### Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

First Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

WITH THE POWER TO IS-SUE SUBPOENAS now firmly and specifically authorized, our Banking and Currency Committee will forge ahead rapidly to develop the complex relationships among the Big Banks and the bankrupt seven-billion dollar Penn Central Transportation Company. Specifically listed in the subpoena authorization are 74 of the nation's biggest financial institutions. Investigation continues.

NATIONAL CREDIT UNION BANK - Last week I introduced legislation that will hopefully be a stimulus to the credit unions of the nation, giving them flexibility, a means of improving liquidity and a stabilty which will be a direct benefit to the flow of credit in our nation. The legislation to create a National Credit Union Bank would (1) make loans to member credit unions; (2) discount notes of credit unions; (3) provide national inter-lending service for credit unions; (4) sell its own certificates of indebtedness in the open market to secure additional funds for its operations and (5) help in the orderly liquidation of solvent credit unions - credit unions forced to close because of plant or military base closings, or similar situations beyond the control of the credit union. I am proud to have been the co-author of the original Federal Credit Union Act of 1934 and all succeding legislation to assist the growth of the nation's nearly 24,000 credit unions - most of whose 22 million members are in the lower to middle income brackets.

JOBS FOR VIETNAM VETER-ANS. The Veterans Administion is actively recruiting Vietnam veterans who have medical experience of almost any kind to fill hospital staff vacancies. Almost 6,000 veterans with medica! skills were hired by VA facilities during 1968 and 1969, and a substantial number of additional employees are needed. RESERVE OFFICER TRAIN-ING CORPS. While there has been considerable publicity with regard to student revolts against OTC operations on the campus, only thret educational institutions are actually discontinuing the program this year. On the other hand, more than 40 colleges and universities have applied to initiate an ROTC program. This is another case of an over-loud minority attempting to sound like the entire student body. It seems that the present college generation has a lot more sense than some people thought.

REMEMBERED HISTORY. When General Robert E. Lee cleared Virginia of Federal troops it was good strategy to invade the North, and so he did, leading to the high water mark of the Confederacy at Gettysburg. But the diplomatic consequences of this seeming switch - from defending the Southland to invading the North - were grave indeed, and perhaps this was the deciding factor against recognition of the southern cause by England and the other European nations. It is well to remember the lessons of the past when considering situations that confront us today.

YOUNG MEN interested in attending one of our great Service Academies: West Point, Annapolis, Air Force, Merchant Marine, or Coast Guard, should make their wishes known to me as soon as possible so that they can be provided with the necessary information.

HELICOPTERS SAVE LIVES. The use of helicopter ambulances has helped cut the death rate per 1,000 wounded from 4.5 in World War II to 2.3 in Vietnam. The U. S. Department of Transportation has started a program in San Antonio to test this same high-speed medical evacuation service in civilian emergencies. A few minutes can make the difference between life and death for victims of auto and other accidents or the severely ill, and helicopter ambulance service could be especially important in

Austin. - Eighteen-year-olds will be registered to vote in Texas this year unless the U.S. Supreme Court, in the meantime. invalidates the new federal voting rights act.

State officials plan to give federal authorities this assurance in reply to an inquiry of U. S. Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell asking all governors to report on steps they will take to comply with the new provisions and other sections of the federal bill effective January 1.

Texas, reportedly, already is in compliance with the act, except for the lowered voting age. This state has no literacy test and 'good character" requirements for election participation such as those outlawed by a bill signed into law by President Nixon on June 22.

When the Texas voter-registration period opens on October 1, 18-year-olds will be signed up if the expected court test is not settled by then. Local registration officials will be advised by state election authorities to register them pending a court de-

According to election division director Randall Wood the Secretary of State's office proposes to suggest that teen-age registrations be kept separately from those of voters 21 and above. This would simplify subsequent invalidation in the event the Supreme Court should rule the federal act unconstitutional after state registration already is un-

The priority was the first granted by the state board this year, and promises a solution for the flooding problems that have troubled the City of Deport for nearly a century.

Albert Roach of Paris, a member of the State Soil and Water Board called Tom Jeffus of Deport from the office of State Senator A. M. Aikin Jr., on Friday and announced the priority following a board meeting in Austin. The state board was in Deport


