W. T. Ford a Successful Farmer

Five years ago Mr. W. T. Ford of the Pleasant View community was farming on the line of the old time West Texas farmer. D. 1919, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2391, wherein Reynolds Mortgage Company is plaintiff and J. W. Gardner, J. I. Clark, Administrator of the estate of S. E. Gardner, deceased, Claudia Clark, Dolrous Clark, Andrie Clark, Chester Clark and Clinton Clark, minors, are defendants. The nature of the plaintiffs demand being as follows to-wit:

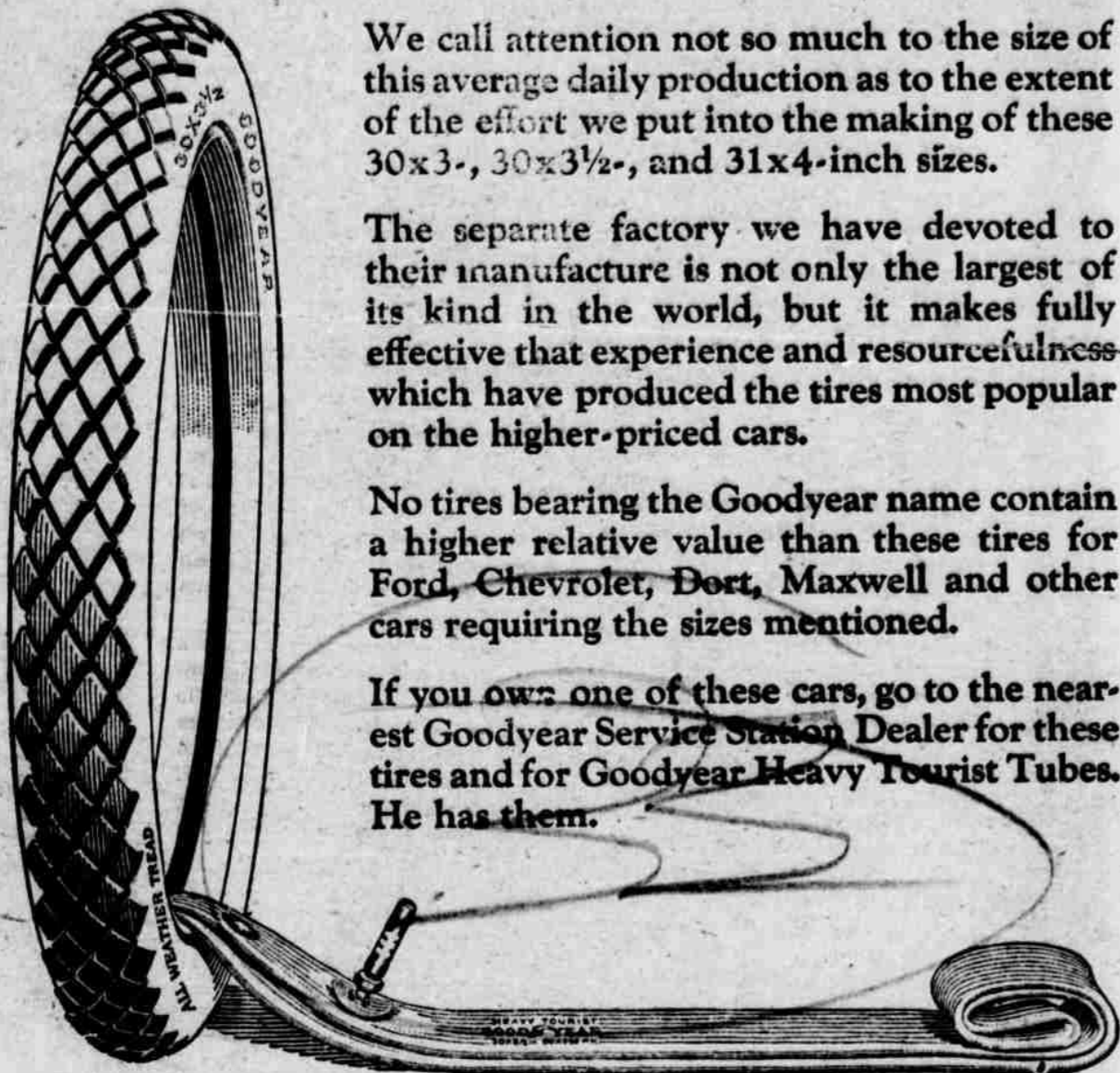

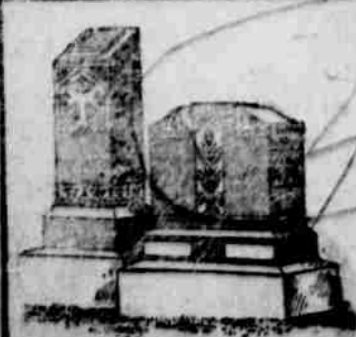

Reduce the Cotton Acreage Automatically by Planting Other Crops

We must remind our readers of the dangers of one crop. The boll weevil was the biggest blessing the South ever received, though individually he wrought many hardships. We favor a limited cotton acreage, but not too limited. We want to see the South produce a 14,000,000 bale crop of cotton. If this is done it will be about the extreme limit, unless we shall have another freak crop; and by the way, we have had only four freak crops in 20 years—those of 1904, 1907, 1911 and 1914. The public seems to be obsessed with the idea that a crop around 12,000,000 bales is a freakishly small crop. The past twenty years demonstrates that a crop of 12,000,000 bales or less is rather the rule than the exception. If we make a 14,000,000-bale crop every bale will be needed at present prices or better, and they will obtain if the crop is sold judiciously, as the South is beginning to understand how to sell and has the means to hold.

We rather discourage any concert of action to limit the cotton acreage. We are of the opinion that when ample feed and food is raised on the farm it will automatically reduce the cotton acreage to a limit which will require intensive cultivation and ideal seasons both to cultivate and harvest to produce 14,000,000 gin-run bales. In fact we do not believe that the labor is available to produce a crop over 14,000,000 bales, even if the boll weevil and other insects did not work steadily at the job.

As time goes on it appears that insects, like many human beings, have appetites satiable only upon the most expensive foods, and cotton at 30c to 40c looks good to the epicurean insect.

The world needs a fourteen million bale crop and we must not be too overzealous in our efforts to limit the acreage lest we repeat the disaster of last year. No one has a monopoly of all the wisdom in the world and no one can tell what will happen to the crop between this and picking time. It is manifest by the price of October cotton that a crop of fourteen million bales, as then some, has been abundantly discounted, and anything short of this amount—or even this amount—will result in higher prices. If our farmers will raise their meat and bread and ample grain, hay, potatoes and peas and peanuts or velvet beans, we need not worry about the surplus of cotton they may also raise and gather—and by the way, we want to see them have both the weather for proper harvesting and then take care of their cotton after they get it from the gin.

We want to add in passing that the American Cotton Association seems to be going a long way in the right direction in securing ample warehouse facilities and proper selling systems to enable the farmers to store their cotton and to sell as the market justifies or to hold when the market demands holding. We have both periods, and this paper will promise now to advise its readers faithfully as it has always done, when to hold and to sell. We may not always be correct but we refer to the advice we have given in the past two years. Nuf Sed.—Cotton and Cotton Oil News.
