

4875 BALES WEIGHED

Public Weigher, E. L. Northcutt reports a total of 4875 bales of cotton weighed at the local yard up to Wednesday night, October 25th. compared with 4241 on the same date last year. This is more than six hundred

bales ahead of last season, but Mr. Northeutt believes that two-thirds of the cotton in Haskell county has already been through the gin, and that the total yard receipts will not ex ceed 7,500 bales.

This will be below last year's re ceipts, but it is believed that the difference in price will more than make up for the shortage in the yield.




