Chamber Membership Drive In Final Week

Tuesday is the last day to become a charter member of the Bogata Area Chamber of Commerce, according to Kenneth Jefferys, temporary president of the organization. The first general meeting of

the membership of the Chamber of Commerce will be the banquet at the Bogata Elementary School Cafeteria at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 22, and those who have joined at that time will be considered charter members of the civic group, Jefferys said. Of course, members will be solicited and appreciated at any time.

An all out push for membership during the last few days of the drive is expected, with organizers still hoping to gain as many as 150 charter memberships.

"The Bogata Area Chamber of Commerce is open to everyone," Jefferys said, "and the Chamber will

The cost of a plate at the banquet is \$3.00.

Two types of memberships are available in the Chamber, a family membership and a business membership. Dues for a family are \$12 a year and dues for a business are \$25 a year.

Clarksville Legion Post To Build Memorial

The American Legion Post 45 has voted to sponsor a memorial flagpole area in front of the new Legion Building on east U.S. Highway 82, according to an announcement by Henry L. Somerville, Post Commander. Somerville has named S.W. Allen, Jr., to co-ordinate the project which will consist of an inscribed granite marker with a flagpole in an adjacent setting.

"We envision this as a memorial to our deceased

Legionnaires," Allen said, "and the cost will be defrayed by contributions to the memorial fund." Allen stated that a standard \$25 contribution has been set and that the name of any deceased member of Post 45 will be inscribed on the marker upon receipt of the name and the memorial donation.

Mrs. Frank Stubblefield Attends Workshop

Mrs. Frank Stubblefield, homemaking teacher at Riv-

ercrest High School, has completed a five-day training workshop sponsored by the Department of Occupational Education and Technology of the Texas Education Agency. The purpose of the workshop, which was held July 7-11 at the Joe C. Thompson Conference Center, University of Texas, Austin, was to train new teachers for Home Economics Cooperative Education.

Home Economics Cooperative Education is a program which provides in-class instruction and on-the-job training for high school students who are interested in home economics related occupations. The student attends classes at school during a part of each day and is employed for a minimum of 15 hours each week in a home economics related occupation.

In addition to regular classes, the student receives daily instruction related to the world of work and the home economics occupation in which he or she is employed. Students of junior and senior standing, 16 years of age or older, are eligible to participate in the program.

Typical occupations in the program are Child Care Aide, Companion to the Elderly, Clothing Assistant, Consumer Aide, Fabric Coordinator, Food Service Employee, Home Furnishings Aide, and Housekeeping Management

Assistant. The program is set up for one or two years and carries six credits each year. Students will receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation.

It is hoped that the program will enable students who desire to become occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduation from high school.

Mrs. Stubblefield will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate the classroom and practical education.

Have Social Security Checks Deposited Directly To Account

Persons receiving social security checks and other recurring federal payments can now have those checks deposited directly into their accounts without going to the bank.

Under a new law passed by Congress, you need only fill out a single authorization to authorize direct deposits of regular retirement and survivors benefits, supplemental

security income benefits and disability insurance benefits.

This new law helps to insure that federal payments will be deposited on time every month. The recipient of social security income will not need to go to the post office to pick up the checks, and will not have to wait in line at the bank to have the check deposited. Even if the recipient is sick or on

vacation, the payment will be deposited to the proper account automatically.

If you would like to save yourself the trouble of picking up your check at the post office and then taking it to the bank for deposit, ask your bank for a form that would authorize direct deposits. Your checks will be deposited into your account automatically without your ever seeing them.

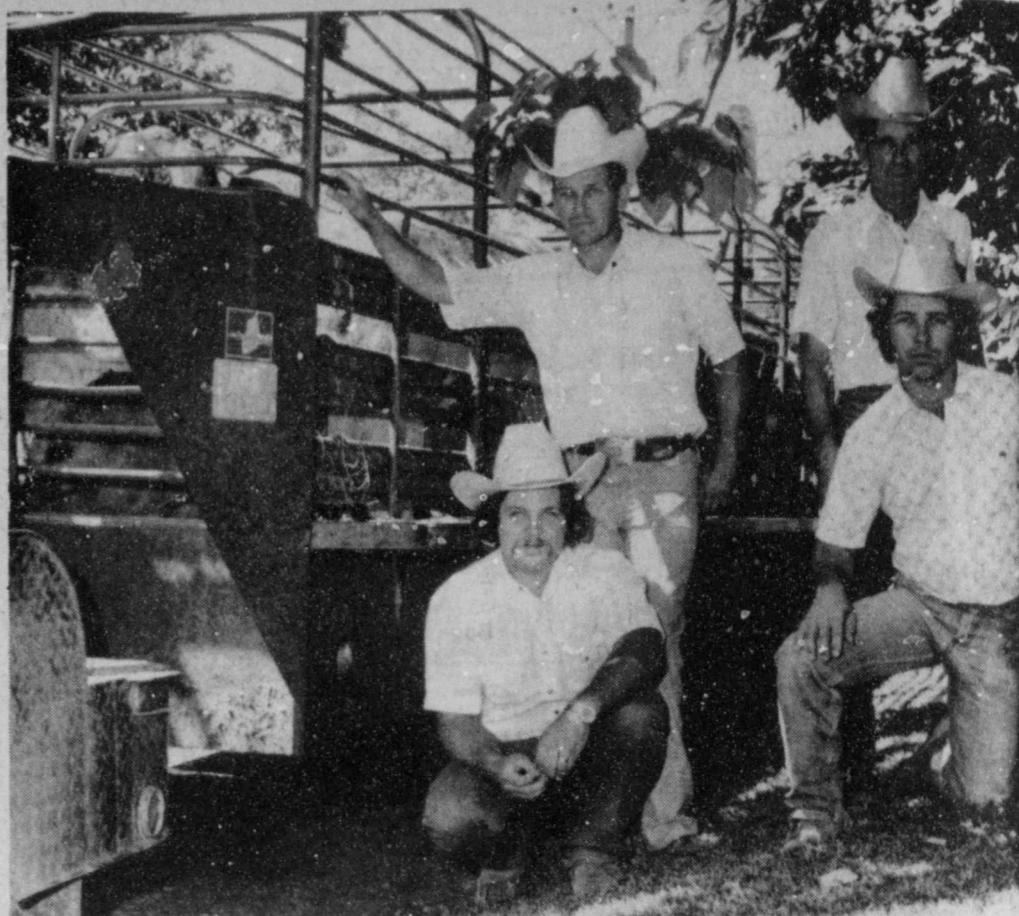
