Daylight Savings Time Due Back On Feb. 23

Clocks across the country will be set forward one hour on Feb. 23 as the nation ends four months on standard time

Beginning at 2 a.m. on Feb. 23, Davlight Saving Time will be in effect for eight months. Then unless Congress intervenes the regular alternating pattern of standard time six months and daylight time six months a year will be resumed in October.

Congress put the nation on 10 straight months of daylight time last year in an energy conservation step. The nation switched to standard time for the four winter months last Oct. 27.
