

Extreme temperatures, as high as 10 times the temperature of the sun, as well as the containment of the fusion fuel at that temperature for the required period of time, are necessary for the creation of controlled fusion reaction. Fusion is viewed by many as the best long-term solution to the energy

Community Public Service and nine other Texas power companies, through the Texas reached in a magnetic Atomic Energy Research Foundation, have been supporting nuclear fusion research since 1957. Utilities transition from the turbulent nationwide joined the effort through their research organization, the Electric Power Research Institute. The Tokamak project represents a partnership of industry, university and government in support of the kind of long-range research necessary to meet the country's future energy needs.

"If the goal of achieving fusion power can be reached, it will indeed be a thermonuclear El Dorado." said Dr. Drummond. "Fusion power plants could provide the world with a virtually unlimited supply of electrical energy. These fusion power plants will not only be attractive from the environmental viewpoint, but also because of their intrinsic safety and the possiblity of very high efficiencies.'

The basic fuel for the fusion reaction is deuterium, an isotope of hydrogen, which can be extracted readily from seawater. Scientists estimate


