

34 cup granulated sugar
45 cup firmly packed brown
5 sugar
5 cups (two No. 2 cans)
6 canned sliced apples
74 cup chopped pecans
75 cup chopped pecans
76 cup orange juice
77 teaspoon salt
78 2 teaspoons grated orange rind

3/4 cup granulated sugar 3/4 cup firmly packed brown teaspoon salt teaspoon cinnamon

2 tablespoons butter Pastry for one-crust pie

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg Combine tapioca, sugars, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, apples, pecans, and orange juice and rind. Turn mixture into deep 8-inch square baking dish. Dot with butter. Let stand about 15 minutes. Roll pastry ½ inch thick and cut several 2-inch slits or a fancy design near center. Fold pastry in half or roll loosely on rolling pin; center on filling. Open slits with a knife. (Well-opened slits are important to permit escape of steam during baking.) Trim pastry, allowing it to extend ½ inch over rim. Fold pastry over edge of dish and press it to rim. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 45 minutes, or until syrup boils with heavy bubbles that do not burst. Serve warm. Makes 8 or 9 servings.


