Car Crash Kills Worthey Baby

A grinding two-car wreck 3 Fitzhugh Avenue and Clement Road, Paris, late Sundway result ed in two inujries and death of an unborn infant.

Mrs. Susan Worthey, 20 of Paris was enroute to McCuistion Hospital with an expected child and continued there by emergency ambulance. Reports said doctors could find no sign of life from the infant when the woman

Her mother, Mrs. Carl Hatch er of Rt. 3, Paris, was identified as driver of a 1964 Dodge. She was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital suffering multiple cuts, bruises, rib fractures and back discomfort.

Kenneth Pitcock, 16, of Paris, driving a 1963 Ford received a minor leg injury, according to police.

Investigating Patrolman Leo Ritchey explained Pitcock was traveling west on Clement Road, when Mrs. Hatcher's auto, northbound on Fitzhugh Avenue, was struck broadside as she attempted to cross the intersection.

Two ambulances were required to move the victims. And again, rescue efforts were complicated by scores of disrespct ful sightseers who flocked to the ene. One man fainted after moving closer to observe attendants performing first aid.

Funeral arrangements for the infant boy, pronounced dead at birth about 12:30 a. m. Monday, were pending at Fry & Gibbs Funeral Home, awaiting arrival of the baby's father, Pvt. Todd Worthey, stationed with the U. S .Marine Corps at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Farmers Receive

Early Payments

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain. and cotton programs are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to Clyde Mitchell, Chairman of the Red River County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

The first batch of payments were made beginning July 1. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers. certify compliance with program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

"Because of the excellent cooperation between farmers and their local ASCS office, 35 per cent of the participating preducers in Red River County will receive their payments during July," Mitchell said.

Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisons.




