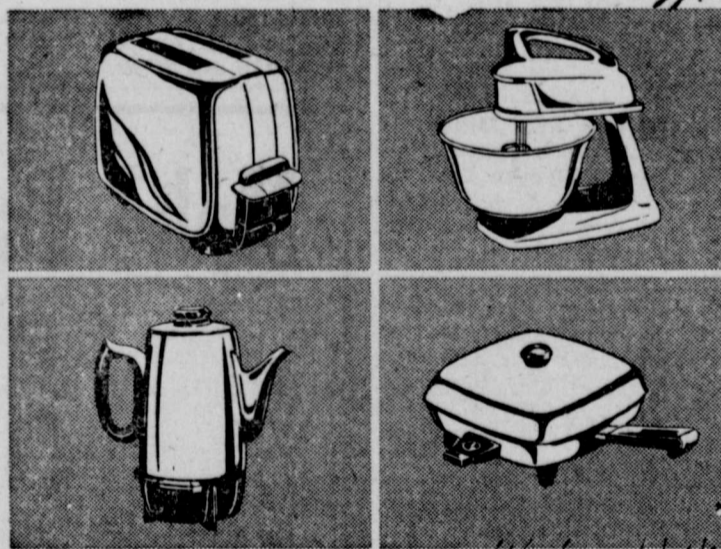
