

SHORTAGE OF CARS HOLDING UP MOVEMENT OF GRAIN

hampering the movement of the new grain crops in West Texas and the shippers are voicing a general complaint. The farmers are making heavy deliveries of the new wheat and a great many elevators in the country can not be obtained to receive ship-

In some cases, farmers are compelled to haul the wheat back to the farms because of the congested condition of the elevators, which cannot unload the product or obtain cars, sufficient to empty the storage place.

These conditions exist mostly at stations on the K. C. M. & O., Wichita Valley. Fort Worth & Denver, Panhandle and Wichita Falls and North-

Heavy losses are being suffered by the growers, due to the declining prices, as they are forced to delay the marketing of the grain until the elevators are in a position to handle it. Farmers who have wheat sold at higher prices suffer greatly from the serious condition, as they are unable to obtain cars to load grain on contract time.

This is causing a congestion of funds at the banks as the financial institu-tions are forced to "carry" the farmers until they can secure payment for their grain when it is delivered. The farmers must wait until then to meet their obligations at the banks and to secure funds for payment of the harvesting and threshing expenses.

AND WAIT FOR EXPENSES

Austin, July 6.—A Texas ranger dis-patched from the adjutant general's department on official duty for the state now pays his own expenses and must wait until the department receives earlier in the night and taken some more money before he is reimbursed, according to Adjutant General Barton,

This came about as a result of the traveling appropriation of the ranger force having been entirely expended. It was used up about three months ago and the department will receive no more funds until September 1, when the appropriation bills take effect. "It is very fortunate that we have

had very little traveling to do in the last few months." Adjutant General Barton said. "Otherwise we would have been up against it. We are not allowed to use other funds for this purpose."

General Barton pointed out that the board of control had nevertheless cut the ranger transportation budget from \$6,000 to \$4,000 annually for the next



POLO PLAYED FOR CENTURIES

Game is Known to Have Been in Exstence for More Than Two Thousand Years.

The earliest form known was primitive, consisting of feats of horse-oute ship and skill. In an ancient Indian variety the sides are ranged up on opposite ends of the grounds and the ball is thrown in. This is probably the form of the game which reached India from Persia and is represented today by Manipur and Gilgit polo, though these forms are rougher than the old Indian game.

Henry, Not Hendrick Hudson,

The intrepld and resourceful payigator who first explored the North iver was not Hendrick, but Henry Hudsen. By the former name he was never known in his own time. He would not have answered to it, probably would have resented as application to him, even during the brief period in which he was in the service of the Netherlands East India company, for he knew scarcely a word of the Dutch language, and he insisted upon having the Dutch lawyers, in drawing up at Amsterdam the Dutch contract with the company, write therein his name in its plain English form-Henry Hudson, says the New York Tribune.

That he is called Hendrick is due to whimsy of the "gentle humorist," irving, who in the postbumous papers of the mythical Diedrich Knickerbocker naturally and appropriately used the Dutch form of the name.

Animal Waves.

Investigation has been made of the peculiar wavy motion of centipedes and millipedes, with the view of determining the manner in which these animals manage to use their superabundant pedal extremities so gracefully and harmoniously. It is found that the legs move in groups, or waves, each wave including a definite number of legs. The number of waves included in the length of the body is constant for each species. In millipedes the waves of each side are synchronous; in centipedes they are symmetrically alternate, giving rise to heautifully accordant movements. The difference may be explained by suggesting that the millipede moves like pacing horse, the centipede like a

THE GRASSHOPPERS

Almost every year, some sections of 'chird and West Texas pay an imcase [di] to the grasshopper. Every crem who has lived on a farm in one of these sections has witnessed at least me invasion in which whote fleids very almost entirely defoliated. The lamage from this pest annually mounts ents thousands of dollars. Practically no field erop is free from their attacks and sometimes even the trees are rulhof by having their leaves chewed off.

The grasshopper lays its eggs in the fall, in holes bored to a depth of an sel or two in the ground. These ezgusso are usually deposited in the mandancis or along the fence rows or litches through the fields. There are usually aloud 50 eggs in one mass and are female deposits from 2 to 4 masses. These eggs hatch in the spring and the young hoppers, then less than 1-8 inch mg work their way to the surface and sight to feed on the vegetation. They to not have wings at this time, and be ing so small, are scarcely noticeable. at their appearances in numbers presages the armies that will be present in he summer when they become full

If there egg masses were broken up or winter playing many of the egg and be destroyed. Therefore, good vinter methods of cultivation will detroy most of those that grow in the actual farmlands. THE THOUSAND ISLANDS

THE River St. Lawrence "As grand as the Rhine", was discovered by a French explorer in 1535. In 1615. Champlain explored the upper reaches of this majestic stream and discovered these islands.

The origin of the name is evident to the beholder. Below Lake Ontario for a distance of some forty miles the river broadens to a width ranging from four to seven miles. Here begins this world-famous archipelago. These islands-sometimes in a string like links in a chain-again in just pellmell confusion, appear to block the channel. Apparently there are a thousand of them. Some authorities assert there are as many as 1,700.

Composed mainly of rock or granite. their surfaces are not high. Some are no larger than to provide a foundation for a house—the largest contains about 10,000 acres. Many are privately owned and here man and his money have created eastles which look as wondrous as fairy tales sound.

The Thousand Islands were the scene of some hot conflicts between nations-Indian wars (when this region was known as Manatoana-Garden of the Great Spirit), contests between the French and the English and battles of Revolutionary fame.

To this generation, however, they are more prominently known for their singularly-picturesque beauty and undestioned charm.

MAY ABANDON ALL

BORDER ARMY POSTS

Washington, July 6 .- Problem of reducing the enlisted strength of the army from 223,000 men to 150,000 by October 1, as directed by congress, will be presented Secretay Weeks within a few days. 'rAithough details were said not to have been definitely worked out, it became known yesterday that it will be necessary to abandon a number of military posts, including several in each branch of the service and to reduce materially commands at others.

One of the most important commands to suffer reduction will be that on the Mexican border, it was said. An informal report in circulation says it was proposed to abandon practically all the coast artillery posts in the South with the exception of that at Key West and a few others at important points.

Final decision will be left to Secretary Weeks as to what posts are to be abandoned compeltely. Major General Harbord will present the completed plans, upon which the general staff is now working, and it is expected the

The new ruling is officially designated as "treasury decision 67. W.R., effective June 30, 1921, and the feature of maximum interest to former service men is the provision that term insurance which has lapsed or which has been canceled may, regardless of how long the applicant has been discharged. be reinstated, or reinstated and converted to United States government life insurance at any time prior to January 1. 1922, under conditions substantially

1. In all cases the applicant must tender with his application at least two monthly premiums on the amount of insurance to be reinstated or reinstated and converted. One of these premiums to cover the month of grace immediately following his lapsation and during which he was protected, and the other as the first month's premium on the insurance to be reinstated.

The applicant also must comply the director of the bureau of war risk to Sept. 30.

When application for reinstatement, or reinstatement and conversion is made within three calendar months after the insurance has lapsed or was canceled, including the calendar month for which the unpaid premium was due, the applicant need only make statement in his written application that he is in as good health as he was when his insurance lapsed, and no physical examination will be required.

When insurance but lapsed or beet canceled more than three months and yet within six calendar months, including the month for which the unpaid premium is due the reinstatement or reinstatement and conversion, may be made provided the applicant is in good health and so states in his written application, and that he substantiates this statement by a short medical certificate, made at the applicant's expense by a reputable physician licensed to practice medicine.

After the expiration of six calendar months from the date of lapsation and at any time prior to January 1, 1922, insurance may be reinstated provided that the applicant is in good health and so states in his written application, and provided further that such application s substantiated by a report of a full medical examination, made at the applicant s expense, by a reputable physician licensed to practice medicine.

This regulation supercedes the previous ruling of treasury decision 61, which limited the time for reinstatement of insurance lapsed prior to July 1, 1920, to the period ending July 1 1921, and fixed a time limitation fo reinstatement of insurance that bad lapsed or been canceled after July 1, 1920, to a period of eighteen months.

KERRVILLE HOSPITAL PLANS ARE OPPOSED

Austin, July 6 .-- When the architect's plans for the completion of the Kerrville tuberculosis hospital for ex-service men were presented to the building board late yesterday, Dr. M. M. Carrick, state health officer and chairmen of the board, objected strenuously to the plans for the superintendent's home and the servant's house.

The plans provide for a \$16,900 superintendent's home and a \$4,000 servant's house. Dr. Carrick said he thought these figures were too much for those buildings and after argument the board refused to accept the plans for the servant's house. However, the superintendent's home was accepted. The plans for the remainder of the buildings were also accepted.

The Legislature appropriated \$1,500. 000 to complete and equip the hospital. When asked what he thought should be expended for the two buildings he objected to, Dr. Carrick said \$12,000 for the superintendent's home and \$350 for the servant's house. Other plans for the latter building will have to be prepared by the architects now, he said.

TAKE HONOR FROM SIEGFRIED

Legends Ascribe Slaying of Monster of the Rhine to Heroic Captive Christian Maiden.

One of the most conspicuous moun tains near the Rhine is the historic Drachenfels, or Dragon's rock, named from that legendary monster of the Rhine, which was both the scourge and terror of the region. The legend of the hero, Siegfried, who slew the monster, and became invulnerable by bath ing in its blood, has been immortalized in song and story. Another myth, how ever, makes the slayer of the dragon a young woman.

Beads for Insulation.

In certain installations, such as radio equipement, are lamp wiring and laboratory apparatus, it is often necessary to resort to beads for insularing bare wires. Heretofore, says the Scientific American, the beads have been of a plain design, with rounded ends, resulting in a rigid covering which prevented the covered wire from being bent as desired, or left bared sections of the wire between the beads because fewer beads had to be strung in order to allow for bending.

These beads permit of covering a wire for its full length, yet do not interfere with the bending of said wire.

Snow Cake

1 pound arrowroot, 1-4 pound sugar, 1 cup butter, whites 6 eggs, 1-2 tenspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon almond extract. Cream butter and sugar. Add whipped whites and 1-3 teaspeon salt, then the arrowroot mixed with baking powder. Beat well for 10 minutes; add extract, and bake in loaf-pan lined with 3 thicknesses paper. Have oven moderate, bake 1 1-2 hours. and cover pan with paper for first

Scotch Cake

1 1-2 cups butter, 2 1-3 cups sugar, eggs, 1 1-2 plats flour, 1-2 teaspoon baking powder, 3 cups raisins, stoned. I tablespoon extract lemon. Rub butter and sugar to light, white cream; add eggs, 2 at a time, beating 5 minntes after each addition; add flour sifted with powder, raisins, and extract : mix into smooth batter : put into paper-lined square, shallow cake pan; bake in a moderate oven one hour.

To Fry Small Fish Clean fish, and let them lie few minutes wrapped singly, in clean dry towel season with pepper an dsalt roll in corn meal, fry in 1-3 butter and 2-3 lard: drain on seive, and serve hot.

Salmon Salad Sandwiches One-pound can pink salmon, 1 tablespoonful any salad dressing 2 tablespoonfuls finely chopped cucumber pickles (sour), 1 teaspoonful grated onion or onion juice, 14 teaspoonful mixed salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and spread between thin slices of bread.

Boston Brown Bread 1-2 pint flour, 1 pint Indian corn meal, 1-2 plut rye flour, 2 potatoes, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 pint water. Sift flour, corn meal, rye flour, sugar, salt, and baking powder together thoroughly. Peel, wash and boil well 2 mealy potatoes, rub them through a sieve, diluting with water. When this is quite cold use it to mix flour, etc., into a batter. Pour into well-greased mold having a cover. well-greased mold having a cover. Place it in saucepan half full of boil-

ing water, where the loaf will simmer
