DEPORT CREEK RECEIVES FIRST PRIORITY FLOOD CONTROL PLAN

The State Soil and Water Conservation Board has granted priority for flood detention work on Deport Creek, authorizing the structures and channeling as soon as engineers and money are available.

The priority was the first granted by the state board this year, and promises a solution for the flooding problems that have troubled the City of Deport for nearly a century.

Albert Roach of Paris, a member of the State Soil and Water Board called Tom Jeffus of Deport from the office of State Senator A. M. Aikin Jr., on Friday and announced the priority following a board meeting in Austin.

The state board was in Deport on July 2 for a hearing on the Deport Creek problem. What they saw and heard here, along with preliminary engineering inspections which found the project to be feasible, resulted in granting of the early priority.

Engineering will be done as soon as state soil and water engineers can get to it. They have a years work already program-

med but will try to work the smaller Deport project in as soon as possible. Following the engineering, the date of construction will depend upon financing made available by Congress.

Mr. Roach and Sen. Aikin have "carried the ball" for the Deport Creek project and have the thanks of everyone for their efforts in securing the early priority ahead of scores of others over the state.

This good news follows many years of frustrating efforts, hard work and planning by the creek committees of Deport Chamber of Commerce and many years of attending Red River Valley Association meetings, many years of cleaning, dredging and cutting of willows and growth in an effort to speed the flow of water thru the business district of Deport to avoid water damage; many years of rushing down town at night and lifting merchandise and electrical equipment out of high water level and barricading doors and sweeping water and mud from buildings after the flooding. The Soil Conservation plan will eliminate all of this.
