

Use of Step-Up Transformer and Rectifying Tubes Recommended for Amateurs.

The greatest drawback in the use of vacuum tubes for radio transmitters is a suitable source of direct current potential for the plate circuits. in general there are three sources. batteries, a motor generator set, and rectified alternating correct. The alternating house lighting current call be stepped up to the required potential by means of a transformer and then rectified by an electrolytic rectifier, by the use of vacuum tubes manufactured for this purpose.

The use of batteries as a source of plate current potential is limited to very low power sets that are used infrequently, and then only for short

To operate the standard five-watt transmitting tube, known as radiotron type UV 202, a plate voltage of 850 is required and the plate current per tube is 45-100 of an ampere. The filament requires 2.35 amperes at 7.5 volts. Rectifying tubes known as kentron type UV 216 are made to be used in conjunction with the fivewatt transmitting tubes. The rectifier tubes are so designed that one rectifier will rectify sufficient current at the correct potential to operate one

transmitting tube. Figure "A" shows how a single transformer can be used to furnish all of the necessary plate and filament current for a tube transmitter.

For those who do not wish to be bothered with the trouble and expense of rectifiers, there is a circuit known as the self-rectifying circuit that can be used for radio telegraphy. In using a self-rectifying circuit at least two tubes must be employed. If more power is desired tubes must be added in pairs. The tubes employed are divided into two groups operating on each haif of the cycle.



Average Speed of More Than Forty Miles an Hour.

Fortunately, Their Velocity and Power Are Materially Reduced as They Near the Shore.

When the wind blows fiercely most dwellers in towns, particularly in those near the sea, think of themselves what a stormy time our ships and sailors must be having, says a writer in a London paper, according to the Montreal Herald.

Storm-waves around the shores of these islands frequently have immense force behind them, treating blocks of stone and heavy timbers as playthings. smashing like match sticks apparently the most substantial obstacles.

During one storm in the Solent, near Hurst castle, the waves exerted such force ninety feet below the surface that stones weighing 200 pounds or more were torn from their resting places and hurled on the beach, together with heavy masses of scaweed attached to them.

It is in the deep ocean where the Forty, fifty and even sixty feet is the height to which the billows of the Atlantic, the Indian ocean, and the Southern will rise in times of tempest.

In pre-steam days a British man-ofwar encountered an unusually heavy gale of wind just outside the Bay of Biscay. Between two seas her storm trysails were totally becalmed, while the crest of each sea was above the level of the center of her mainyard. The mainyard was sixty feet above the water-line.

The water from a wave—as distinct from the body of the wave itself-has been known to do serious damage to vessels of great height above the deck. One notable instance of the kind was the smashing of the port lifeboat of a Hamburg-American liner, lashed on the bridge deck eighty feet above the

Giant storm-waves of the ocean have an average speed of rather more than forty miles an hour. Their length is the distance from crest to crest. This is about 400 feet for the Atlantic waves. It is much more, however, for the waves of the profoundly deep Pacific ocean.

Of course, it has to be remembered that giant waves in the open ocean can move with perfect freedom. It is when they begin to "touch bottom" in comparatively shallow water that their great speed is reduced-luckily for the fronts of the British coust

The velocity of the storm-wind in the Atlantic is frequently several miles an hour greater toan the velocity of the wave. This results in a good deal of spraying, which, in very severe weather, sometimes seriously thickens and obscures the air.

During a gale on the British coast it will be noticed that the waves begin to break a long way out. That is because these waves, being big ones, touch bottom the sooner. Their lower part moves forward at its old speed. The result is that the upper part curis over and breaks.


