Bargains, Prizes

Trade Day Outgrows Space

The Bogata Trade Day officially expanded across Highway 271 to the former location of the Bogata Horse Sale Barn as the members of

the Trade Day Association began coping with the "growing pains" of the event. At meeting time Monday night, all except four of the stalls around the Tip Top Drive In were reserved in advance for the Saturday, October 12 event, and the association voted to open the lot across the street to the traders who were unable to make reservations.

Bargains are expected to be the order of the day at this Trade Day, with garage sale merchandise to be set up in a number of stalls. The proceeds from the rental of the stalls will again go this month to the Bogata P.T.A. for the air conditioning fund, but the Association voted that the proceeds from the November

and December Trade Days be donated to the Toys for Tots program under the direction of the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department. A number of Bogata merchants are donating merchandise to be given away in a drawing at the Trade Day at 3:00 p.m. There is no purchase necessary to register for the prizes, and you do not have to be present to win.

Among those who are donating prizes are United Dollar Store, Robert Shaw Decorator Clock; Lassiter Hardware, Everready Lantern; Joe Ford, five pounds of sugar; Turner's Dry Goods, \$10.00 gift certificate; Magic Fashion Beauty and Gift Shop, 5x7 picture frame; Bogata Furniture, set of boudoir lamps; and Simms-

Moore, room of paint; and Kisser's Grocery, three pounds of Folger's coffee.

All the prizes to be given away at the Trades Day will be displayed on the porch of the Tip Top.

In other action, the Association elected Tommy Varner treasurer and authorized him to open an account at the Bogata First National Bank for the Association.

City Marshal Jon Latimer will be on hand Saturday to help direct traffic during the Trade Day.

The next Bogata Trade Day Association meeting was set for 7:00 p.m. in the Community Public Service Building October 21.

PTA Harvest Festival Set Saturday, Oct. 12

The Bogata PTA will sponsor a Harvest Festival October 12, at the Bogata school campus from 4-7:30 p.m.

There will be the traditional halloween games inside the buildings and cake walks, animal walks, dunking tank, clowns selling helium filled balloons and various other attractions outside. Even an old car demolition derby. Prizes will be given to every one participating in each game. Bingo will be in the elementary building.

Sandwiches, homemade pie, drinks, popcorn, snowcones, homemade candy and probably other items of food for sale.

The entire proceeds of this Festival will be used for the air conditioning indebtedness.

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Work Planned To Raise Highway 37 South Of Bogata

Highway construction contracts let in September by the Texas Highway Commission include Paris area work.

The work, supervised by District Engineer James W. Cravens, will be in Franklin County.

A contract was awarded to J. E. Howard, Inc. of Detroit. Low bid was \$489,277.97.

The project, which will require an estimated 175 working days, will be under Highway Department Engineer Bob B. Baker of Mt. Vernon.

The contract is for grading, structures, flexible base and two course surface treatment on State Highway 37 from 0.5 mile south of the Red River County line, southward 0.9 mile.

The completion of this project will provide a high water crossing of Sulphur River on State Highway No. 37 between Bogata and Mt. Vernon where in the past overflows have made it necessary to close the highway several times each year. A previous project which was completed in October 1973 provided a

higher roadway embankment, new pavement and three new bridges—the bridge across the main channel and two relief structures—for the portion of the highway extending from 0.7 mile north of the Red River-Franklin County Line southward to the north end of this current project. This previous project was constructed by R. C. Buckner of Jacksonville, Texas, the prime contractor, and sub-contractor Spencer Construction Co. of Carrollton, Texas and J. E. Howard and Son Construction Co. of Detroit, Texas. The cost of this work was \$1,033,137.35.

Supper Slated At Hagansport

There will be a chicken and dressing supper, along with homemade pies, at the Hagansport Community Center, Tuesday evening, October 15, beginning at 5:00 p.m. Prices will be the same as daily meals served at the center. For those age 60 and above, 75 cents and 60 years and under, \$1.25.

Board Changes Grading Practices

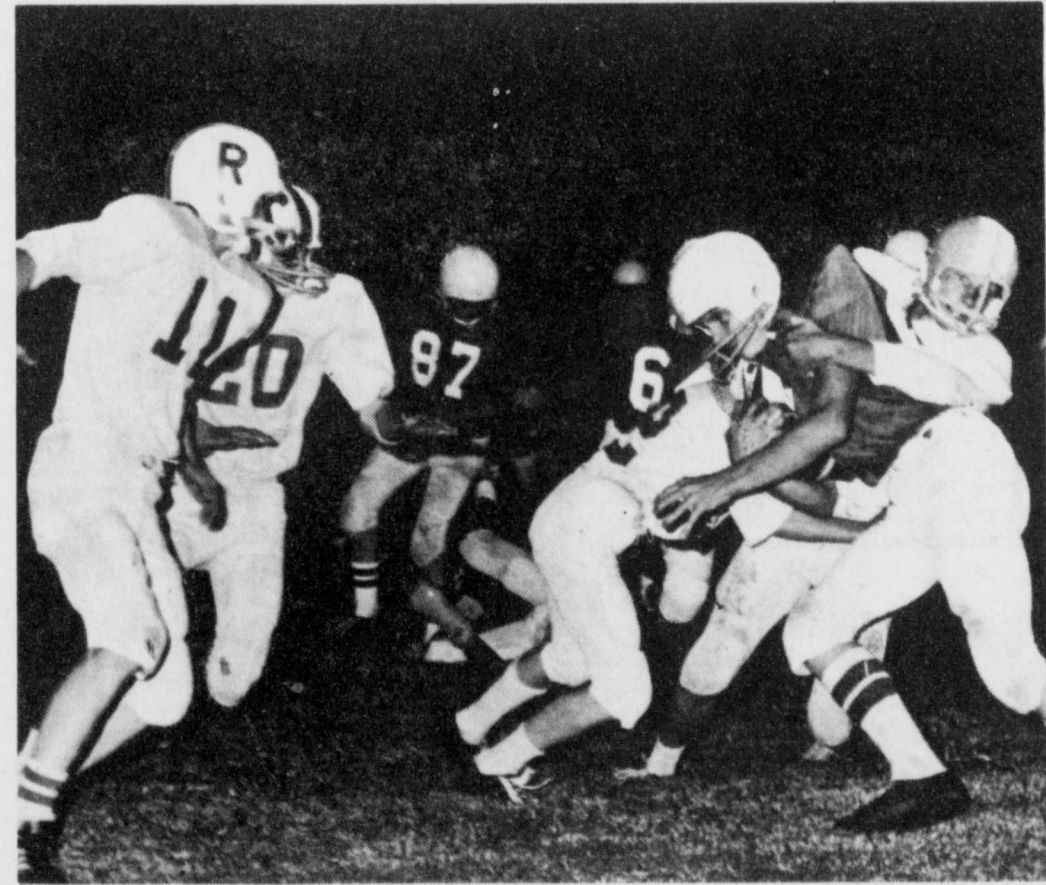
In major action taken by the Talco-Bogata School Board October 1 approval was given to changes in the grading practices at Rivercrest as follows: (1) do away with the policy of 58 being the lowest grade that a student can make, and (2) lower the passing grade to 60 so as to eliminate as much as possible the practice of adjusting grades. While there was not complete agreement on this matter, a majority of the Board agreed to permit the Rivercrest faculty to try these changes to see if there is a noticeable difference in student effort.

Approval was given to increasing the rate of pay for substitute teachers from \$15.00 to \$17.50 per day. Except for the days allowed under the State approved sick leave program, teachers are responsible for paying for their substitute when they must be away from school. Also, the Board agreed that all classroom teachers would be paid on the same salary schedule for instructional purposes as prescribed by the State.

In matters pertaining to personnel, Bonita Holbrook was employed as Plan A teacher at Rivercrest and F. T. Wilson was approved as a bus driver. Authorization was also given to the employment of two additional aides as needed in the school district for specialized areas.

In final matters, the Board approved the various financial reports as presented, approved the Preliminary Application for Foundation

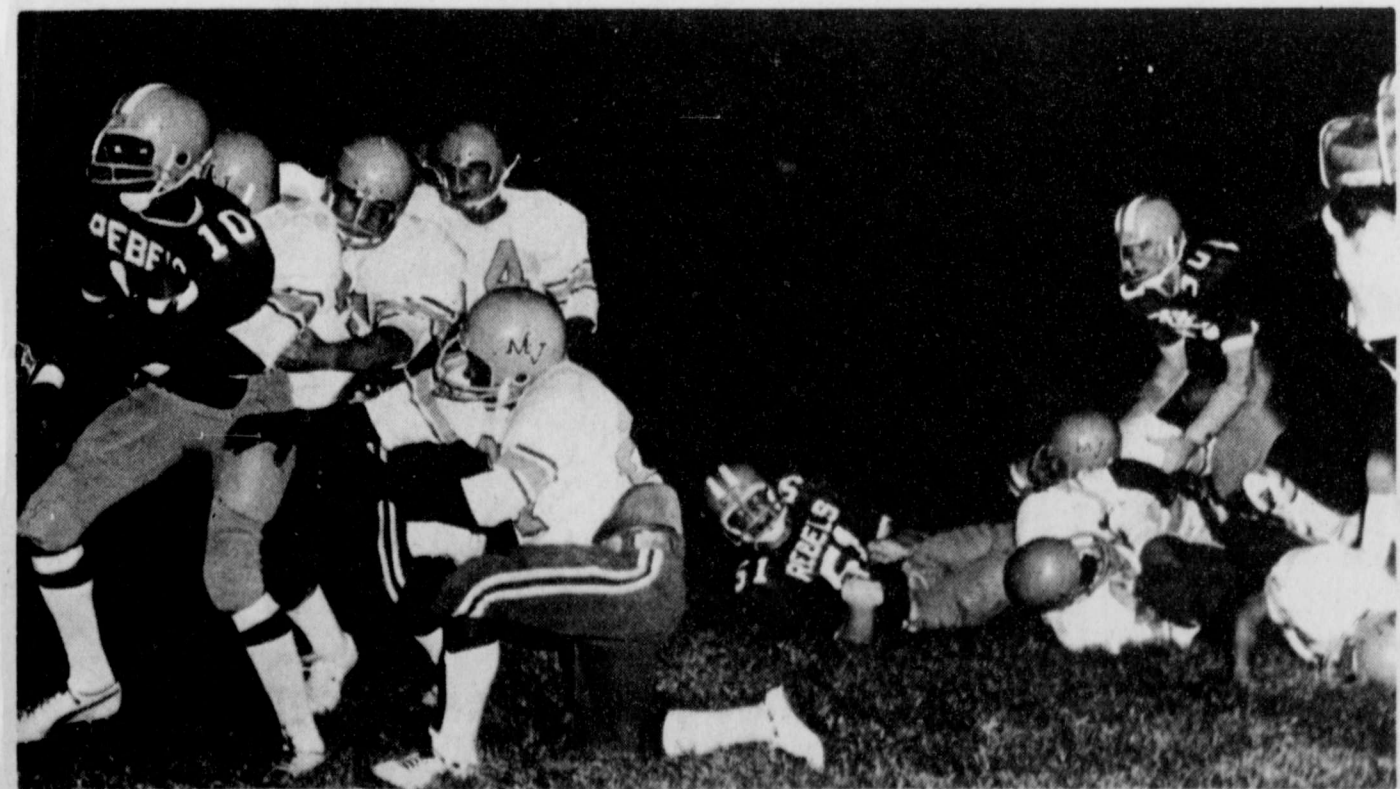
Funds, approved a policy on the use of school vehicles, and agreed on a \$200,000.00 insurance policy on the new vocational facilities. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, November 5, 1974, at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Gentlemen Asked To Leave

City Marshal Jon Latimer confiscated a shotgun, leaded cable, heavy chain and a sledge hammer from 14 men and juveniles in Bogata Tuesday night. The three cars of men were primarily Talco residents, Latimer said, and they were escorted out of town.

Latimer issued one speeding citation this week on a tractor-trailer traveling 52 miles an hour in a 30 mile zone on Highway 271.

At 5:30 Wednesday morning Mrs. Jimmy Stewart of Bogata was traveling west on Hwy. 271 and struck the rear of a cotton trailer that was being pulled without lights. Highway patrol officers investigated the accident. Damage to the trailer was minor, and damage to the Buick automobile amounted to several hundred dollars, Latimer said.

A case involving the theft of a motorcycle was brought before Justice of the Peace Fate Smith, and disposition is pending.

Tigers Roll For 34-0 Win Over Rivercrest

The Mt. Vernon Tigers, before a Homecoming crowd of over 2,000, practically abandoned their passing game for a grinding ground game to crush the Rivercrest Rebels 34-0 at Tiger field in Mt. Vernon Saturday night.

The Tigers Jim Solomon went to the air lanes on only six occasions with three of them complete for 59 yards. The Tigers amassed a net of 285 yards rushing while the Tiger defense held the Rebel offense to only 86 net yards rushing.

Rebel Quarterback Jimmy Curties went to the airways 29 times, completing 10 for 97 yards. The Rebels threatened only one time and that was in the final seconds of the first half when they drove to the Tiger two with only three seconds left on the clock. Glen Fulbright was stopped on the one yard line as the clock ran out. Fulbright was the Rebel's leading rusher with 58 yards on 11 carries. End Gary Neill was on the receiving end of five of Curties passes for a total of 52 yards.

Halfback J. L. Wilkerson led the Tiger rushing game with 116 yards on 19 carries. Fullback Jimmy Justiss carried 15 times for 75 yards.

Running back Mike Jagers only carried the ball one time during the entire game but that one run was good for 37 yards and the Tigers first score with 4:27 left in the first half. Jagers kicked the extra point.

Tiger Guard Dale Hill recovered Rebel Randy Jones fumble on the Rebel 35 on the first play of the second

quarter. Solomon proceeded to hit Split End Rick Newsom for 35 yards and the second Tiger touchdown on the next play. Newsom took the ball around the five yard line and raced across the goal line from that point. Jagers attempt to kick the point was blocked.

Each team missed scoring chances before the half ended. Wilkerson intercepted a Rebel pass which he returned to the Rebel seven. Jerry Curties recovered a Justiss fumble at the Rebel six on the Tiger's second play. The Rebels managed to get to their own 15 in three plays. The Tigers were penalized five yards on the fourth down punt by the Rebels giving the Rebels a first down on their own 20. A 28 yard scamper by Fulbright, three completions for 16, 5 and 12 yards and an interference call against the Tigers moved the ball to the Tiger two with only a few seconds left on the clock. Fulbright's try over left tackle was stopped at the one yard line as the clock ended the first half.

Following the Tiger kickoff to open the second half the Rebels were forced to punt without gaining a first down. Following the punt the Tigers marched from their 41 in eight plays to score with 6:38 left in the third period. The Tigers came close to botching the scoring chance as the Rebels forced a Wilkerson fumble as he circled left end on a pitchout. The loose ball bounced into the end zone where Condrey recovered for a Tiger touchdown. Jagers kick for the point was good.

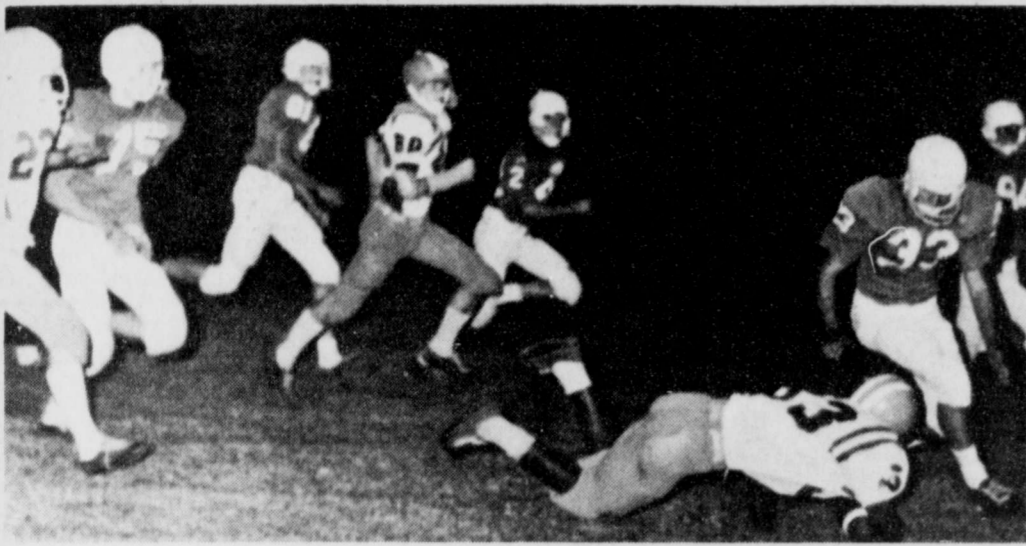
The next Tiger touchdown was set up when Bob Morris intercepted a Rebel pass at his own 32. Two rushing plays and two pass completions by Solomon for 14 and 10 yards moved the Tigers to the Rebel

36. Wilkerson broke through center on the next play and raced the remaining 36 yards to score with 3:23 left in the third period. Jagers kick

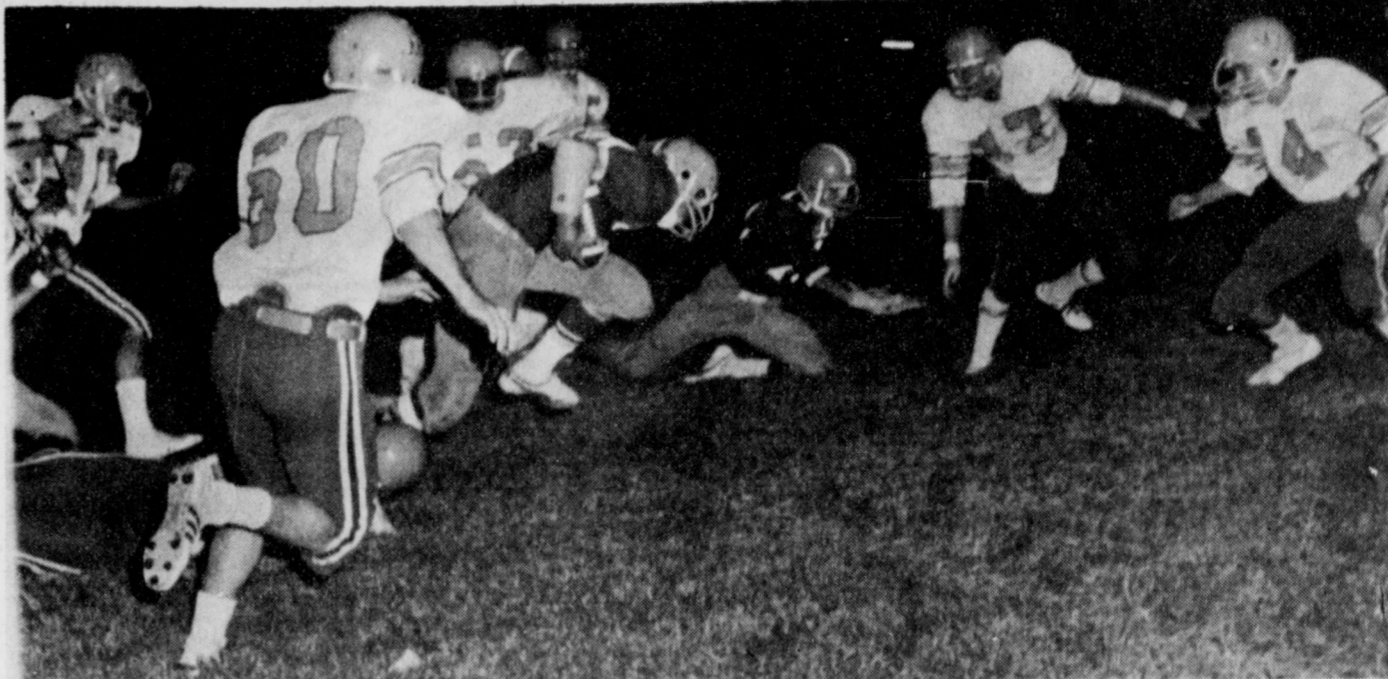

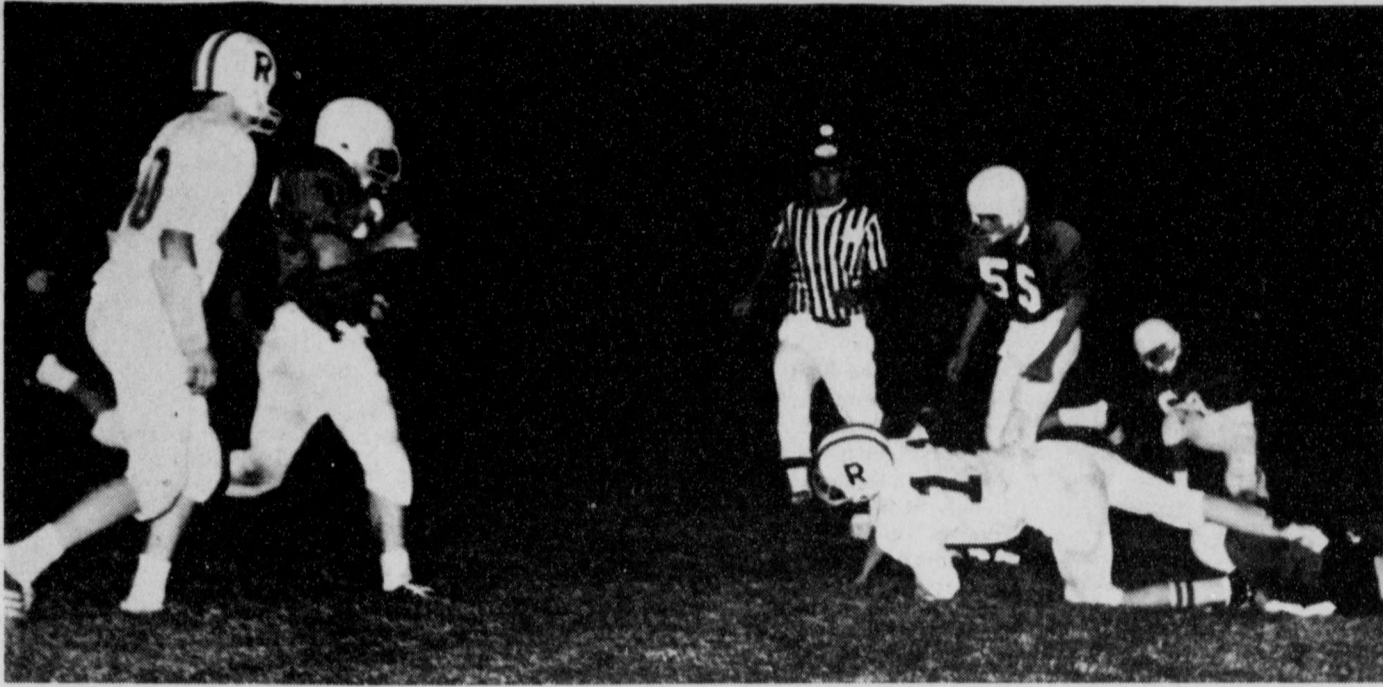

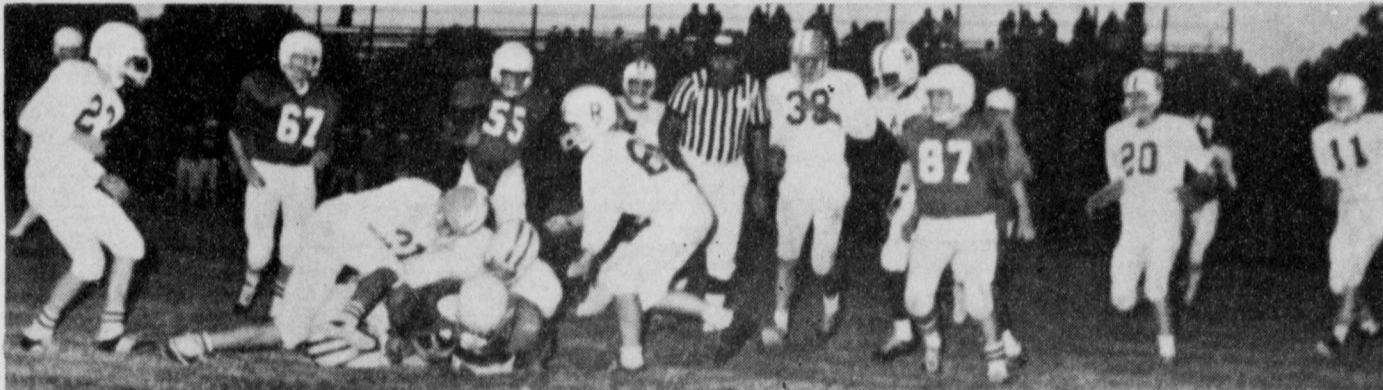

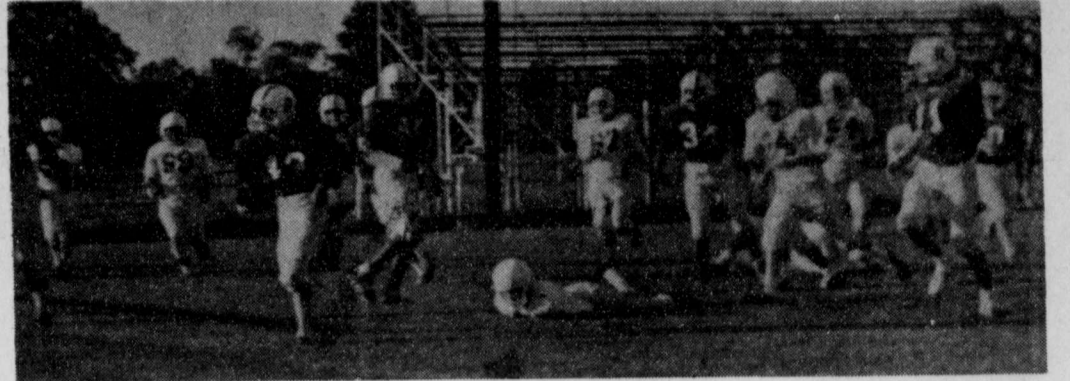

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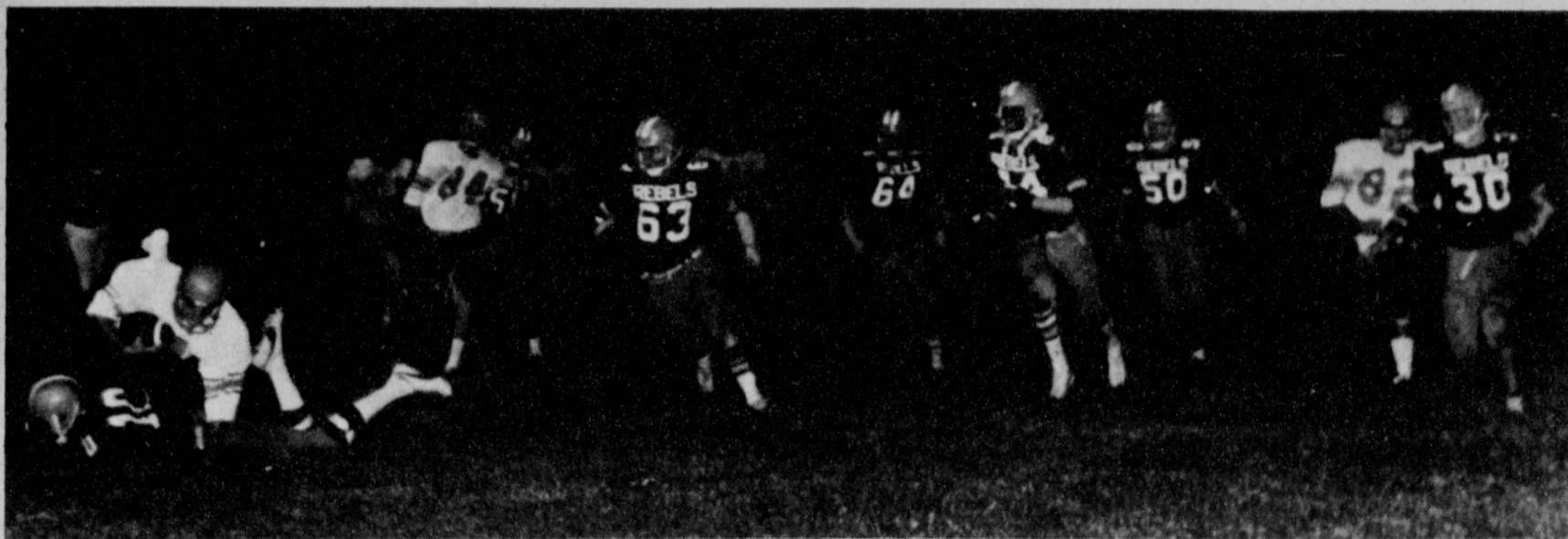

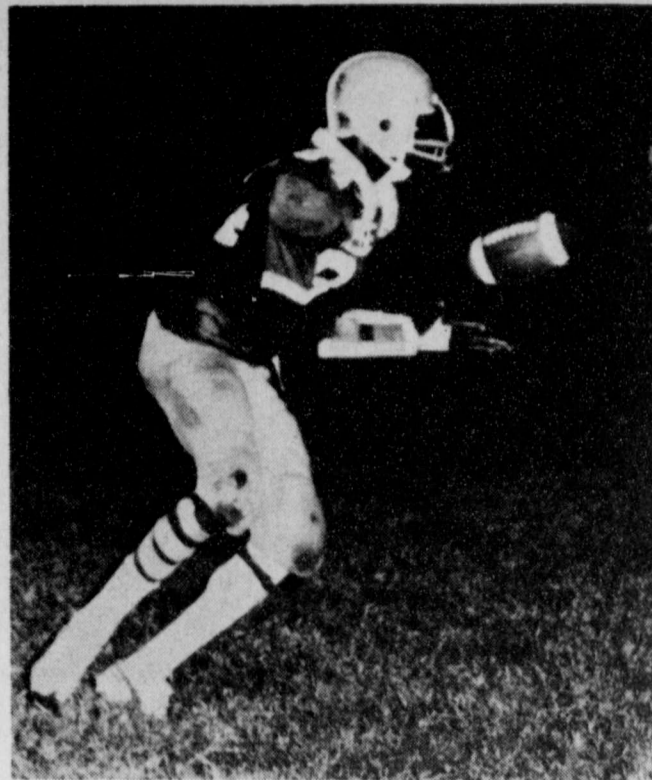
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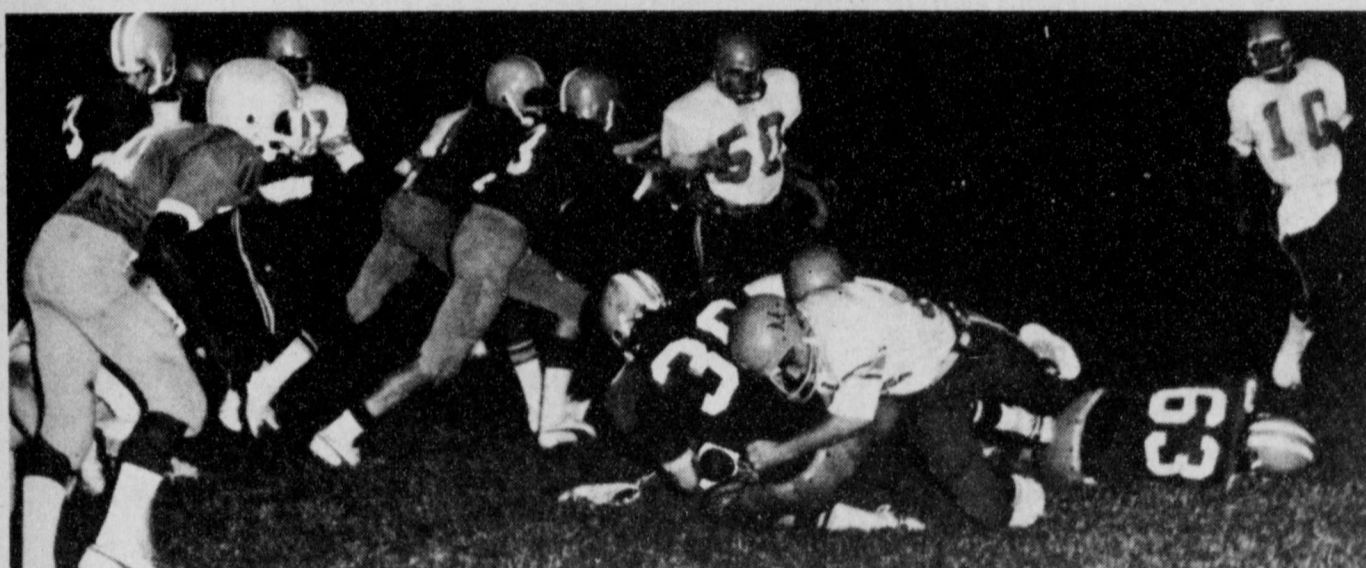
