
M. H. Brasher of Abilene has recently been elected Superintendent of Haskell City schools for the year of 1922-23



With the coming of Mississippi river marks the grave of Hernando De Soto, the discoverer of that stream, is an unsettled one. Arkansas City and Helena, Ark., Rosedale and Greenville, Miss., river towns, have had a four-cornered controversy over the question. Citizens of Helena contend that the Spanish explorer was given a watery grave in the river he discovered at a point just opposite Helena. Arkansas City produces historical data tending to show that De Soto's funeral ceremony was said at a point opposite that city and close to the junction of the Mississippi and White rivers. Rosedale and Greentille have produced evidence in support of their respective claims. So about the only answer one can give in assurance that it will not be disputed is that De Soto's grave is somewhere in the Mississippi between Memphis, Tenn., and Greenville, Miss.

### . Gold Mines In Ancient Graves.

The latest method of gold mining is grave robbing. Modern Indians of western South America have discovered that buried in the mounds that contain the skeletons of their ancient ancestors there also can be found gold -trinkets. They burrow into these, claim the trinkets as an inheritance and melt these priceless relics of America's wonderful pre-Columbian civilization into gold of commerce.

Archeologists of the bureau of American ethnology of the Smithsonian institution declare that such practices are destroying forever the early history of South American Indians.

Large images of gold and silver were made by the prehistoric goldsmiths. The records of the early Spanish explorers are filled with descriptions of these - golden articles, some of which were as large as cart wheels.


### Fearful and Wonderful Combination **Recommended for the Treatment** of Gunshot Wounds.

And the London Pharmacopoels for the year 1659 contained a recipe for "dog oil," with the following ingredients: "Sallet oyl, two puggy dogs newly whelped, earthworms washed in white wine and cypress turpentine and spirit of wine."-Exchange.





He has taken the pictures and shown, by drawing lines and angles on them, how the artists gave their compositions strictly mathematical foundations. Ancient Egyptian artists had a rule

of proportions based on the length of the middle finger, the distance of which was contained nineteen times in the length of the whole body.

Greek artists adopted these proportions until it was established that the face must be a tenth part and the head an eighth part of the total height of the body. The face was divided into three equal parts-from the roots of the hair to the root of the nose; from the root of the nose to its point, and from the end of the nose to the chin.

Most of us have, or have had, a tendency to be lazy about thinking. That, in itself, is not dangerous; a tendency can be overcome if we are interested in overcoming it. The leaves themselves are brilliant green, and are very large. In sutum they turn a gorgeous garnet red, while where the lovely spring blossoms were appear clusters of apple-shaped berries blackish crimson in hue. So you see the hobblebush, despite its queer name and strange habits, is really very beau tiful almost the whole year round .-Christian Science Monitor.

### Proceedings Against Beetles. The "Memoires de la Societe Royal Academique de Savole" give a curlous account of proceedings taken against beetles in 1445 and 1487. 



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
