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## Rebels Second In District Track Meet

The Rivercrest Rebel track team put on a tremendous running performance and nearly took the District Championship away from the Quitman Bulldogs. Quitman won their second straight district title, scoring 131½ points to Rivercrest's 127.

Quitman had amassed 77½ points in the field events to only 25 for Rivercrest. Rivercrest had a chance to win the championship but had to win the mile relay, which was the last event and Quitman had to finish no higher than fifth. Quitman made fifth but the Rebels could do no better than third.

Coach Dobbs had nothing but praise for the efforts given by the Rebel athletes. "We are not real pleased with our athletic year and this seemed to lift our spirits a lot," Dobbs said. No one was supposed to come close to Quitman but Dobbs had said earlier that Rivercrest would contend for the championship if every one stayed healthy. Randy Jones and Harvey McCoy were out earlier in the year but Jones came back about three weeks ago and McCoy, with a bleeding ulcer, just started running again last week. "Everyone had a tremendous attitude about wanting to win and we almost did it. This showed a lot of character in our young men," Dobbs said.

Jerry Curties was the leading point man at the district track meet with a total of 28 points. We won the pole vault with a jump of 12 feet, won the 330 intermediate hurdles with a time of 42.0 seconds and second in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 15.5 seconds.

Glen Fulbright ran a 9.9 seconds 100 yard dash which was the fastest in the history of the 15AA district. He also ran on the winning 440 yd. relay team and won the 220 yd. dash as well as sixth in the long jump. Fulbright scored 26 points in the meet.

Jimmy Curties, Jerry's twin brother, was second in the high jump, third in the intermediate hurdles 330 yd., and third in the 120 high hurdles. Harvey McCoy was on the 440 yd. dash, second in the 220 yd. dash and fifth in the 100 yd. dash.

Randy Jones was on the 440 yd. relay, fourth in the 440 yd. dash and on the third place mile relay team. Gary Neill was on the 440 yd. relay team and on the third place mile relay team and was in the finals of the 220 yd. dash.

## Deport Retail Sales Highest

The city of Deport led Bogata and Talco in sales tax collected during the period from February 18 to April 4. Deport's allocation was \$416,633, followed by Bogata with \$396,433 and Talco with \$311,999. Since the amounts for all

three cities fall short of \$500, payment by the state comptroller's office will be withheld until either the amount tops \$500 or at the end of each third month, regardless of amount.

Checks issued by state comptroller Bob Bullock totaled \$16.1 million.

The new monthly payments replace the old quarterly rebates which Bullock said "were only a step ahead of the Pony Express."

The quarterly system, with a lag of 60 to 90 days between the state getting the tax and

when it went to the cities, had been in use since the first city sales tax went into effect in 1968.

Tuesday's payments went to more than 500 towns and cities for taxes collected between February 18, the cutoff date of the last quarterly payment, and April 4.

In a letter to city officials Bullock said the "quicker payments should be an asset to every city's financial operations" and that "because this money belongs to your citizens we have a responsibility to get it to you as quickly as possible."

Bullock said cities can expect future monthly payments about mid-month. He said the first two months payments can be expected to be less than the payment of the third month of each cycle when quarterly tax payments by merchants come in.

There were 273 towns with allocations of less than \$500 for the first month on the new system.

The volunteers will be leaving an educational leaflet at each home and a "Not at Home" envelope will be left when no one is at home. This envelope may be used to return a donation.

The rural drives are also

The theme of the 1975 Crusade is "We Want to Wipe Out Cancer in Your Lifetime". At the present time, out of six people who get cancer, numbers one and two will be saved. Number three will die but might have been saved with early diagnosis. Numbers four, five, and six will die of cancer which cannot yet be controlled. Only

the result of research can save these patients. This means about one-half of those who get cancer could and should be saved. The key to saving three out of six persons who get cancer, rather than the present two out of six is earlier detection of the disease. This is why it is so important to know and heed cancer's seven warning signals and have regular checkups.

It should be pointed out that even though all cancers cannot be prevented at the present time, some can! Most lung cancers (80 percent) are caused by cigarette smoking, and most skin cancers by frequent overexposure to direct sunlight. These can be prevented by avoiding their causes.

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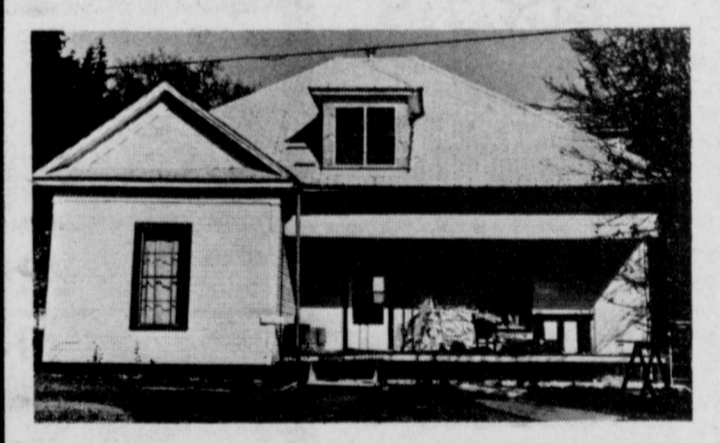

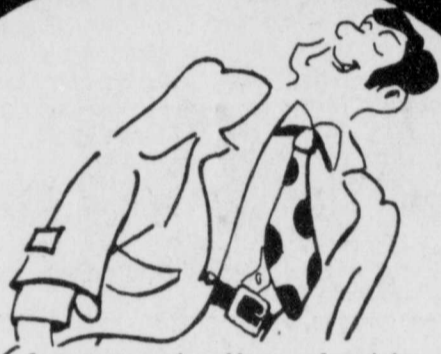
