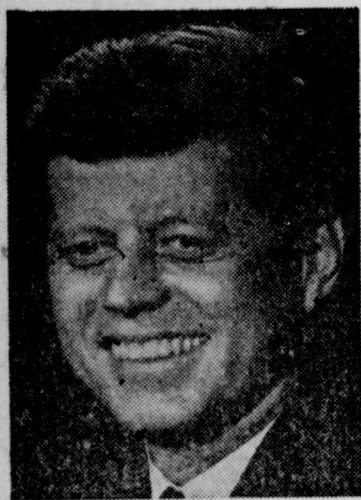

KENNEDY-JOHNSON DEMOCRATIC VICTORS IN PRESIDENTIAL RACE



The Democratic team of John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson Tuesday night won an exciting victory for the presidency and vice-presidency of the United States.

Kennedy's smashing victory over President Eisenhower's choice for a successor, Republican Vice-President Richard M. Nixon, means that the Democrats will return to full power in Washington to put through a promised liberal program. The Democrats will recapture the White House after eight years of Republican tenancy, and retain the control, they now have in the Congress.

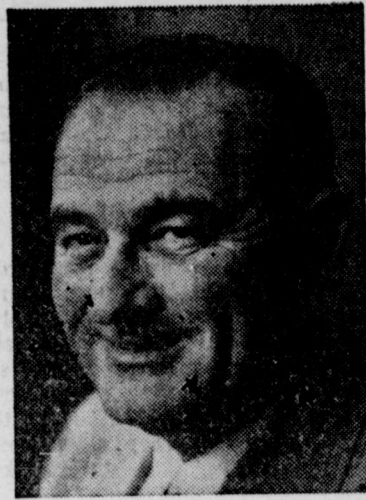
Kennedy's victory also proved that an American of Catholic faith can be elected to the highest office in the land.

Shortly before midnight, Kennedy was leading in 21 states with 325 electoral college votes, Nixon in 28 states with 198. It takes 269 electoral votes to win.

Riding the victory wave with Kennedy was his running mate, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, who would become the second man of his state to be vice-president.

Texas cast its 24 electoral votes, along with the nation for Democrats John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, returning Texas to the democratic fold for the first time since 1948.

Johnson was winning a substantial re-election victory for his third term in the United States Senate over Republican John G. Tower.

Talco gave Daniel 345 votes to 90 for Republican Steger for governor and gave Johnson 290 to Republican Tower's 131 for senator. In Titus County Daniel had 4035 to Steger's 918; Johnson 3335 to Tower's 1600.

All four amendments carried in Talco and Titus County.

Absentee voters favored Nixon, Daniel and Johnson.

Early returns also indicated Texans were re-electing all of their present congressmen — 21 Democrats and Republican Bruce Alger of Dallas.

All other state races were pretty much conceded to the Democrats. Early returns to the Texas Election Bureau indicated that was the prevailing mood of Texas voters, who turned out in record numbers to express their will at the ballot box.

Prior to reporting for active duty, the lieutenant attended the University of Texas to earn his master's degree in chemistry and math. He is a member of the American Chemical Society. Lt. Loving is married to the former Joyce Ann Richeson of Talco. They have one daughter, Phyllis, 2.

Titus Co. Collects \$172,366.87 Tax

Total gross collections for state, county, road and school taxes for the month of October was \$172,366.87, Titus County Tax Assessor-Collector Wallace Fields announced.

Included in this amount: state, \$32,273.48; county, \$89,607.12; road, \$23,052.05; common school tax, \$18,570.36; Chapel Hill Rural High School, \$2,971.66; Cookville School, \$2,234.79; Winfield School, \$2,657.41.

Discount allowed for October payment was (3 per cent) \$5,171.45. Gross collections \$172,366.87 of total assessed, \$226,336.87. Net collections were \$167,195.42.

Rural Carriers To Distribute Survey Cards

Rural mail carriers from the local post office will leave livestock survey cards along their routes, beginning Nov. 16.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," the postmaster explained.

In distributing the cards, rural carriers pick boxes at random along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," the postmaster said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the state's livestock holdings."

This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the post office and the agriculture departments since 1924.

Deer Season Opens Nov. 16 In Most Local Counties

Numerous hunters will take to the woods next week seeking to kill a deer as the season opens Wednesday, Nov. 16.

The season in Lamar County will be from Nov. 16 to Nov. 20 inclusive. In Red River County the season is Nov. 16 through Nov. 30, inclusive. In Franklin, Deita and Hopkins counties the season is Nov. 21 to Nov. 25, both days inclusive. Out of county hunters must register with the county clerk in these counties. Limit is one buck per season.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Sale of deer hides are permitted.

Parties are being formed for the season. Many will be hunting in Red River County northeast of Clarksville, where antlerless deer may be killed. Permits for the does were issued the first of the week to applicants who own land in the doe hunting area.

The area designated for doe hunting in Red River County during the 1960 season opening Nov. 16, will be the same as last year, according to John Carlisle, biologist in charge of the Northeast Texas game management area.

TALCO TROJANS WIN 56-22 OVER BOGATA BULLDOGS FRIDAY NITE

Talco Trojans romped over Bogata 56 to 22, in a game Friday night on the Bulldog field in Bogata.

The Bulldogs took the opening kickoff and moved for three straight first downs before the Talco line put the stopper on them and forced a punt. Trojan fullback Pete Dixon took the ball on first down and sprinted 70 yards before Skip Glover overhauled him on the Bogata 13-yard line. Three plays later Dixon carried for the touchdown from the 8-yard line. Johnny Gable went over for the extra points.

Virgil Jones zalloped 50 yards for the next Trojan marker. Try for points failed and score stood Talco 14, Bogata 0 through the first quarter.

Dixon's turn came again early in the second period. The speedy fullback went for 89 yards on a beautiful run to push the score to 20-0. Again the try for extra points was no good.

John Whitten was the big gun in the next Talco drive with a 29-yard gainer but Rodney Russell got the touchdown carrying over from the seven. Russell also went over his tackle slot for the extra points. The half ended with Talco leading 28 to 0.

The Trojans took the second half kickoff on their own fifteen and drove 85 yards to score with Russell going over from the 20, and Jones crashed over for the extra points to run the tally to 36-0.

The Bulldog offense came alive on the ensuing kickoff. They took the ball on their own 37 and Steve Wallace started the drive with a 25-yard scamper. Glover added more yardage including one 17 yard jaunt. The score came on a 15 yard pass from Glover to Wallace. Talco 36, Bogata 6.

Derrell Cabell, Trojan end gave the backs notice that they weren't the only ball carriers in the game as he took the kickoff and returned it all the way for 75 yards and a touchdown, and 42-6.

The Bulldogs pounced on a Trojan fumble on the second play of the final period. They drove to the 30 and Glover went over

the goal line from there only to have an offside penalty nullify the play. Glover got back 14 yards and Wallace ran the ball to the three yard line on a reverse. Glover scored the second Bulldog touchdown and Wallace added the extra points to bring the score to Talco 42, Bogata 14.

The Trojans came rushing back as Cabell again made a splendid kickoff return with a 48-yard run but a clipping penalty put the ball back to the Talco 26 yard line. The Trojans moved up to the 40 and then Russell came through the middle on a quick opener and sped sixty yards for the touchdown. Ronny Webb went over for the extra points to run the score to Talco 48, Bogata 14.

It was Russell again a few moments later on the identical play this time for 30 yards.

The Bulldogs hadn't given up and pulled a real old fashioned sneaker for the final score. Skip Glover trotted toward the sidelines with less than a minute to go in the ball game pretending he was leaving the field, he stopped just short of the side line, the ball was snapped and Donnie Screws passed perfectly for a 35-yard gainer and a touchdown. The try for points was good. Final Talco 56, Bogata 22.

Offensive stars were numerous with both coaches using plenty of reserves throughout the last three periods. As usual Talco's Dixon and Jones looked fine. Sophomore Rodney Russell gives the Trojan fans lots of hope for the next two years. Skip Glover was tops running, pass catching, heroic on defense for the Bulldogs, and in addition proved to be something of a passer when he took over for Quarterback Donnie Screws.

Screws, in spite of being crippled, still keeps opponents worried with his tremendous passing arm. Talco looked good all the way as they made a great team effort with everyone getting in. Talco will be host to Mt. Vernon Friday night, Nov. 11 for non Thursday night, Nov. 17 for the final conference game of the season.

ed. Booklets on the care of the

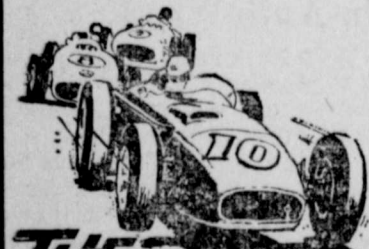
