Humble Sets Deep Try Talco Area

Humble Oil & Refining Company has added another Smackover lime exploration to its growing list in East Texas with a location in the Talco field area of North Titus County.

The new operation is No. 1 Blanche Gieger, a 12,000-foot project 1 1/2 miles northwest of Talco and about a mile north of Paluxy production in that field. Drill-site is on a 99.53-acre tract and 3,010 from the east and 3,000 from the south lines of John M. Nugent survey. The Talco area has seen prior Smackover testing.

In Red River County D. H. Morton, Bagwell, has filed to drill No. 1 W. H. Fisher as a 2,000-foot test three miles north and west of Bagwell. Site falls 550 from the north and 1,380 from the east lines of F. D. Eskridge survey, A-285. Nearest production would be in the shallow Bagwell pool southwest of that townsite.

The rigging is up and they expect to spud in Friday morning.

Cool Wave Drops Mercury to 55

Fall made an early visit to this section during the week end as a cool wave moved across the state sent mercury tumbling to a low of 55 degrees on Saturday. The mercury has dipped to the upper 50's and lower 60's several days. Fall, which officially begins on Sept. 22, is still a week away.

The cool snap moved in with scattered showers. Report official measurement was .05 of an inch, while north of Deport an unofficial one and a half inches were recorded.

4 Traffic Deaths In NET in August

Captain Glen Warner, Texas Highway Patrol, stated that four people were killed in rural traffic accidents in the northeast Texas Highway Patrol district during the month of August. The Highway Patrol investigated a total of 205 accidents during the month—137 of these were property damage, 65 personal injury and three fatal. The property damage was \$106,792 and 94 persons were injured. There has been sixty people killed in rural accidents in the district during the first eight months of 1960, as compared to ninety for the first eight months of 1959. This represents a 33 per cent reduction in traffic deaths from 1959.

Captain Warner stated that the Highway Patrol is very proud of the accident reduction so far this year, but warned that the heavy traffic months are still ahead. He stated that with school starting and heavy football traffic on the highways during the week ends, congestion and exposure to accidents would be greater. He further stated, however, that by careful observance to the traffic laws and by driving defensively, the accident trend could be continued to be reduced.

Steering Gear Goes Out; Truck Leaves Road

Travis Morgan of Bogata, escaped serious injury Friday afternoon when the Bogata Butane truck he was driving left the road, running into a fence. It was reported a faulty steering gear caused Morgan to lose control of the vehicle.

The accident occurred on Highway 271 between White Oak Creek and the John D. Wright cattle corrals. The truck was a complete wreck.

The truck overturned, tearing the butane tanks from the bed. Butane began escaping from a crack jarred in one of the tanks.

Morgan's steer-less vehicle caused another truck to go off the road on the opposite side near White Oak Creek.

A gasoline truck driven by Billy Ray House of Frankston, slipped from the highway and into a ditch when the driver applied his brakes on wet pavement to avoid the butane truck.

Mount Pleasant Fire Department was summoned because of the threat the butane might become ignited. Two firemen and Morgan opened up valves on the butane tanks to allow the highly-flammable gas to escape.

Traffic was held back several hundred feet from the wreckage as the valves were opened. Dispersion of the gas took several hours.

Morgan, who suffered only a slight cut on an arm, had filled up the truck earlier at Spring Hill. The mishap occurred at 3:30 p. m.
