The District 15AA champion Rebelette basketball team will meet Malakoff in regional competition at North Texas State University in Denton tomorrow night (Feb. 21) at 8:30 p.m. The winner of the

Rivercrest - Malakoff game will play the winner of the Comanche - Joshua game scheduled for Friday at 7:00 p.m.

Malakoff has the same season record as the Rebel-

ettes, winning 22 and losing four. They lost one conference game to Brownsboro to give

them a 10-1 district record as compared to the 10-0 Rivercrest record. Malakoff beat

White Oak last night in by-district play 56 to 28.

"Malakoff has a fine team," Rebelette Coach Larry Tucker said, "and we will have to play one of our better games to beat them. But I really feel like we can win this game."

"They depend a lot on outside shooting," Tucker added. "We are playing the best basketball we have played all season," Tucker said. "Our shooting percentage is high and we have been playing good defense."

In other regional games, Cooper will play Petrolia at 3:30 Friday afternoon and Carroll will play Robert E. Lee at 2:00 p.m. Friday. The winners of these two games will meet Saturday.

Crocker Winner At Rivercrest

The 1974-75 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow award for Rivercrest High School was presented to Virginia Canfield during the FHA Daddy-Date Night program recently.

Virginia, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Canfield of Bogata, is a senior at

Rivercrest, served as second vice-president of the Future Homemakers for two years and is now serving as treasurer of Area VI FHA. Virginia has received all three levels of Encounter, the FHA degree program.

Virginia won the honor by competing with other seniors in the written knowledge and attitude examination on Dec. 3. She received a silver charm and a letter of congratulations from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the program, and is now eligible for state and national honors.

State Family Leaders of Tomorrow receive a \$1,500 college scholarship while state second-place winners receive a grant of \$400. The state winner also earns for his or her school, a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America", from Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

In the spring, state winners and their faculty advisors will be the guests of General Mills on an expense-paid educational tour which will include Washington, D.C., and Williamsburg, Virginia. A special event of the tour is the announcement of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, whose scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place winners will receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

SCORE Counselors In Bogata

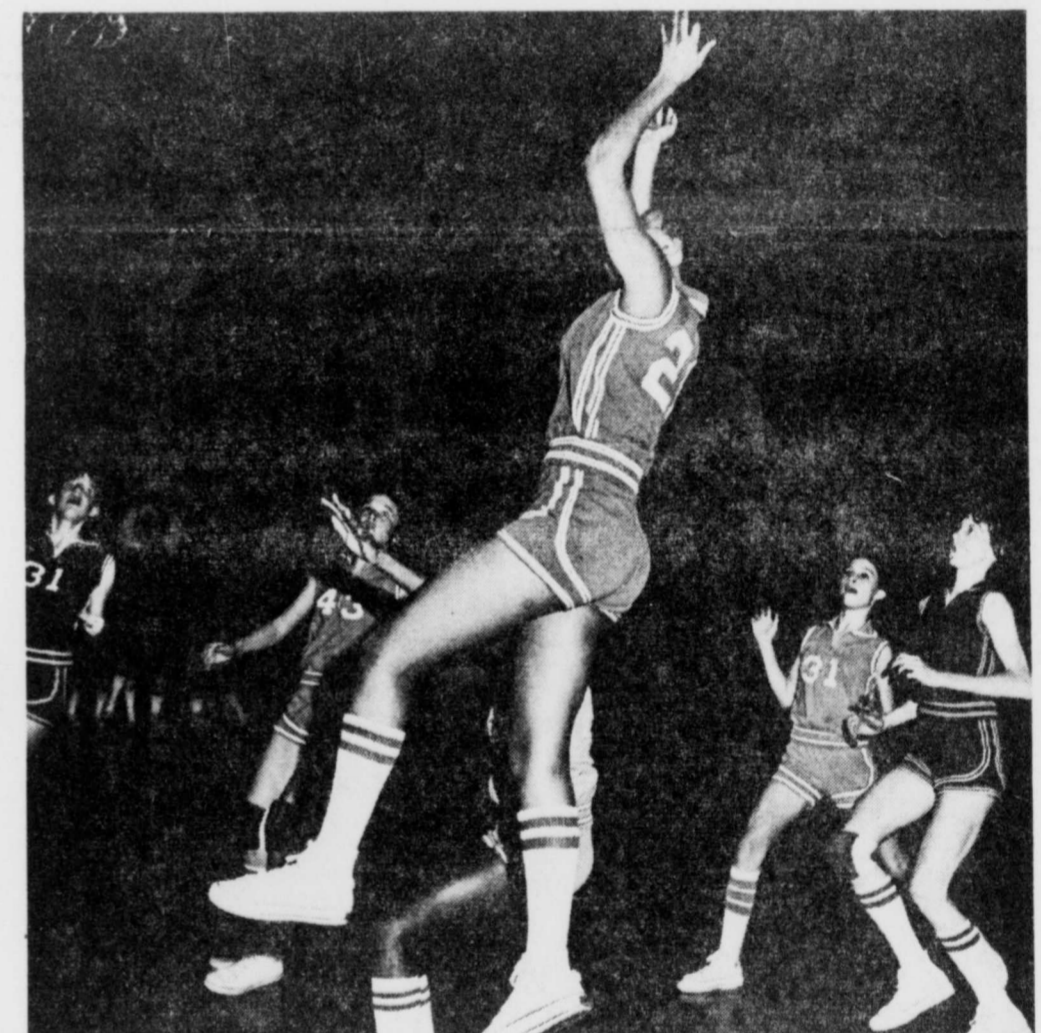

Daylight Savings Time Due Back On Feb. 23

Clocks across the country will be set forward one hour on Feb. 23 as the nation ends four months on standard time.

Beginning at 2 a.m. on Feb. 23, Daylight Saving Time will be in effect for eight months. Then unless Congress intervenes the regular alternating pattern of standard time six months and daylight time six months a year will be resumed in October.

Congress put the nation on 10 straight months of daylight time last year in an energy conservation step. The nation switched to standard time for the four winter months last Oct. 27.

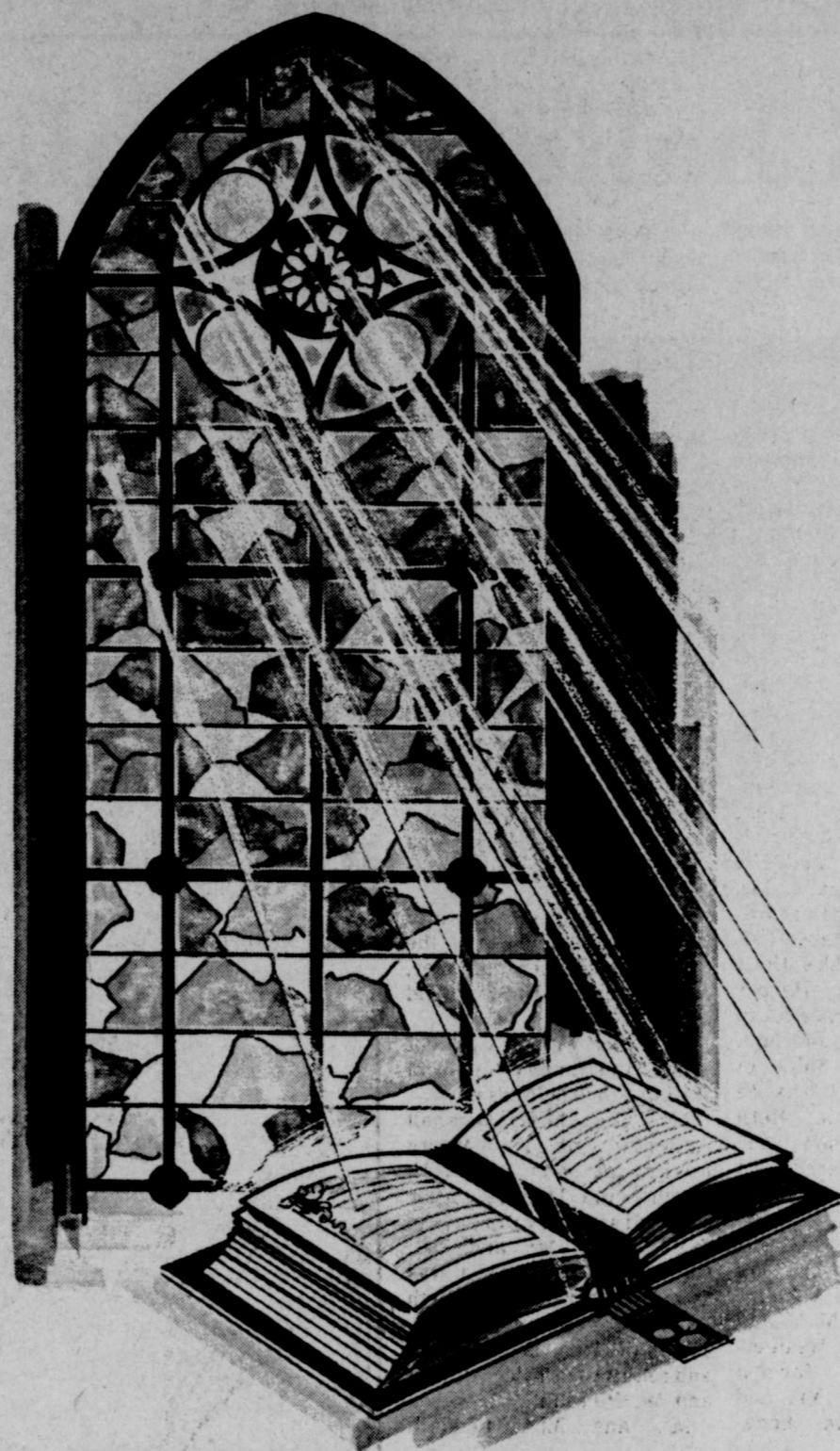

The Sacrifice Of The Body

By Rev. Curtis Hoover
Fulbright Baptist Church
"I beseech you, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Romans chapter 12 verse 1.

Jesus Christ saves the bodies as well as the souls of men. We are for that reason to present our bodies to Him. In the ancient world there were many sacrifices among many religions. The Christian was to give himself as a living sacrifice to his God.

I. Why we ought to sacrifice our bodies.
1. Because of the infinite mercy of God in Christ Jesus.

A. Not because we are afraid of the consequences of evil in our lives. B. Not for the sake of reward, though virtue often has rewards. C. Not as a means of salvation. (Nothing we can do in the form of good works can merit salvation. Salvation is of the Lord.) D. But only for the love of God in Christ toward us. For that reason we should present our bodies as a temple for his abode while we live in this life.

II. Our sacrifice is therefore a thank-offering.

1. How we ought to sacrifice our bodies.

A. It is to be holy sacrifice. I am to be separated from that which is contrary to God

and His will. 16. "And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? For ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. 17. Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, 18. And will be a father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty." (2nd Corinthians chapter 6 verses 16-18.)

B. It is to be an acceptable sacrifice pleasing God through obedience, to his will through obedience, to His

will in our lives.

C. It is to be a living sacrifice. Converts have been won because some have died for Christ and His cause, but more converts have been won because of those who have lived for Christ. (The world had rather see a sermon than hear one)

D. It is to be a reasonable, a rational sacrifice. God does not require us to do the unreasonable thing. We are to give our lives to God with purpose and resolution.

Let us give our bodies with all their powers to God, in loving faith and willing, purposeful obedience, in complete and full surrender to the will of God.

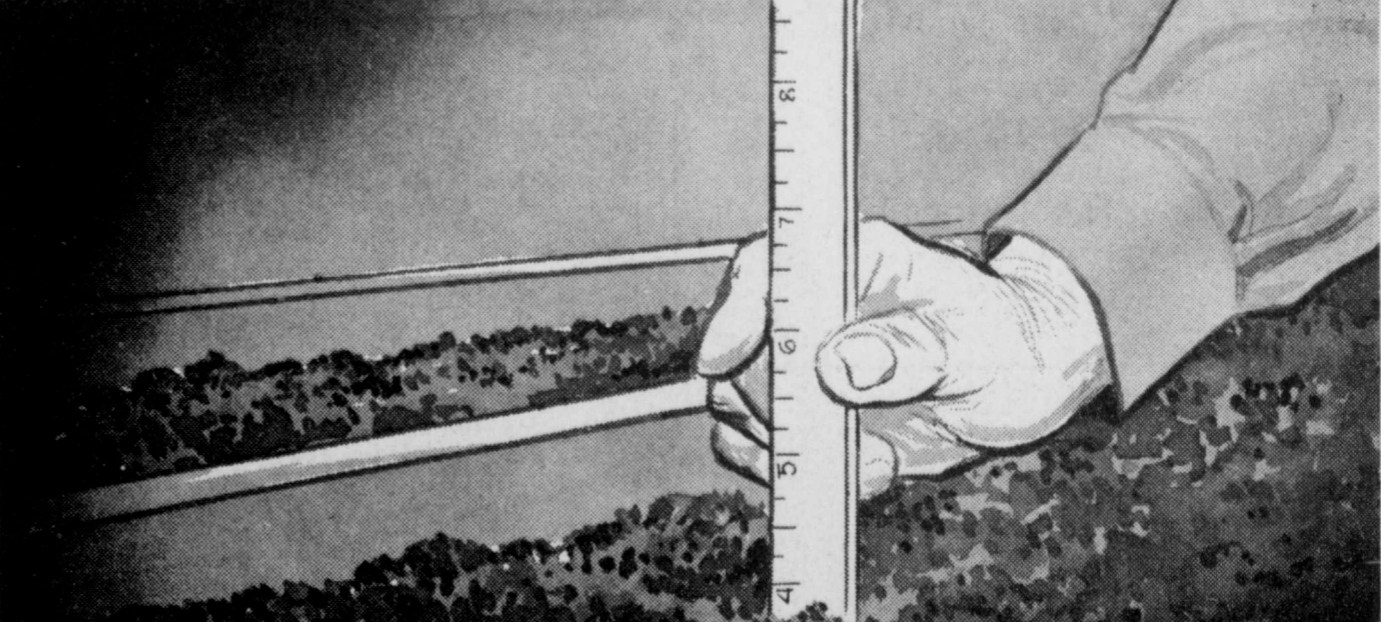

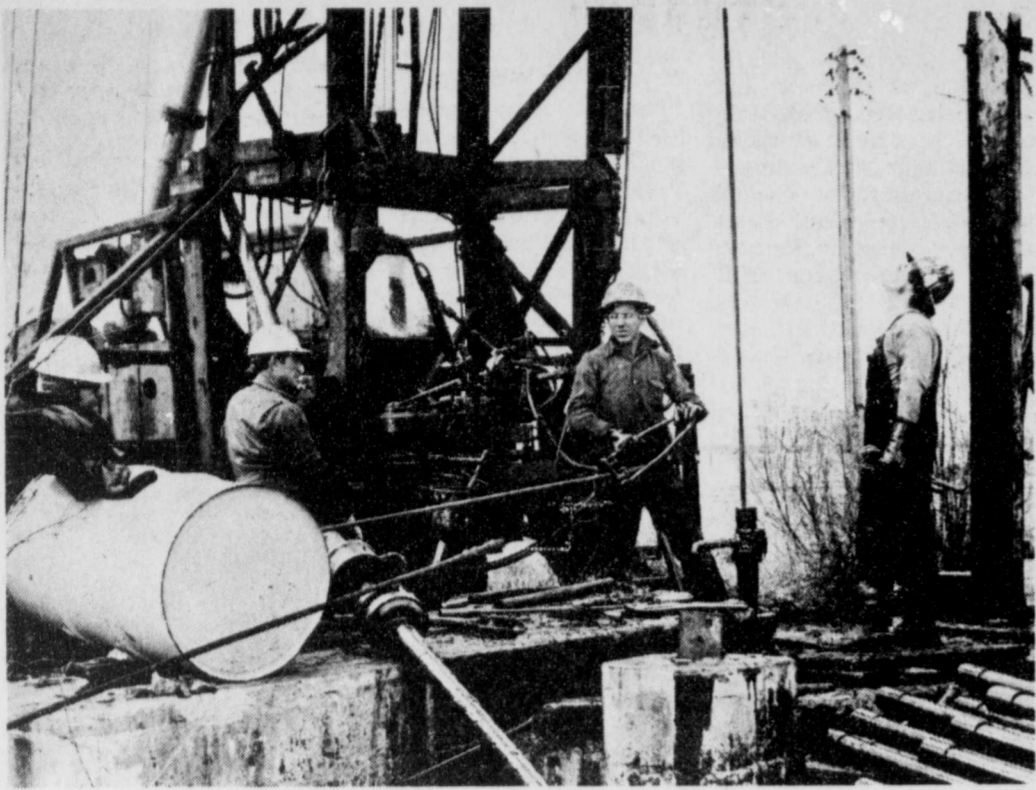

Paul E. Martin
Retired United Methodist Bishop Paul E. Martin, 77, Lamar County native, died in Dallas Thursday at Baylor hospital following a long illness.

Memorial services were held at Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas on Monday at 11 a.m. with interment here at Hillcrest Mausoleum. Officiating were Bishops Paul V. Galloway, William C. Martin, W. Kenneth Pope, O. Eugene Slater, W. McFerrin Stowe and Aubrey G. Walton; Dr. Leighton K. Farrell; and Dr. Joseph D. Quillian, Jr.

The body of Bishop Martin lay in state in Southern Methodist University's Perkins Chapel prior to the memorial services. The bishop had served for eight years as vice chairman of SMU's Board of Trustees and for four years taught at Perkins School of Theology.

Bishop and Mrs. Martin moved to Dallas following his retirement from the episcopacy in 1968. Elected to the episcopacy in 1944, he served as resident bishop of the Arkansas-Louisiana Area for 16 years and of the Houston Area for eight years.

For the past three years, he had acted as an adviser to the Perkins School of Theology dean, Dr. Joseph D. Quillian, Jr. He had studied at Perkins for the ministry in the early 1920's. He was a member of SMU's first student body in 1915.

In addition to his wife, Mildred, he is survived by an uncle, Judge Eugene Black of Washington, D.C., and several cousins.

Bishop Martin served as president of the denomination's Council on World Service and Finance for eight years and as president of the Council of Bishops in 1961-62.

A native of Blossom, he returned there in 1919 following graduation from SMU to become high school principal and, one year later, superintendent of schools. He returned to SMU in 1922 to begin his ministerial training.

As a student minister he served pastorates at Cedar Hill and Maple Avenue Methodist Church in Dallas. Subsequently he served pastorates in Henrietta, Iowa Park, and Greenville prior to becoming superintendent of the Wichita Falls District in 1935.

Three years later he became pastor of the First Methodist Church of Wichita Falls. There he came to know Mr. and Mrs. J.J. Perkins and was instrumental in involving the Perkins family in creatively supporting SMU's theology school, which was subsequently named in their honor.

Bishop Martin was a preacher, administrator and author. He was the subject of a biography by Walter N. Vernon, "Forever Building," published in 1973. Buildings at the Perkins School of Theology quadrangle and at Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, were named in honor of the bishop and his wife.

Mr. C. A. Tatum, Jr., chairman of the SMU Board of Trustees, said, "Bishop Martin was a man of foresight and insight who devoted his life to furthering the institutions which embody mankind's highest ideals."
