FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS: REFORM AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST. A Banking and Currency Sub-committee under my personal supervision has completed its study of the many issues involved in our present financial difficulties - the problems of credit crunch, interest rates, and boom and bust cycles which so ominously threaten the entire U. CREDIT is a useful thing particularly when time is of the essence. but we should keep in mind that it takes years to catch up with over-extended credit. On the other hand, thrift is a virtue that pays off - in both cash and peace

LAST MINUTE REPRIEVE. The President has signed the Resolution which extends certain federal housing programs through October 1, 1973. This means that housing programs, including FHA 203, that would otherwise have expired can now go forward. In early September, the House and Senate will no doubt approve another Resolution to extend all HUD programs thru June 30 of next year, so that the people can be served in an efficient and expeditious manner.

CONGRESS AGAIN VOTES FOR TEXAS RAIL ROUTE. A new Amtrak rail passenger route through Arkansas and Texas down to the Mexican border was authorized last year. Unfortunately, the Administration then "impounded" the appropriated funds making it impossible for Amtrak officials to commence service through East Texas. It is encouraging that the Transportation Appropriations Bill which passed the Congress on Friday, August 3, makes available \$4.1 million to initiate the new Texas rail route. But the question remains: Will the Administration again "impound" funds for this highly beneficial project?

I hope not. ALL ARE IMPORTANT. Each Mrs. Oscar Morris of Detroit form of transportation is vital to rural areas. It is therefore also encouraging to record that after much hard work and prolonged debate, the Congress has finally completed action on a highway bill that is a compromise with mass transit interests. The measure is not entirely to my liking since it permits the use of some Trust Fund money for non-highway purposes, but it is better than continuing the stalemate which has blocked action for many months. Most important is that it permits continued construction of Federal highways which in the long run saves money as well as thousands of lives each year.

Most of the state tracts are submerged acreage in the Gulf of Mexico. Nine hundred and 40 Gulf tracts totalling 998,610 acres have been nominated. plus 563 tracts in Texas bays and inlets including 267,678 acres.

Oil and gas firms and individual bidders offer bonus payments via sealed bids on leasing of the state-owned tracts for a period of five years to explore and develop minerals. Armstrong said a record high interest is indicated in potential oil and gas production on state lands.

"This will be the largest sale in more than 25 years," said Armstrong.

A sale involving nearly one million acres of land in 1965 brought more than \$39 million in bonus payments to the permanent school fund.

Armstrong said the current sale is doubly significant because leases will enable the state to take its one-sixth royalty payment in gas or oil instead of casn. A court case is now pending

to determine if this can be done on existing leases. The "in kind" provision, specifically allowing the state to take oil and gas as well as cash, will be written into funds. the October bid propositions. Armstrong said this will per-

mit the state to offer cities the option of buying some of their natural gas directly from the state at fair market value.

#### DeBerry Reports Cotton Market Highway Funds Now Available

Austin. - Federal Highway funds became available today following a two-year logjam as President Nixon signed the three-year \$20 billion act.

State Highway Engineer Luther DeBerry said the compromise bill was the result of hours of hard work led by Texas' own Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Representative Jim Wright in the 10-week Senate-House conference committee sessions.

"Passage of the act means we can go forward with dozens of highway projects throughout the state which have been pigeonholed," DeBerry said. He pointed out there will remain a backlog of vitally needed projects.

DeBerry said. "One provision, sponsored by Senators Tower and Bentsen, freed the state to complete the San Antonio North Expressway with state funds. Twice the project has been caught by changes in Federal law and procedures as a Federal-aid project and for some years the resulting impasses has denied the needed roadway to the people of San Antonio. This legislation should greatly shorten the time required to complete the project."

The new highway act, which for the first time contains funds for mass transit, also contains more than \$2 billion for safety during the three years. DeBerry said. High on the list of such projects in Texas are replacement of narrow bridges and elimination of hazardous intersections and rail crossings. This is in addition to the increased safety benefits accruing from construction of modern highway facilities with more built-in safety features.

"This act does not solve all our money problems." the state highway engineer said, "But, even though it is not everything we ned here in Texas, it is a good

For FY 1974 the Highway Trust Fund revenues stay the same as in the past; beginning in FY 1975 urban funds can be used either for roads or purchase of ouses, up to \$200 million. In FY 1976 all or a part of urban funds may be used for highway buses or fixed rail transit with State Highway Department concur-

DeBerry said the act will now allow Texas to proceed with vital highway projects. The State Highway Department cancelled the July highway lettings due to the lack of federal funds.

State highway agencies across the nation have been without new authorizations of funds for

# News, USDA

Activity in Western Region cotton markets continued to be centered around contracting and the approaching South Texas harvest, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Foreign mills showed a strong demand for both 1973 and 1974 crop cotton for forward delivery. Growers on the Texas Plains continued to contract 1973-crop cotton at around 26.00 cents per pound over loan rates for Light Spotted grades 52 and higher, 3.5 to 4.9 mike cotton. In Arizona and California the bulk of market activity was around contracting of the 1974 crop. Contract prices were around 60.00 to 61.00 ents per pound, basis grade 31, staple 35 in the San Joaquin Valley. In South Texas where harvesting has begun, the bulk of current ginnings was being delivered against contracts made earlier in the year.

The cotton harvest in the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas was behind normal. A late crop and rains early in the week kept growers from making harvest progress. Elsewhere in the Western Region. crop progress was described as good to excellent. Insect infestations increased at some locations but were ropertedly being controlled.

#### Dominican Republic Divorces: Sad But Quick

The Aborce process itself - the charges, counter-charges, and protracted wrangling over money-can often be more damaging to the children of a marriage than is the actual break-up of the parents, some believe.

But now there has evolved a one-day remedy for the often prolonged delay in obtaining a divorce in the United States.

Americans, impatient for their day in court, are concluding in ever increasing numbers that the 24-hour divorce in the Dominican Republic is both speedy and carried out with dignity.

For a mutual consent divorce, the cost is \$550 plus round trip air fare, plus about \$25 for the hotel and local transportation, plus whatever the lawyers charge in the hometown of the couple getting the divorce.

Mexico used to be the main place abroad that Americans would go for quick divorces, but Mexican law changed in 1971 so that now a person must actually live in Mexico for six months before a divorce can be grant-

Now, the Dominican Republic is the center, After consulting local attorneys, people seeking to be despoused either call, or have their lawyers call, the Dominican Republic Advisory and Travel Bureau in Miami: (305) 373-1976.

Mostly for speed. Either the husband or wife flies down on Friday and comes home Saturday, divorced, unless there is a desire to tour the many sights in the Dominiin court that could embarrass either husband or wife.

If a woman signs a separation agreement giving her alimony, and also signs a paper authorizing a lawyer in a foreign country to represent her, she may not get the alimony provided by the agreement unless the foreign court orders that it be paid.

If her own neighborhood lawyer selects the foreign lawyer who will represent her, she is almost always safe. But if she leaves it up to her husband to choose the foreign lawyer, she may end up with no alimony.


