ADVISES TO SECURE

GOOD PLANTING SEED

In a communication to the Free Press M. A .Clifton has the following to say regarding another way to help win

"This is one year that there should not be a vacant piece of ground to go uncultivated in the United States, and it is time that we were thinking about 28th, and continuing until September the kind of seed that we should use. I especially wish to say to the farmersnow is your opportune time to get your seed for planting. All seeds are going to be high but there is no hope for them to go lower before another crep is made, and I am fearful that if we should fail to get a stand on the first planting, there will not be any seed available for replanting. I think that the first crops for us to plant should be oats, feterita, surghum or maise.

Ten years ago, almost every farmer in the country had a stack of surghum, maise, kaffir corn or millet in his lot at this time of the year-surghum seed was then from 40 to 75 cents per bushel -but everybody's stock was in good condition—they had plenty of milk, butter, chickens and eggs. What is the trouble today? Almost every farmer will say, no rain. Of course the year of 1917 was very dry, but we could have had plenty of surghum and hay if we had planted early enough and of the right variety. The writer has been farming in Haskell county since 1889, and the time has never been that Early Amber cane, in fact many varieties for that matter, planted early would fail to make good feed.

One great mistake we have made during the past few years is that we depend too much on cotton and wheat. Don't think for a moment that I advise against the planting of these crops, but we should diversify. As I have already said get your seed as soon as possible and get good seed that will germinate. With inferior seed you not only lose your seed and work but often times lose a crop on account of not having time to replant owing to our short seasons. Too much stress cannot be placed on good seed.

Judge Smith informs us that he has today collected the 1918 interest from the sale of the County school land, which when apportioned will run each school in this county about one month longer. The schools of the county are certainly under obligations to Judge Smith for his untiring efforts in handling the school land as he has. Eight years ago, the schools only received 3 cents per acre income from this land. It was afterwards leased at 7 cents per acre, and then sold at \$10.00 per acre with 5 per cent interest. It became necesary to take the land back and resell it. In March, 1917, it was sold again for \$10 per acre with 5 per cent interest and the Judge has collected and placed in to the school funds of the county something over \$43,000 within the last four years, and now Haskell county has the third largest permanent school fund of any county in Texas. We have \$177,720.00 worth of vendor's lien notes drawing 5 per cent interest.

INTEREST GROWING IN SCHOOL CONTESTS

Interest in the contests of the University Interscholastic League continues to grow. About 15 schools in the county have sent in their enrollment fee to Mr. E. D. Shurter, manager of the League at Austin.

The following schools enrolled the past week: Haskell High School, Has-Gauntt school, New Mid. Whitman, Rose, and Weinert. At least 30 schools are expected to enroll in the county.

A special effort is being made to get the girls of the schools interested in the athletic contests for girls. These contests embrace the following: Potatoe race, 30 yard dash, 140 yard relay, basket ball throw for distance, base ball throw for accuracy, and the standing broad jump. Handsome prizes are being offered in all these events, for instance, one of the merchants in Haskell will give a \$5.00 pair of shoes to the girl under 15 who throws the basket ball the farthest.





Canned Jack Rabbit.-For 50 pounds dressed rabbit, use 1 pound of salt, 2 oz. black pepper, 1-4 oz. of cloves, 1-2 oz. of cinnamon, 1-2 oz. cayenne pepper. Cut up the rabbit and boil one hour or until tender. Tie the spices in a bag and boil with the meat. Remove the bones and pack the meat in cans within one-half inch of the top; fill in with boiling water. Cap. tip and cook for 60 minutes under 15 lbs pressure in a steam canner.

Potted Jack Rabbit .-- To 50 pounds of dressed rabbit, use 10 pounds of fat Mr. Cousin, who has moved to the pork, 3 pounds of onions, 1-2 pound of country has been recently called to the salt, 14 h white pepper. 

An Ordinance Fixing the Amount to be Paid the Officers of the City of Haskell for their Services during the Next Regular Term :-

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Haskell.

ARTICLE 1.

The Mayor shall receive for his ser vices for each case disposed of in the Corporation Court by plea of guilty or by conviction, two dollars for each case, which amount shall be paid out of the Judicial fund; and he shall also receive an ex-officio salary of \$100.00 per year to be paid by the city in quarterly payments of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) each.

ARTICLE 2

The City Treasurer shall receive for his services one per cent of all moneys belonging to the city disbursed by him: one hundred fifty dollars per year; and in addition to said fees, he shall receive an ex-officio salary of eighty dollars per year to be paid by the city in quarterly payments of \$20.00 each. ARTICLE 3

The City Secretary shall receive for his services such fees are are allowed by law and by the city ordinances. ARTICLE 4

The City Assessor and Collector shall receive for his services Twenty-five dollars per month to be paid by the city monthly.

ARTICLE 5

The City Attorney shall receive for his services for prosecutng all violations of any State law or City Ordin-County Attorneys for similar services under the Statutes of the State.

ARTICLE 6

to such fees shall receive an ex-officio salary of \$60.00 per month to be r by the city monthly.


