Dairy-Beef Research Shows Value Of Winter Pasture

Can you match 845 pounds of beef per acre at a cost of 8.8 cents per pound? That's the winter pasture costs of 12 Holstein and 6 Brown Swiss bull calves in a dairy-beef research project conducted by Shannon Carpenter, associate dairyman for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The project began in the fall of 1973 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. Six Brown Swiss and 19 Holstein bull calves were started in the project. In the 217 day growing period, the Brown Swiss calves had

an average daily gain of 1.42 pounds at a cost of 32 cents per pound and the Holstein calves gained 1.33 pounds per day at a cost of 34 cents per pound.

All calves were less than one week of age when put into the research project. Milk substitute was fed twice daily for the first 14 days and once daily for the last 14 days of the 28 day starting period. Grain and Coastal bermudagrass hay was available free choice.

For winter grazing, where the 8.8 cents per pound cost was realized, Elbon rye was sodseeded on 3.25 acres of Coastal bermudagrass. The pasture was fertilized with 205-75-75 in two applications. Pasture costs amounted to \$75.00 per acre. Thirteen head were placed on pasture January 18, 1974, three head were added February 22 and two head were added April 2. The 18 bull calves grazed a total of 1,565 animal days for an average daily gain of 1.75 pounds per head.

Daily gain for the animals was low, due primarily to problems encountered. The bulls were started on winter pasture at body weights of 225 to 240 pounds. "Under more average or normal conditions, the cost per pound of gain could have been much better," Carpenter summarized. "In 1973, we had a cost of 5.93 cents per pound of gain from dairy bull calves on winter pasture. However, people interested in growing dairy bull calves for beef should expect abnormal conditions to occur some years."

Local Man In Jail In Paris

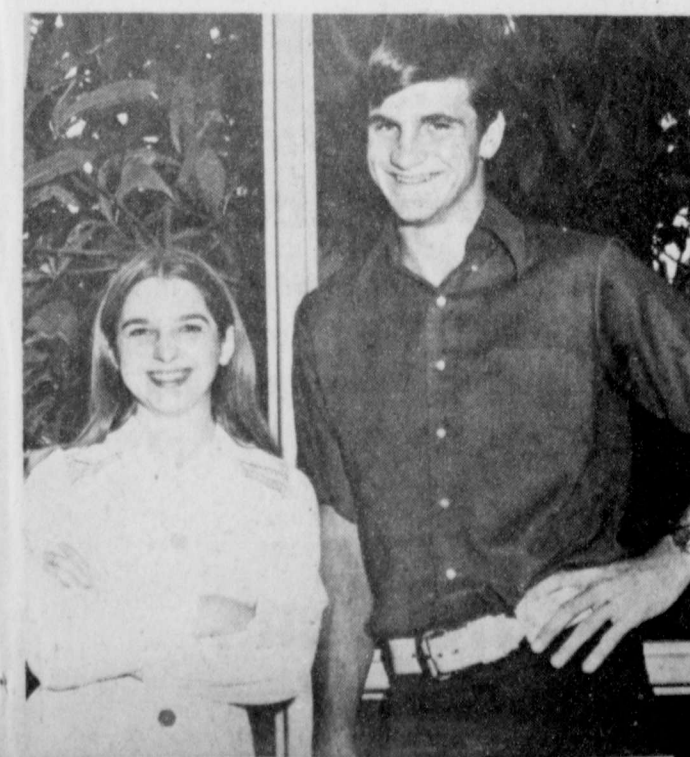

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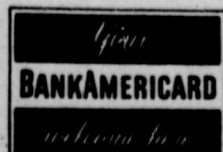
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Revival Set At Maple Springs

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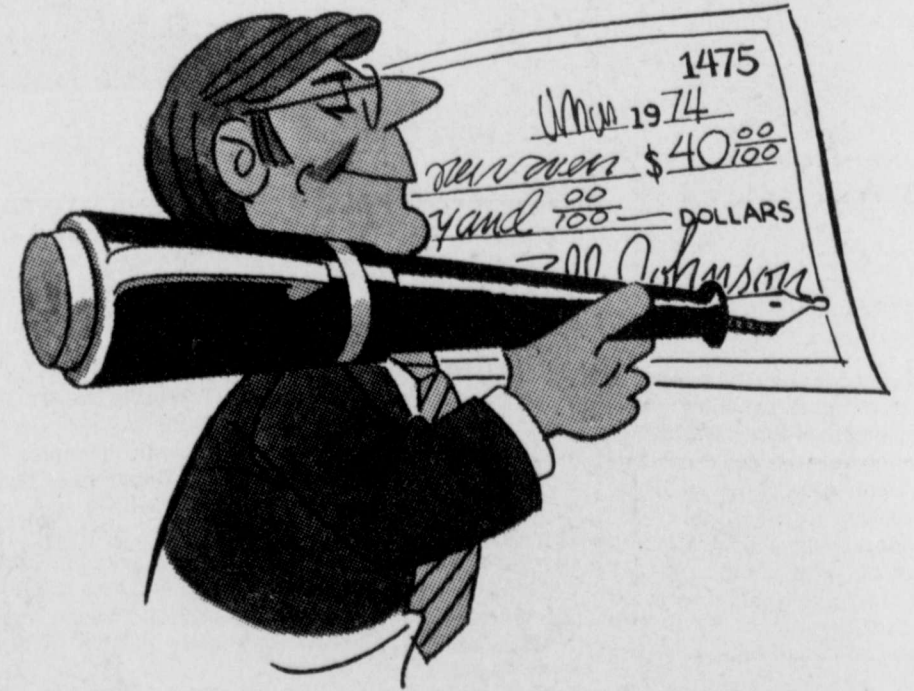

Can Green Beans

Do you have a surplus of green beans or can you buy them at a reasonably low cost? Try canning them so that you can have summer goodness in the middle of winter.

You haven't canned green beans before? Here is how. Prepare the beans just as you would for cooking — by snapping or cutting them into one or two inch pieces — or you might leave them whole. Pack them tightly into clean jars to 1/2 inch space at the top of the jar. If salt is desired, add 1/2 teaspoon for a pint and 1 teaspoon for a quart. Wipe off the sealing surface and close according to manufacturer's directions.

Place the closed jars of hot beans in a pressure canner, which has 1 1/2 to 2 inches of boiling water and a rack to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker.

Place the lid on the canner and fasten securely. If the lid has clamps, tighten opposite clamps moderately at first. Then go back over the whole set to tighten each pair as much as possible, with your fingers only.

Leave the petcock open until the steam escapes steadily for ten minutes so that no air is left in the cooker then close the petcock. If air is left in it causes a vacuum and draws the liquid off the beans.

Count the processing time as soon as the pressure reaches ten pounds. Keep a uniform pressure by adjusting the heat or by moving the canner carefully.

Process the snap beans 20 minutes for pints and 25 minutes for quarts. At the end of the processing time, remove the canner from the heat. Allow the canner to cool

until the gauge registers zero. Open the petcock gradually, remove the cover. Leave the beans in the canner about five minutes. Take them out of the canner and place them right side up on a rack far enough apart to cool quickly. Do not place them in a draft or on a cold surface to prevent them from breaking.

Remember — no better beans will come out of the jars than went into them, so be sure to use good quality beans. If you do this and follow directions carefully, you will come out with beans that are olive green in color and have the flavor of freshly cooked green beans.

Thought For Food



Vanilla Peach Pudding
Drain 1 can (1 pound, 13 ounces) sliced canned peaches, reserving 1 cup of the syrup and mix it with the peaches, 1 teaspoon lemon rind, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract, and 1 tablespoon quick-cooking tapioca. Turn into a 1 1/2 quart casserole or baking dish. Dot with the 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Soften 1/4 cup butter or margarine onto which gradually blend 1/4 cup sugar. Beat in 1 egg. Sift together 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, and 3/4 teaspoons salt. Add alternately with 1/2 cup milk mixed with 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract. Beat batter about 20 strokes. Spread uniformly over peaches. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 1 hour and 15 minutes or until browned. Serve hot with whipped cream if desired. Yields six servings.

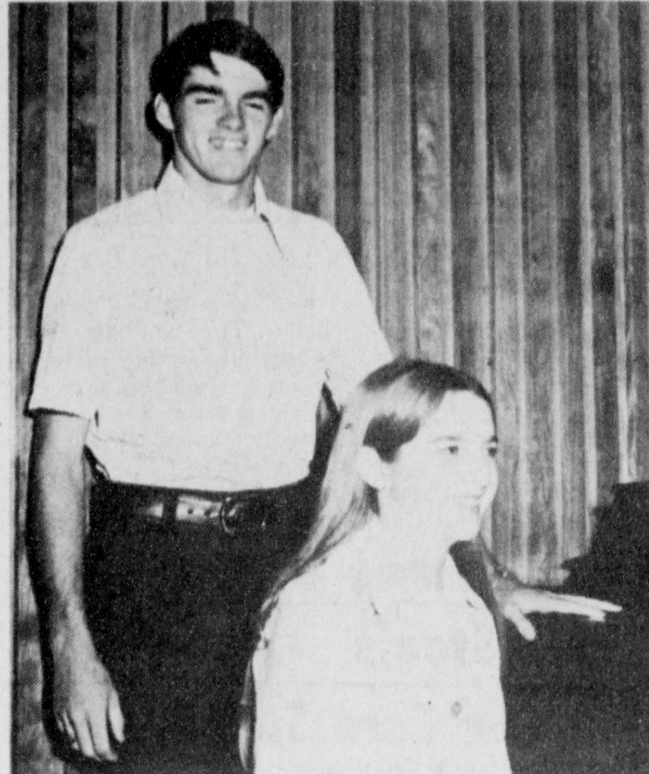

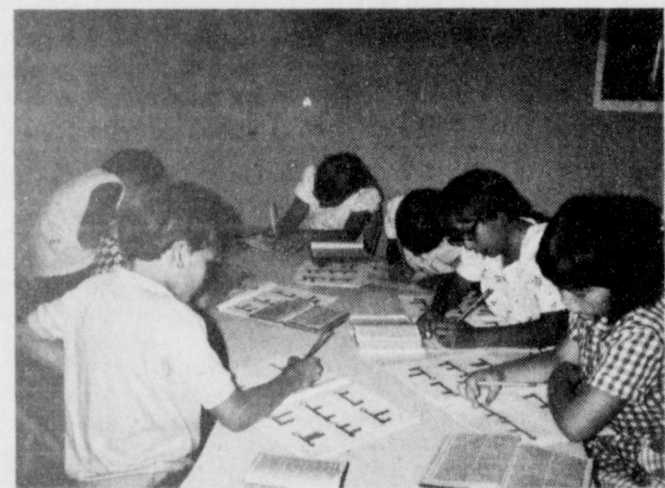
