Area Saturday Night What has been termed both that of the Kenemore cat, a twister and a very severe wind and rain storm by local law enforcement and fire

department officials totally destroyed one mobile home, two brooder houses, at least five barns and innumerable outbuildings in the Deport and Bogata area Saturday night, May 24.

The Milton Community was the hardest hit, with practically every residence suffering damage of some extent. Jerry Kenemore and his family of Milton returned home to see fire trucks approach the location of their mobile home, and then saw the trucks stop in front of the wreckage.

An electric clock in the trailer stopped at 10:13, setting the time the twister struck.

The home was lifted and turned upside down about 20 feet from the foundation blocks, landing on the Kenemore pickup. Wind scattered the contents of the home across the fields. Tuesday morning Kenemore said that their clothing, which they originally hoped to salvage, was filled with fiberglass from the insultion in the trailer, and they didn't think they could save much of it.

All household items are needed since the loss of the Kenemore's home Saturday night. They have secured the Presbyterian Manse in Deport for their place of residence.

The residents of Deport, Pattonville, Milton and the surrounding area are invited to attend.

Funeral Home was peeled off, windows were broken and power knocked out. Trees were severely damaged all over Bogata, with many of the limbs damaging power lines. Galen Legate, district manager of Community Public Service said that power was off in many sections of the city, but that all service had been restored. Many lines had

to be repaired, Legata said. Representatives of Continental Telephone said that most of their service would be restored by Tuesday afternoon after losing approximately 150 phones to the storm.

Cotton trailers at Bogata Gin were blown about by the storm, with one coming to rest across Highway 37 from the gin. Almost every garden in the area suffered some damage, especially the corn, which in some gardens was already five feet high.

Tin from the Bogata Horse Sale Barn, which had been reduced to a pile of rubble by a fire three weeks ago, blew across Highway 271 and onto lawns and the grounds of Bogata Elementary School. The hay barn adjoining the sale barn was also damaged. Signs at United Dollar Store and Tip Top Drive In were destroyed.



Vaccinate Blackleg

All cattle under two years of age should be vaccinated for blackleg every year, advises Bob Moody, Red River County agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Blackleg is a disease which is usually fatal to young cattle. The death of lameness of the best young calf in a herd often signals an outbreak of the disease. The most common sign that an animal has the disease is a swelling of the heavy muscles in the hip and shoulder.

According to Bob Moody, blackleg has been around for a long time and seems to show up where ever cattle are raised. It is caused by bacteria which are usually ingested with feed. The infection ends up in the heavy muscles of the animal, where it causes great damage and forms large quanities of gas in the tissues. When pressure is applied to the affected area, the gas in the tissues makes a crackling sound, like paper being crumpled.


An animal which has died from blackleg has a characteristic posture. Because of the terrific swelling soon after death, the animal has its legs extended and stiff like a sawhorse.

Once animals are stricken with the disease, they usually die in 12 to 48 hours. The disease can be prevented by vaccination with a bacterin made from the organism which causes the disease. Since animals under two years of age are the ones usually affected, they are the ones which should be vacci-

nated. Although annual vaccination means that some animals be vaccinated more than once, this will not hurt the animals and will keep resistance at a high level,

explains Moody.

If there is an outbreak of blackleg on your farm, the best thing to do is to vaccinate all the young animals and hope you are getting ahead of the infection. You may continue to lose animals for about two weeks. After that much time has passed since vaccination, the animals are generally safe. However, an annual vaccination program for all cattle under two years of age will eliminate chances Dallas, and a grandson, of an outbreak, contends




