

David Houston To Appear In Deport

David Houston, country and western singer with the Grand Ole Opry, will appear in Deport in person in two shows at 7:00 and 9:00 p.m. October 29, at the elementary school gym.

Also appearing will be the Persuaders and Shoji Tabuchi, a Japanese native who fiddles Bob Wills tunes such as "San Antonio Rose", "Faded Love" and "Cotton Eyed Joe."

Admission to the program will be \$1.75 for children and \$2.75 for adults, and it is

sponsored by the Deport PTA.

David Houston was destined to be a recording star from the time he was born. With a Godfather like Gene Austin, who sold over 88 million records himself, and David's natural born talent, he made his first major professional appearance at the age of twelve on the famous "Louisiana Hayride" out of Shreveport, Louisiana.

As a teenager, David took to the road with two other young hopefuls, Johnny Cash and Elvis Presley. Today the

three of them can laughingly look back on the hard times of the past.

David had his first record on Imperial and in later years recorded for RCA Victor, National Recording Company, Phillips Records, Sun Records and finally Epic Records, his present employer.

His first big hit was "Mountain Of Love", but it was the song "Almost Persuaded", recorded in the summer of 1966, that made him internationally famous. The year 1967, David virtually walked away with every award accorded a Country and Western artist, including...No. 1-Billboard, No. 1-Cash Box, No. 1-Record World and the No. 1 Country Record and No. 1 Performance awards at the Grammy Awards. An outstanding follow-up to his 1966 "Most Promising Artist" award in Billboard.

David has continued his number one success with every recording since "Almost Persuaded". His recent big hits include "Baby, Baby", "I Do My Swinging At Home", "A Woman Always Knows", "After Closing Time" (with Barbara Mandrell), "Soft, Sweet & Warm" and "Good Things."

With Number One singles, it is natural that David's albums should continue year after year to be among the highest on the charts. A few of his most successful albums include "Almost Persuaded", "A Woman Always Knows", "Wonders Of The Wine" and "Baby, Baby".

The Bossier City, Louisiana man has appeared on such top television shows as the Johnny Carson Show, The

Merv Griffin Show, The Johnny Cash Show, The Lawrence Welk Show, The Donald O'Connor Show, The Best On Record and a special tribute to the late Spade Cooley on the Huntley-Brinkley Show, in addition to the Orange Bowl Parade and The Macy's Thanksgiving Parade. David has also appeared in the movies "Cotton Pickin'" "Chicken Pickers" and "Horse Soldiers", starring John Wayne.

David Houston, who is the newest member of The Grand Ole Opry, travels with his show which includes seven members, approximately 350,000 miles per year in his Silver Eagle bus, working 270 to 280 days per year. Apparently, from audiences reactions to David's appearance, he is welcome back anytime he wants to return.

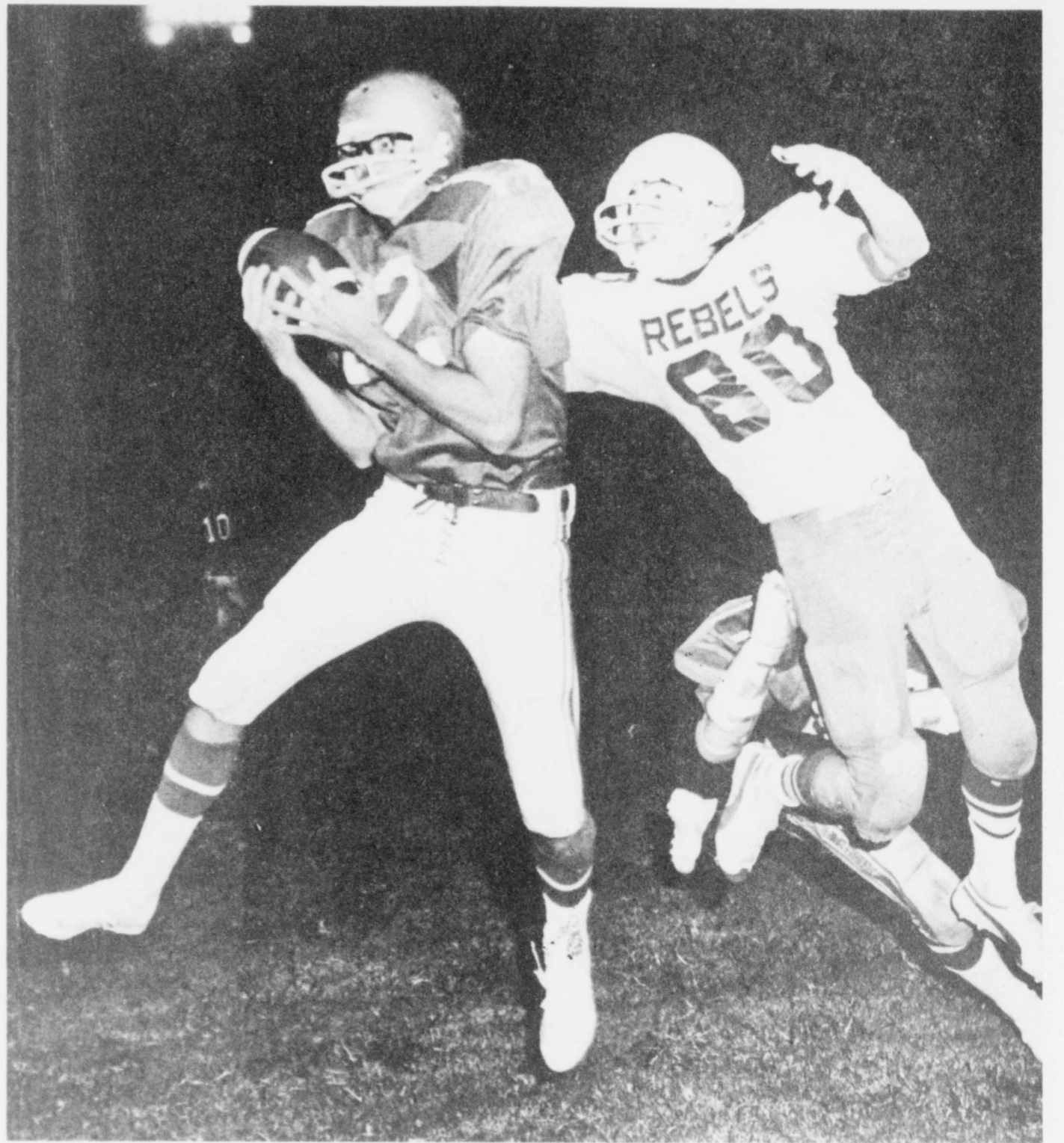
Deport Post To Observe Vets Day Nov. 11

Better Long Distance Dialing Service Coming To Talco

New telephone equipment that automatically records the telephone number of one party customers when they dial their own long distance calls is being installed in Talco, according to Don Bishop, Henderson division manager. Bishop said the new equipment will be cut into operation at 8:00 a.m. on October 31.

"Using the system is simplicity itself," said Bishop. Station-to-station calling is called "One Plus" dialing, since the customer simply dials "1", plus the area code (if different from 214), plus the telephone number. After dialing the digit "1", a pause of over 4½ seconds will cause

the equipment to dis-engage. Therefore, before placing a direct distance dial call, you

should know your number in advance.

Calls requiring the assistance for an operator are called "Zero Plus" calls. The customer dials zero, plus the area code (if different from 214), plus the telephone number. An operator will come on the line briefly to render the necessary assistance, then the call will be completed.

For technical reasons, on calls placed from two, four and eight-party telephones, the operator will ask the calling party the number from which the call is being placed.

There will be no change in the method of placing local calls.

"To be able to dial a long distance call, the caller must know the area code and the telephone number of the party he is calling," Bishop said. "We've made this easy for the customer, too."

Area codes for most major cities and towns can be found in the front of the telephone directory. If it is not listed there, the operator can furnish it.

To get the number of a telephone in another city, the caller can dial the universal directory assistance number, "1" plus the area code (if different from 214), plus 555-1212. There is no charge for a call to this number.

Bulldogs Drop Rebels, 46-19

The Rivercrest Rebels lost to the Quitman Bulldogs October 18 at Rebel Stadium 46-19. The Bulldogs are expected to finish high in the ranks of District 15AA.

Quarterback Jimmy Curties posted his best record of the season, leading the Rebel team in yards gained on the ground and in yards passing, completing nine of 16 attempts for 118 yards, and piling up 61 yards in 10 carries. Curties made two first downs on the ground, and was not intercepted.

Halfback Glenn Fulbright was back at full strength against the Bulldogs, and carried 12 times for 40 yards. Fulbright made three first downs and caught two Jimmy Curties passes for 20 yards. One pass attempt by Fulbright was incomplete. Fulbright returned a kickoff for 38 yards.

Lonnie Harris was credited with two first downs, and caught one Curties pass for 30 yards. Harris was called upon to make two halfback passes, and both were intercepted.

Clyde Brown made two Rebel first downs, recovered a fumble by Jimmy Curties, and caught two Curties passes for 20 yards. Brown carried seven times for 17 yards.

Sammy Ellis carried on time for seven yards and returned a kickoff for 15 yards.

Gary Neill made two first downs and caught three Curties passes for 25 yards. Neill returned two kickoffs for 10 yards.

Andy Williams recovered one Bulldog fumble and Owen Davis recovered one.

Jerry Curties attempted two passes, one incomplete and one intercepted, and caught one of 13 yards. Curties kicked off 4 times for

151 yards and punted three times for 97 yards.

The Rebels bad luck started when the Bulldogs won the toss and elected to receive, then scored in six plays and put the ball through the uprights for an extra point. The Rebels' first possession ended when Fulbright fumbled and Quitman recovered on the Rivercrest 45. Quitman scored once more in the first quarter, but was unable to convert, leaving the score at 13-0 at the end of the first period.

One Rebel possession in the first quarter resulted from a fumble by the Bulldogs recovered by Rebel Roger Kuhl.

The first play in the second quarter brought another Bulldog fumble, recovered by Owen Davis on the Rivercrest 36 yard line. Quarterback Jimmy Curties broke loose and went over the center, running 59 yards to the Quitman 10 yard line before he was caught from behind.

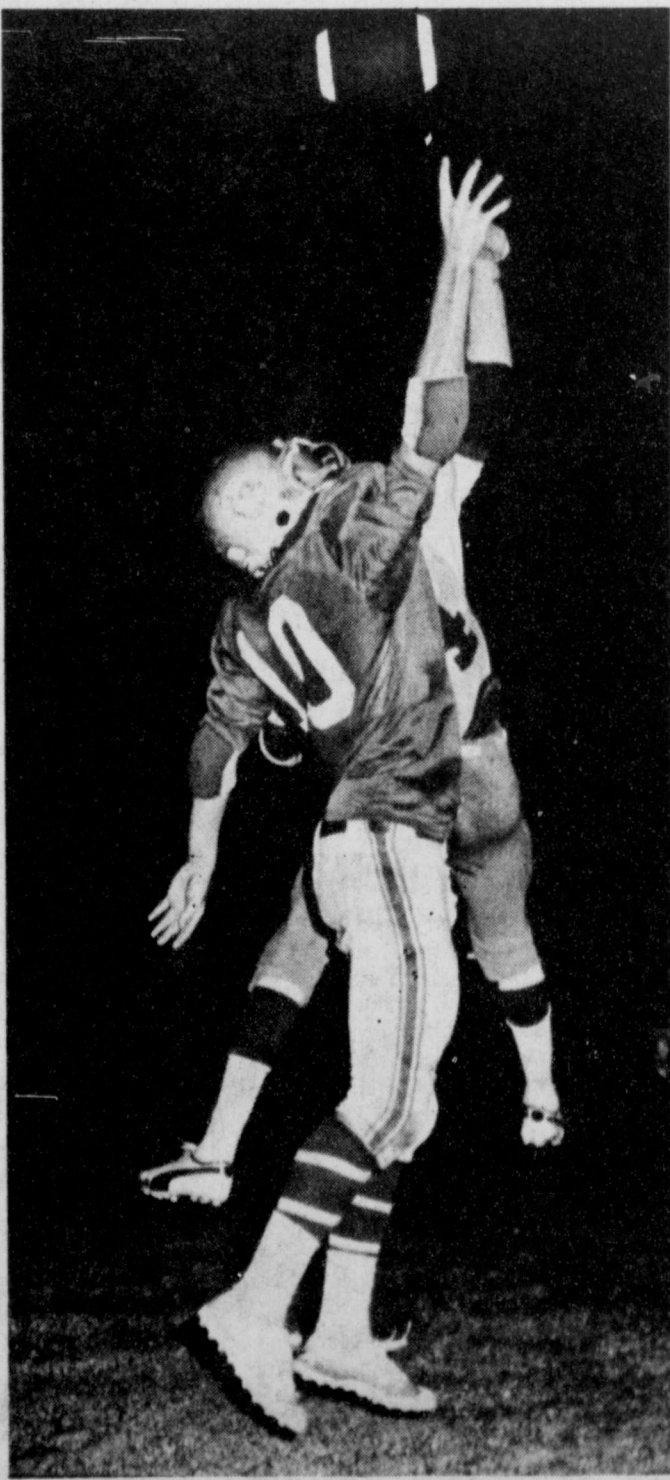
