UNIFIED CAMPAIGN TO FIGHT THE BOLL WEEVIL ------

Plans for a unified campaign to combat the cotton boll weevil were laid at a meeting held in Dallas Saturday. The meeting was called by the Texas chamber of commerce and representatives of about 50 agricultural and busi-

ness organizations of the state. Destruction of the boll weevil by fighting the pest during the autumn

while its vitality is lowest will be the chief method adopted by the central committee, which has the campaign in

hand. Tests previously conducted have proved that the weevil can be controlled to a large extent, according to Dr. W. D. Hunter of Houston, a member of the federal horticultural board.

Ways and means of controlling the boll weevil also were discussed by Geo. B. Terrell, Austin, state commissioner of agriculture; Walton Peteet, secretary of the Texas farm bureau federation, Dallas; T. O. Walton, College Station, director of the extension department of the A. and M. College of Texas ; and DeWitt McMurray of Dallas, editor of the Semi-Weekly Farm News.

The large majority of the grade eachers have permanent certificates. Very few shools can claim that high standard. If a high standard is demanded of the teachers and the pupils. people will soon find out about it and want their children to go there.

We now have twenty and one-half affiliated credits. That is very good and we now rank in the ten per cent best high schools in the state. But with a gain of four and one-half, which we hope to make this year on Eleventh English, First and Second year Spanish, and Second Year Agriculture, we would rank among the fifteen or twenty best high schools in the state.

Our aim is to get on the "All Southern Accredited List of High Schools." This gives the high school graduate the privilege of entering any college in the South and most of the colleges in the East without examination. This would induce much better work on the part of the old student and also induce more people to come here to school. We could not get on this list last year because we did not have the new school building. This year we have the new school building and if we don't get on the list it will be because the



NATION'S BUSINESS TURNING TO HIGHWAY TRANSPORTATION - 0

That the business of the Nation is turning more to highway transportation is indicated by statistics on motorvehicle registration as of July 1, compiled by the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture. Registration of passencer cars taxis, busses, and motor trucks fotaled 10.020.471 on this date, an increase of 157,176, which is a healthy growth as the first half of the year is the off seaon for registration of new vehicles.

The surprising fact, hovever, is that of the 157 174 increase in registration ; motor trucks constituted 116,701 against 35.030 presenger cars and 5.443 taxis and hasses. This means an increase of over 16 per cent of the number of motor trucks at the beginning of the Figures are not available to STREET. -how what part of the increase of 5,443 or nearly 11 per cent, in the taxi and bus registration is due to the increase in the number of busses traversing rural and suburban routes, but it is very probable that a considerable part of the increase is due to the development of this new form of transportation.

It has been frequently said that the traffic is always ready and waiting when good roads are built, and that the commercial vehicle as a class is more handicapped by lack of good roads than the pleasure vehicle. The increase in the registration of commercial vehicles. coupled with the present activity in highway construction, seems to bear out this statement in the opinion of department officials.

The table of statistics issued by the bureau shows a registration of 9,467,874 private cars, 55,990 taxis and busses, and 1.096,605 motor trucks, making a total of 10.620.471. Motor cycles are not included there being 149.924 against 196.231 at the beginning of the year.

75-MILE COTTON ROW LOCATED IN WEST TEXAS

> Now comes West Texas with its most recent claim to greatness-a cotton row 75 miles in length. Five or six miles across the Wilbarger line into Foari county it can be found on the farm of John L. Hunter, of Margaret. Few of Hunter's neighbors are aware of the wonder in their midst. Hunter for years has been a large wheat grower and is at present a county commissiiner. To save time he planted his cotton in rows, of which there are 15 on 200 acres. He merely started at the outer edge of the field and drilled in a huge circle to the center, like the puzzle plate on the case that entitles you to a cigar if you worked it out. It's the longest row on record in these parts. and West Tevas is willing to put it against the rest of the South. There are few hands of a disposition to attempt to cultivate the plant. 





The wagons from the farms in the Association will all be painted gray as an-other precaution and for the purpose of distinguishing their cotton and cotton seed from the ordinary variety.

The fields have all been gone over by experts and the off brand stalks pulled out, to insure the purity of these seed. The farmers who are raising this cotton are more than satisfied with the yield as it is standing the drouth beter than the ordinary varieties.
