Ark-Tex COG Granted \$9,499

Austin. -Governor Dolph Brisoe today awarded a \$9.499 grant to Ark-Tex Council of Governments, Texarkana. to purchase equipment for 24 police agencies the region it serves.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council. which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

Detection and apprehension equipment will be purchased in volume and distributed to the police agencies to increase their criminal-investigation capabities. Ark-Tex Council of Govern-

ments serves the counties of Bowie, Cass, Delta. Franklin, Hop-kins. Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus.

The Ark-Tex COG award was one of 34, totaling \$1.831,730, recommended for the governor's approval by the CJC Executive Committee at its August 14 meeting.



Cotton Market News, USDA

Activity in Western cottor markets slowed this wek, accord ing to the Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Demand conbrates its ninth anniversary tinued strong, particularly from foreign spinners Many merchants were reluctant to make more forward commitments at this time. Domestic mill demand was primarily for cotton from prompt or nearby delivery. The bulk of current ginnings was being delivered against previously made contracts. Growers with uncommitted cotton were often reluctant to accept bid prices. Small mixed lots of better quality cotton brought 60.00 to 73.00 cents per pound in Central and South Texas markets. Prices for below grade qualities ranged from 25.06 to 28.00 cents per pound. Contract prices for 1973-crop cotton were around 40.00 cents per pound above loan rates for better quality, premium mike cotton on the Texas Plains. In Southeastern New Mexico. a limited volume o. Acala 1517 was contracted at 83.00 cents per pound. basis grade 31. staple 37. 3.3 and better mike. Contract prices for 1974-crop cotton in South Texas were around 60.00 to 62.00 cents per pound. San Joaquin Valley, California growers offered 1974-crop cotton at around 63.00 cents per pund, basis grade 31 staple 35. Central Arizona growers asket 61.00 to 62.00 cents per pound. basis grade 31 staple 34 for their 1974 crop. Rains fell over virtually all of South Texas bringing harvesting efforts to a standstill. Rains also delayed harvesting activity in Central Texas. Harvesting was slowly expanding in Southern California and Wester

Arizona. Prices quoted for selected qual ities, 3.5 to 4.9 mile, in the Dallas and Houston markets are:

SCHOOL FINANCE PLAN ADVANCED - A House education committee recommendation for the state to assume \$600 million in added school costs over a six-year period went to Speaker Daniel and Briscoe last week. "What we are trying to do is relieve the local taxpayers and shift the burden to the state,"

said Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale. committee chairman. "The local districts are at about their (taxing) limit."

Kubiak said overhauling the school finance formulas can be accomplished without any immediate new taxes, because \$109 million in unexpended funds rests in the state treasury."

Recommendations included a reduction in the teacher-pupil ration; limiting ad valorem taxes for other than capital facilities, he'd stayed on in the White equipment and debt service to 75 cents per \$100 of market value: local leeway funds of from \$100 to \$200 per pupil in two-step form; increasing the transportation allocation by 50 per cent; increasing the operation and maintenance cost to \$85 per average daily membership and a new teacher pay raise.




