

In addition to regular classes, the student receives daily instruction related to the world of work and the home economics occupation in which he or she is employed. Students of junior and senior standing, 16 years of age of older, are eligible to participate in the program.

Typical occupations in the program are Child Care Aide, Companion to the Elderly, Clothing Assistant, Consumer Aide, Fabric Coordinator, Service Employee, Home Furnishings Aide, and Housekeeping Management

Assistant. The program is set up for one or two years and carries six credits each year. Students will receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation. It is hoped that the program

will enable students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduation from high school.

number of the screwworm cases confirmed this year in Texas have come from the navels of newborn calves. "Working" wounds such as those resulting from shearing, docking, earmarking, branding and castrating are also prime locations for screwworm flies to lay their

"Any working of livestock should be delayed until this fall if at all possible," advises "If such work is absolutely necessary, a USDA-approved spray or dip should be applied to any and






