## Chas. Dannheim Serious Condition

Charles Dannheim, critically burned August 18 in an electrical accident at his home on Rt. 1, Clarksville, remains in serious condition at the Burn Center in Parkland Hospital, Dallas, according to information received by friends here. Surgery has been completed to remove both legs below the knee and the right arm between the shoulder and elbow. A portion of the left hand has also been amputated, with further surgery perhaps scheduled.

Dannheim is expected to remain in the intensive care unit of the hospital for at least a month or six weeks longer. He received the electrical shock when a television antenna he was mounting at his mobile home was blown against a 7200-volt transmission line.

He is the husband of Mrs. Beth Dannheim, who became the Home Demonstration Agent in Red River County on June 1. The couple was married last November, and Dannheim had planned to enter East Texas State University in the fall semester.

Since the couple had recently transferred to the area, Dannheim had no insurance in effect at the time of the accident. A fund has been started by local friends to assist the family with medical expenses. ## Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

"Heart of the Gulf Southwest" First Congressional Dist. of Texas

THE PRESIDENT JUST DIDN'T TAKE TIME TO THINK about those recent vetoes. As a result some very essential programs — so important to the First District of Texas — are greatly endangered. I was really shocked when I learned that the President had vetoed \$105 million in funds to provide badly needed medical treatment for our returning veterans from the war in Vietnam. The VA hospitals are in desperate straits and it just isn't right to shortchange the boys we have sent off to war. I have supported the President fully in his request for funds to provide guns, bombs, tanks and other equipment to fight the war in Southeast Asia, but I cannot go along with him when he decides our youth who are fighting this war should not have the very best medical treatment this country can provide.

THE BIG BANKERS are quick to deny that high interest rates have anything to do with their profits. Last year, when I investigated the tremendous increases in the prime lending rate, the bankers assured me they had taken this action only for the "good of the country" and that bank earnings didn't have a thing to do with it. Now the Federal Reserve Board — which isn't known for its criticism of the big banks — has come up with a detailed study that establishes that virtually all of the swollen bank profits in 1969 — the biggest year in history for the New York banks — can be traced directly to the increases in interest rates. High interest rates earn higher bank profits and higher costs to the American people — that's the message from the Federal Reserve study.

HIGH INTEREST RATES mean higher prices, and that IS inflation.

WIDOWS OF VETERANS who lost their compensation or pension payments because of remarriage — and whose second marriage has ended — may again be entitled to benefits under a law recently passed by the Congress. Public Law 91-376 provides that the widow's benefits can be reinstated if she furnishes evidence (death or divorce certificate) that second marriage has been dissolved. Of course, widows who were receiving non-service-connected pension payments would still have to meet the income requirements. Although this change in the law does not become effective until January 1971, eligible widows will want to submit the death or divorce certificate to the VA prior to January so that benefits will not be delayed.

A FAIR DEAL FOR DISABLED VETERANS AND FORMER PRISONERS OF WAR. This same law (PL 91-376) also increases veterans compensation for service-connected disabilities by from 8% to 12% (depending upon disability rating) retroactive to July 1, 1970. Totally disabled veterans will receive the full 12% increase. In addition, the law benefits former prisoners of war, any of whom are unable to qualify for disability payments under existing statutes. Under the new law, certain disabilities and illnesses suffered by former American servicemen who were held as prisoners for more than 6 months by Japan, Germany, North Korea, or North Vietnam are presumed to be service-connected for compensation purposes.

Austin. — A legislative committee is sampling recommendations for sweeping court reforms, including creation of judicial system administrators with authority to send judges wherever they are needed.

Judicial section of the State Bar will detail its proposals at an October meeting in Galveston. Judges and practicing attorneys gave the House judiciary sub-committee, at a hearing in the capitol, their ideas for improving and speeding up court machinery.

Sample recommendations include:

- Strong court administration, including authority to ignore present district lines in assigning judges to duty where the action is.
- Giving 14 Courts of Civil Appeals power to handle intermediate appeals of criminal, as well as civil, cases to ease load on overworked Court of Criminal Appeals, which now receives appeals direct from district courts all over the state).
- Creation of a "unified" court system (a variety of plans have been suggested) to insure an even work load on courts, again by shifting judges to areas where dockets are overloaded.
- Automatic judicial redistricting by a five-member board if the Legislature refuses to do the job.
- Removing judges from politics.
- Stiffer fines and jail sentences for contempt of court to help prevent court disruptions like those which have shocked the nation in recent months.
- Simplification of the judicial article of the state constitution so the Legislature can make necessary changes without having to submit constitutional amendments.

"The climate for judicial reform was never so good," Supreme Court Associate Justice Jack Pope told the committee members. "But if reform is passed up this session of the Legislature, it may be too late."

OIL ALLOWABLE RECORD—Texas Railroad Commission boosted the oil allowable for September to 79.9 per cent of potential — highest level since October 1951.

Order is seen as likely to boom production higher than during the Arab-Israeli war in 1967.

Chairman Ben Ramsey noted that the Commission's staff report warned the higher factor could cause pollution, wasting of gas and pipeline bottlenecks in some areas.

A major oil company spokesman said Texas crude oil stocks are down 4.5 million barrels from 1969. A rapid decline in imported oil was noted.

September allowable would provide for a maximum daily production of 4,166,870 barrels, although actual production is estimated at 3,409,000 barrels a day. Latter is just under the written nominations of major purchasers for 3,428,395 barrels of crude daily. Production in August at 70 per cent factor was estimated at 3,310,000.

MERCURY RULES URGED—Texas Water Quality Board has been urged to adopt tougher mercury discharge limits or outlaw discharges outright.

A Federal Water Quality Administration official and a top Texas Parks and Wildlife Administrator recommended even tighter controls on mercury and other heavy metals than proposed by the Board.

Spokesmen for Diamon-Shamrock Chemical Company and American Smelting and Refining Company, on the other hand, argued that the proposed five parts per billion mercury discharge level is beyond their capacity. They called for a delay in adoption of the standards.

Federal officials took exception to the state Board's order which said there is no evidence of public health hazard from heavy metals contamination in Texas. He pointed to mercury found in industrial discharges, coastal waters and in certain species of salt water fish and shell fish. He noted, in particular, industrial waste along the Houston ship channel and in Lavaca Bay.

WELFARE REGION ESTABLISHED — A new State Department of Public Welfare region serving six South Texas counties will go into operation on September 1 with headquarters in Laredo.

M. J. Raymond Jr. will serve as regional administrator for all department programs in Webb, Duval, Jim Wells, Jim Hogg, Zapata and Starr Counties. Counties previously were part of a larger region. Department now has a 17-region setup.

COURTS SPEAK—U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals denied Texas' appeal on who has jurisdiction in a Padre Island buried treasure case. U. S. District Judge Reynaldo Garza of Brownsville had held on June 12 that he could take jurisdiction in the dispute over ownership of the recovered artifacts. State wants the articles. So does Platono Ltd., the Gary Ind., salvage firm which recovered them.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin filed a triple damage, anti-trust suits against three big drug firms, accusing them of conspiracy in restraint of trade leading to a monopoly in Ampicillin and other synthetic penicillins.

State's request for lifting an injunction against enforcing the private bottle club guest rule has been delayed until September 30 by the Austin District Court.

Meanwhile, the chairman of the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, Tom Gordon of Abilene, said ABC would be in contempt of court if it tries to crackdown with "Rule 56."

Bottle clubs said they will appeal the top state court rule which upholds the U. S. Supreme Court ruling.

William Steger of Tyler announced his candidacy for reelection as State Republican chairman at the September 15 state convention in Dallas.

Governor Smith has recommended that the federal government take over the entire cost of welfare programs in states.

Duck season, which opens Nov. 4, is the most generous in 25 years, having been extended from 55 to 70 days, with a bag limit of 10.

State agencies have agreed on formal program for cooperation in civil defense matters.

## Talco - Bogata School District Budget Adopted

The Talco-Bogata School District budget for 1970-71, adopted last week by the school board after a public hearing session, will be financed without a tax increase according to Superintendent of Schools, Talmadge Morgan.

The school board approved the budget after the public hearing and after having had the opportunity to make a thorough study of the budget. The 1970-71 budget calls for total expenditures of \$682,786.00 as compared to \$653,780.00 for the previous year.

Morgan said that the 1970-71 budget, even though greater than the previous year's budget, would be financed without a tax rate increase because of a number of deletions and adjustments in the school program. Two less teachers have been employed at Rivercrest High School, the cafeteria staff has been reduced, and approximately \$30,000.00 budgeted in the previous year's budget for work on athletic facilities at Rivercrest was not budgeted in the 1970-71 budget. Also, funds from a small surplus that had accrued in the Interest & Sinking Fund will be used to help meet debt service.

Major budget items for the coming year are: Administration — \$38,000; Instruction — \$406,500; Attendance Services — \$7,820; Pupil Transportation — \$32,800; Operation of Plant — \$49,750; Maintenance of plant — \$17,850; Fixed Charges — \$9,000; Food Services — \$1,500; Student Body Activities — \$5,500; Capital Outlay — \$47,000; Debt Service — \$58,000; Outgoing Transfers — \$8,524.

A tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation (same as the previous year) was approved with \$1.25 of this amount designated for maintenance & operation and \$.25 for debt service. The estimated tax values for school purposes for the coming year is \$22,000,000 based on one-half actual values.

Local values will produce a tax revenue estimated to be \$317,500. Other sources of revenue from the state for school operations are estimated to be \$85,000 from state per capita apportionments; \$212,000 for salaries & operation; \$24,000 for pupil transportation; and \$19,000 from state incentive aid apportionments.

Superintendent Morgan stated that even though the 1970-71 budget would be financed without a tax increase that it was his feeling that a tax increase would be required for the 1971-72 school year due to decreasing oil values in the district and a continued increase in other costs of school operations.

## Kindergarten Has Vacancies

The tuition kindergarten located in the Talco Elementary School still has vacancies for a few more students. The program began operating on August 24th with 17 students enrolled. The program is conducted daily from 8:30 to 11:30 with transportation being furnished from the Bogata Elementary School. Mrs. Melba Reed is the kindergarten teacher.

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan stated that for the first time since the kindergarten began operating three years ago that a complete curriculum program would be made available to the kindergarten students. The material to be used, Kindergarten Keys — underwent a three-year pilot study that proved the superiority of the material. The pilot program confirmed the findings that kindergarten children need a wide variety of experiences so that they may develop the reading and general readiness necessary to succeed in school when they enter the first grade.

Kindergarten Keys provides experiences which contribute to the children's intellectual, social, emotional and physical development. With the program the children participate in activities such as social studies and discussions, simple scientific experiments, playing in "activity corners," singing, play games, and listening to sounds, poems, stories, and new ideas. Children are eager to learn to read, and they are ready after completing this kindergarten program.

Parents are reminded that the early years, from infancy to eight years of age, are critically important years for the child's will to learn. Creating an interesting and challenging environment in their early years leads to a substantially faster rate of intellectual development.
