## Storm Slaps Blackland Area Saturday Night

What has been termed both a twister and a very severe wind and rain storm by local law enforcement and fire department officials totally destroyed one mobile home, two brooder houses, at least five barns and innumerable outbuildings in the Deport and Bogata area Saturday night, May 24.

The Milton Community was the hardest hit, with practically every residence suffering damage of some extent. Jerry Kenemore and his family of Milton returned home to see fire trucks approach the location of their mobile home, and then saw the trucks stop in front of the wreckage.

An electric clock in the trailer stopped at 10:13, setting the time the twister struck.

The home was lifted and turned upside down about 20 feet from the foundation blocks, landing on the Kenemore pickup. Wind scattered the contents of the home across the fields. Tuesday morning Kenemore said that their clothing, which they originally hoped to salvage, was filled with fiberglass from the insulation in the trailer, and they didn't think they could save much of it. The only life in the trailer when the storm struck was

that of the Kenemore cat, which has been named "Lucky" by the Kenemores since the storm. The Deport Fire Department freed the cat from the wreckage, and it was unharmed.

Kenemore had received permission from his insurance company Tuesday morning to salvage what he could from the wreckage, and was hoping that some of his appliances might be operable. The family is moving into the Presbyterian Manse in Deport, which is not occupied at this time as the church is served by the Rev. Sam Rice of Clarksville. Kenemore is the minister of the Church of Christ in Deport, and is the owner of Deport Welding Shop.

The storm hit first at the home of Dorothy Ellen Gray, where it lifted the carport and put it down on the roof of the house. From there it skipped south to the Jack Short chicken farm where it destroyed two brooder houses and severely damaged two others. Next on the path was the Kenemore trailer, and then it struck a mobile home farther south belonging to a Mr. Fletcher of Dallas. The Fletcher home was shifted off its blocks, which punched up through the floor of the trailer.

Among those losing barns in the Milton area were Frank Lee, who lost two barns, Buddy Taylor, who lost a barn that had been built just last summer, Barney Scott, James Jackson and Dee Millspaugh. Others with damage included J. B. Ladd and Curtis Mantooth.

Millspaugh said that his water tank, which was located near the garage that was unroofed, had completely disappeared. When viewed from the air, very few structures appeared to be undamaged.

In Bogata at the home of Mrs. William Rozell the roof was blown off a barn in which her car was parked, with no damage to the car. The

roofing material on Bogata Funeral Home was peeled off, windows were broken and power knocked out. Trees were severely damaged all over Bogata, with many of the limbs damaging power lines. Galen Legate, district manager of Community Public Service said that power was off in many sections of the city, but that all service had been restored. Many lines had to be repaired, Legate said.

Representatives of Continental Telephone said that most of their service would be restored by Tuesday afternoon after losing approximately 150 phones to the storm.

Cotton trailers at Bogata Gin were blown about by the storm, with one coming to rest across Highway 37 from the gin. Almost every garden in the area suffered some damage, especially the corn, which in some gardens was already five feet high.

Tin from the Bogata Horse Sale Barn, which had been reduced to a pile of rubble by a fire three weeks ago, blew across Highway 271 and onto lawns and the grounds of Bogata Elementary School. The hay barn adjoining the sale barn was also damaged. Signs at United Dollar Store and Tip Top Drive In were destroyed.

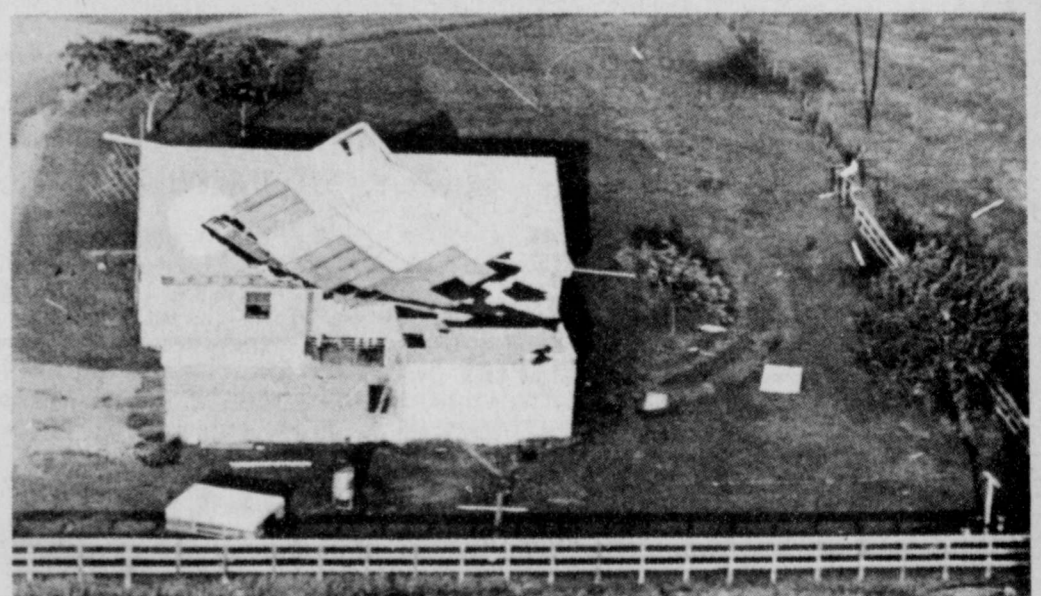

## Testing Dates Announced

Testing dates this summer for the GED (General Education Development) test battery are announced today by Ken Dailey, Paris Junior College counselor who administers the tests at the college.

The test battery will be given on 13 Wednesdays this summer in Room 101 of the Applied Sciences Center and on one Saturday in the Student Center cafeteria. Successful completion of the GED leads to issuance of a high school equivalency diploma from the State Department of Education.

Wednesday test dates are May 29, June 5, 12, 19, 26, July

3, 17, 24, 31, and August 7, 14, 21, 28. The Saturday test date this summer is July 22 and the fee may be paid in the Student Center before the 8 a.m. test. Those taking Wednesday tests should pay the fee in the Business Office, Administration Building, before reporting to the Applied Sciences Center.

Testing fee is \$7.50 and must be paid on the testing date. No appointment is necessary, but 17 or 18-year-old students must submit an official letter from their high school principal or superintendent stating their last date of attendance. Minimum age in Texas for taking the test is 17.

Terry Giddens, a graduating senior at Rivercrest High School, has secured a full scholarship for football and track at East Texas State University in Commerce.

Bobby Fox, defensive coordinator for the East Texas Lions, negotiated the contract with Giddens, who will

## Garden Diseases Appearing

Septoria foliage blight is widespread and becoming serious on tomatoes, according to Bob Moody, County Extension Agent. With the outlook for more rain and humid weather, this disease can easily ruin prospects for a good fruit set.

Septoria foliage blight develops rapidly, showing as small black spots on the lower leaves. With high humidity, infected leaves turn brown, curl and die quickly. Unlike other foliage diseases, Septo-

ria blight attacks leaves, branches and flower parts. It does not attack fruit, but this is of little consolation since heavily infected plants cease to set fruit.

The most effective control is the application of fungicidal sprays at seven to ten day intervals. Spraying should start before any leaf spots become noticeable. Additionally, spraying should be repeated as soon as possible after every heavy rain.

### Registration Monday At PJC For Summer Term

Registration for the first summer term at Paris Junior College will be held Monday, June 3, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Students registering during the day should obtain packets in the Registrar's Office, Administration Building, before reporting to the Student Center for class scheduling. Those enrolling in the evening may obtain the packets in the Student Center.

Students planning to take evening classes may register during the day or evening registration hours. An increased evening school program will be offered this summer for those unable to attend day classes. Evening courses will be taught from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. weekdays.

Classes for the first term begin Tuesday, June 4, and the semester ends July 9. Dormitories will be open for the summer sessions and tuition will be on a semester-hour basis the same as the regular terms.

Among courses to be offered the first summer term are air conditioning mechanics, biology (400), computer data processing, basic English (300), construction practicum, unit record equipment, English composition and rhetoric (303), English literature (330), algebra (300), physical science, U.S. history to 1877, art appreciation, English composition, rhetoric and reading (304), U.S. government, reading and study skills, college algebra (302), freshman orientation, badminton and tennis, basketball and softball, law enforcement introduction, dairy science, blueprint reading for residential construction, farm and ranch management, nursing semi-

nar, medical laboratory and radiology technology clinical labs.

### Selective Service Office Moved To Mount Pleasant

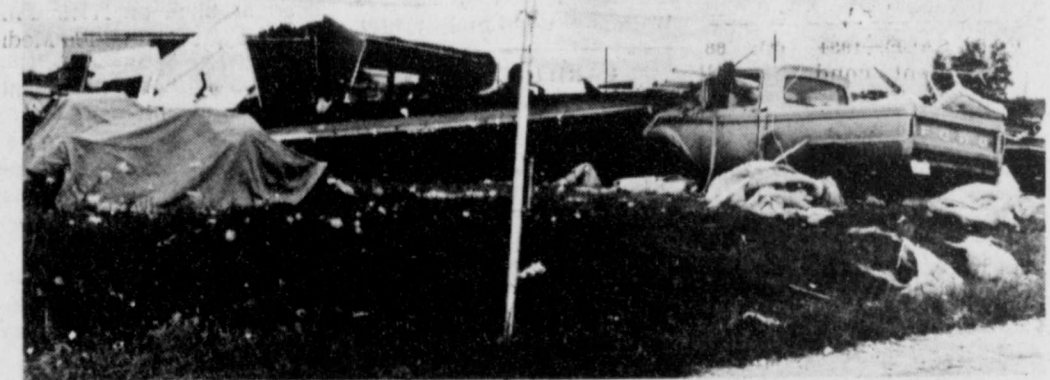
Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has announced the relocation of the office keeping records and files for Local Boards Nos. 69 and 83 from Sulphur Springs to Mount Pleasant effective immediately.

The move of the office from Sulphur Springs to Mount Pleasant is part of a nationwide reorganization and Reduction in Force within the Selective Service System. In June, the Texarkana office will also be moved to Mount Pleasant.

Local Board No. 69 will continue to meet in Sulphur Springs and Local Board No. 83 will continue to meet in Paris.

Any registrant seeking information about his duties and requirements under the law or who wishes to discuss details of his Selective Service file should now contact the office in Mount Pleasant, which will be located in the 1603 Jefferson Building after June 20, 1974. All young men are still required by Federal Law to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after their 18th birthday, and should report to the local board office in Mount Pleasant.

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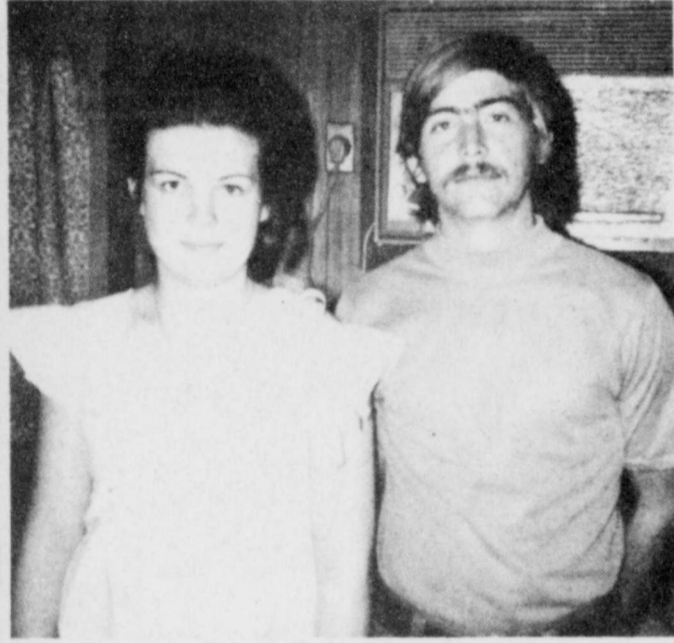
