

To get the number of a telephone in another city, the caller can dial the universal directory assistance number, "1" plus the area code (if different from 214), plus 555-1212. There is no charge for a call to this number.



According to Floydell Stevenson, son of the late Leora Stevenson, postmaster, the house was built in 1913 and housed the Post Office until 1930. In Wright Patman's pamphlet, "A History of Post Offices and Communities," the Post Office was moved from Goolesboro, just east of Talco, to the Talco town site August 4, 1910, and Mrs. Quinton Loveless was the Postmaster at that time. This may have been when the office was housed in the Meadows building on the corner of 6th and Broad for a short time. Old timers agree that the Stevenson building was the first to house just the post office.

Seems as if the Post Office and the train depot were the social gathering places for the town's young people. Many have said that the boys and girls of that time would meet at the post office to do their courting

Mrs. Leora Stevenson was Postmaster until 1930 when the office was moved behind the Talco State Bank and Mrs. Stella W. Schultze was appointed Postmaster. In January 1935 Ferris Brown was appointed Postmaster and held that position until December 1, 1943, when his father retired as a rural route


