## Area Airports To Be Discussed

A Texas Airport System joint planning conference will be held at 10 a.m., Tuesday, June 24 in the Grand Ballroom, Student Center, Paris Junior College.

Vernon City Council have indicated they will have representatives at the conference.

Airport development needs of Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, and Red River Counties will be discussed.

Participating in the meeting will be representatives of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, city and county elected officials, airport board members, airport managers, and other citizens.

The Franklin County Commissioners Court and the Mt.

All area citizens with an interest in air transportation and airport development are invited to attend.

Benefits of air transportation to a community are not always well understood. General aviation airports will be examined in relation to community and county development goals.

The Texas Airport System Plan is being developed for Texas and the Federal Aviation Administration by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. Technical assistance is provided by the Texas Transportation Institute of Texas A & M University.

Major activities of the Plan include inventory of existing aviation facilities, forecasting of aviation demand, comparison of present capacity with forecast needs, evaluation of alternative airport systems, developing schedules of required improvements, and identification of alternatives for financial system growth.

## Monthly Tax Payment Made To Cities

Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks worth \$28.8 million Friday to more than 800 towns and cities in the third round of monthly city sales tax rebates.

Period allocations for local towns included Annona, \$221.35; Avery, \$1,132.65; Bogata, \$366.57; Clarksville, \$6,827.22; Deport, \$161.21; Detroit, \$351.89; Mt. Vernon, \$1,837.86; and Talco \$995.86.

Bullock said the June payments were considerably higher than the previous two months because of big end-of-the-quarter tax payments made by merchants following the April 30 deadline for reporting taxes they collected from the public in January, February and March.

sales tax payments to a monthly system in April to get away from the old quarterly rebate system which had been in use since the start of the city sales tax and which forced cities to wait 60 to 90 days for their money.

"The interest alone—at six percent—on the \$16 million we paid in April and the \$19.9 million we paid in May was worth a good quarter of a million dollars to the cities just by not having to wait until now for a quarterly payment," Bullock said.

Every city which has adopted the one percent local tax received payments this month regardless of the size of the rebate. Payments in the first and second month of each three-month cycle are not made on rebates of less than \$500.

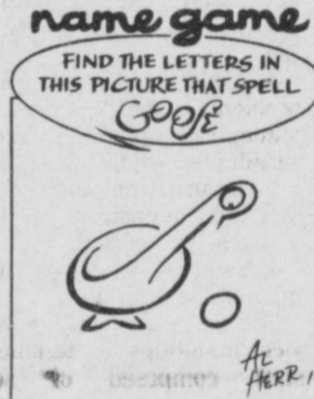
Obviously, G. A. Hines will trade for anything of value, plus give you a good deal on a

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
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## Sherrie Lynn Taylor, Danny Black Are Wed

## Terraces Needed On Cropland

Many acres of cropland in this country are being farmed without any erosion control practices. This has caused an enormous erosion problem and many fields have been abandoned. Many dollars are lost each year when a heavy rain washes crops downstream. It damages roads and fields and fills in water reservoirs.

Terraces can help keep the topsoil in the field and out of the streams. A field with properly engineered parallel terraces will benefit the farmer when a heavy rain comes. A good job requires time in planning and engineering to place the terrace where it will be most beneficial. A field must be grid mapped to determine the location of waterways and to place the terraces parallel. This will eliminate the point rows in most fields.

Waterways need to be shaped and sodded to grass prior to constructing terraces. A properly maintained terrace system will protect the farmer as well as protecting the soil.

Several farmers having fields put to parallel terraces are: Wayland Boyd, Hubert and Harry Moore, and Clovis VanDeaver.

Anyone wishing information on parallel terraces are asked to contact their local Soil Conservation Service.

## Help On Soil And Water

The Soil Conservation Service (SCS) primarily assist individuals and groups through local conservation districts. Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District is managed by five elected board members. The board members are Robert Smith-chairman, James Pearce, vice chairman, Jack Franklin-secretary, Alvin Baird-member, and David Jackson-member. Each board member is elected for a five year term without pay. The district is responsible for soil and water conservation work within its boundaries.

Technical assistance is given by the SCS to rural and urban cooperators of the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. Land users receive assistance in the form of:

1. Onsite assistance in making a conservation plan for their land units.
2. Technical assistance in designing, laying out, and checking the construction and

maintenance of dams, terraces or other structures.

3. Help land users select plants adapted to soil type and land use (cropland, pastureland, forest and wildlife).

4. Assist land users solve problems that arise in managing cropland, pastures, woodlands, wildlife habitat.

5. Information about conservation measures needed on each type of soil.

6. A soil and land-capability map of the land unit.

The Soil Conservation Service maintains a technical staff composed of soil scientist, economist, engineers, agronomist, biologist, foresters, and range management specialist. This technical staff helps land users recognize resource problems and recommends safe use and treatment.

Technical assistance is also available to rural and urban groups, cities, towns, county and state governments. These groups receive assistance from the SCS in the form of erosion control studies, water supply, waste disposal, flood and sedimentation surveys.

Erosion control advise and guidelines are given for highways, subdivisions and shopping centers. Erosion from urban areas can clog streams and lakes and

increase the cost of water purification and road maintenance.

Home builders receives information about soils and their limitations or advantages as a building site from the SCS. Help is also given to local sponsors in developing and carrying out multicounty Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) projects.

The SCS provides technical assistance to any land user regardless of their race, creed or color.

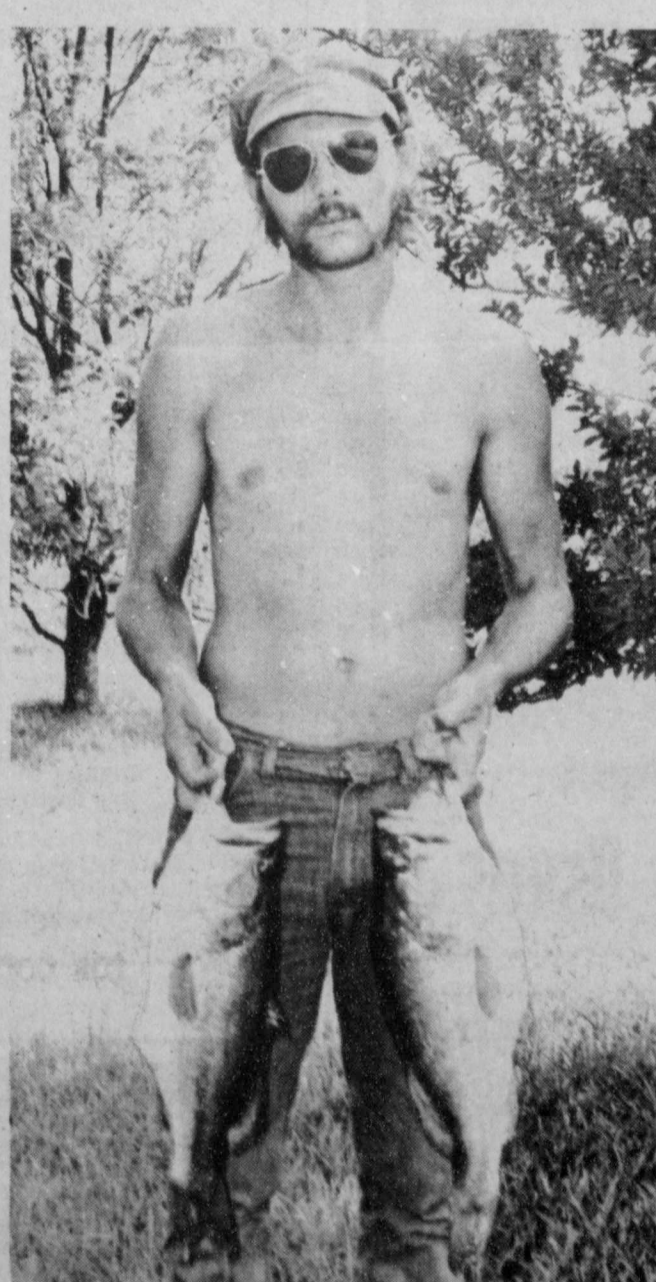

## Grand Jury Hands Down Nine Indictments, No Bills One
