## Hawaii is Great Melting Pot of Many Races

The world's sweet tooth helped make Hawaii, America's newest state, one of the greatest "melting pots" in the world.

When the first white man explored the islands in the late 1700's, Hawaiians numbered about 300,000. But civil wars and diseases brought from other lands slashed the native population.

With the growth of the sugar industry in the 1800's, the Islanders looked to other nations to supply the labor needed for plantations. Chinese were brought to the islands in 1852, followed by Polynesians from other South

Sea Islands, Japanese, Portuguese, Germans, Italians, Spaniards, Puerto Ricans, Koreans, Filipinos, Russians and Poles.

Today there are only about 12,000 full Hawaiians and some 80,000 part-Hawaiians among the 600,000 Islanders.

Here is a breakdown of the Hawaiian population:

- Japanese ..... 40%
- Part Hawaiian ..... 17%
- Caucasian ..... 15%
- Filipino ..... 13%
- Chinese ..... 7%
- Full Hawaiian ..... 3%
- Puerto Rican ..... 2%
- Korean ..... 1%
- Others ..... 2%

Rev. Solum will start his new work the first of the year but may continue to serve the Bogata church thru January.

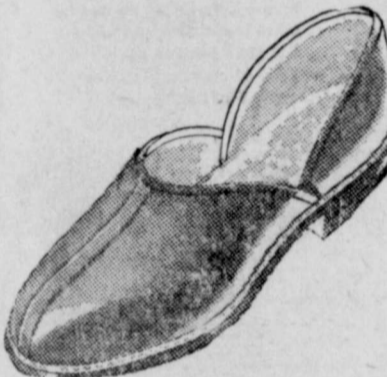

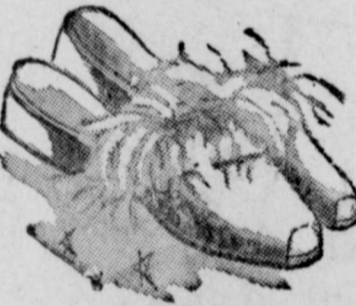
