Big Freddie Kniffen of Clyde said a six-months' goodbye to West Texas courts with an easy 6-0, 6-2 victory over top-seeded Mac Bane of Odessa in the men's singles finals of the Abilene Open tennis tournament Saturday.

Kniffen, who has just completed his tennis eligibility at Hardin-Simmons, leaves this week for six months of military service at Fort Benning, Ga.

Bane, a ministerial student from the Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, got some measure of revenge when he and Barry Pelton, physical education instructor in a Dallas junior high school, defeated Kniffen and Jerry Goad of Abilene for the men's doubles championship.

Bane's upset by the third-seeded Kniffen was not the only match of the eight Saturday finals that failed to follow the script.

Dub Malaise, son of Odessa Basketball Coach John Malaise, polished off first-rated Johnny Paylor of Clyde, 6-0, 6-4, to win the 15 and under boys singles title.

Bill Bane of Odessa and Paylor of Clyde defeated an all-Clyde duo of Robert Darden and Von McClure, 6-1, 6-1, to take the 15 and under boys doubles championship.

No team totals were kept but the 17 titles were divided as follows: Odessa 6, Fort Worth 3, Clyde and Abilene 2 1/2, Garland and Lubbock 1.

Clyde Voters Favor Maintenance Tax

Voters of Clyde Independent School District voted 93 to 8 Tuesday in favor of a Maintenance Tax for the Clyde District, under Senate Bill 116. The maintenance tax is set on a sliding scale, from year to year, on the basis of budget requirements to operate the school. The tax can never exceed \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, plus bond payments. The tax will apply on the 1959 rendition.

Also approved Tuesday, by 88 to 7, was a \$25,000 bond issue, to be used for present needs and repairs of the school property.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE . . .
Congressman Omar Burleson

IT IS DIFFICULT, if not impossible, to identify the real monetary obligations of the Federal Government. We generally know what the Public Debt is supposed to be. We know the amount of the obligations for which appropriated money has not yet been spent. But we do not know the real obligation of the United States Treasury for programs underwritten and guaranteed by the Government.

THE PRACTICE OF FINANCING large scale spending programs by Treasury borrowing without getting the approval of the Congress is a serious defect of our system. In fact, there is considerable doubt that it is a constitutional action.

THE GOVERNMENT IS IN THE guaranty business for numerous enterprises, and actually has on hand billions of borrowed money which does not show up in its obligated column. This is another instance of the Congress having yielded the con-

rol of the purse strings to the Executive Department.

IT HAS ALREADY YIELDED up to more than one-third of its control in direct appropriations on the installment plan. In other words, of our total budget more than one-third must be appropriated to meet fixed charges such as interest on the Public Debt and numerous other items over which no one has any control as to whether it shall be paid or not. The Congress should however, control the borrowing authority of the Federal Treasury to underwrite and guarantee all the programs now in vogue.

A PART OF THIS SPENDING AUTHORITY and underwriting even applies to foreign governments. To a large degree, the President has been given a "blank check" to spend as he sees fit to meet emergencies around the world.

IT REMINDS US that in spite of all the world spending, we are in desperate trouble in many places. If our "foreign aid" has accomplished its purpose, it is a good question to ask why are

we in this tragic situation in the Middle East.

THE TRUTH IS we have been caught in a web of blackmail. Countries never heard of a few years ago now emerge with demands that, unless they receive our dollars, they will go over to the Soviets on promises. Several countries which have given the right for United States defense bases within their territory are now threatening to expel us unless more "aid" is given them.

THE SENTIMENT GROWS HERE IN WASHINGTON that the U. S. is supporting a considerable number of international "moochers" who are playing both sides of the street in their dealing with Russia and America.

THERE ARE TWO PRINCIPAL WAYS to break this policy. The first cure for this situation is to challenge these threats with the exercise of greater prudence in handouts which have not proved their worth.

THE SECOND IS TO DEVELOP as rapidly as possible an operational international missile or space-wagon, which can defend this Country from its own shores.

UNTIL THESE TWO THINGS

ARE DONE, there is little chance that our tremendous defense expenditures (which are almost two-thirds of all expenditures) are likely to be reduced.

THE TIME for the development of such weapons may be only two to four years away.

WHEN the U. S. has such weapons, the need for foreign bases will not be necessary. These billions in handouts certainly can be reduced, if not entirely stopped. Our own defense appropriations can be reduced. Until this happens, the bill will continue to be high.

THIS IS NOT AN attitude of isolationism. The fact is, we have little choice but to engage in world cooperation. This world has gotten too small to live otherwise. We can not, however, continue to be subjected to the blackmail pressure from every corner of the earth.

Editor's Note: This is the twelfth in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security Office.

I once had a man tell me that he believed the whole Social Security program would collapse simply because we would get to the point that we could not keep the records straight. The gentleman had a point but actually he need not have been concerned. Your Social Security record along with about 123 million other Social Security records are kept with the most modern of business machines.

This matter of keeping the Social Security records has been called the largest and most complicated bookkeeping operation in the world. At the end of each calendar quarter about 4 million employers report on some

60 million employees and once a year some 8 million self-employed people report their Social Security. In 1957 our accounting office in Baltimore posted about 268 million earnings items to individual Social Security accounts. These records, of course, must be maintained for each account number holder throughout his working life.

Now it is your Social Security number that keeps your individual account separate from the other 123 million. If you are interested in names, there are about 1.4 million Smiths with Social Security numbers - and about 162,000 of them have the first name of John. There are about 1.2 million Johnsons, 950,000 Browns and then comes the Jones - about 800,000.

But no matter what your name - even if it is John Smith - your Social Security number is as unique as your fingerprint. No one else has the same number that you do. So you want to be sure that all Social Security Records of your earnings have your correct number. Show your employer your Social Security card and let him copy your number from the card. Don't try to commit your number to memory.

You may check your own Social Security account as often as once a year. Write the Social

Soil Conservation District News

GRAIN STUBBLE — How should it be handled? Grain stubble can be used to insure more moisture penetration into the soil. It can be used as a blanket to hold down evaporation of soil moisture and to hold soil temperature down.

Stubble mulching or crop residue utilization reduces wind and water erosion, conserves moisture and will reduce surface crusting. Crop residue utilization will also improve the physical condition of the soil, add organic matter and serves to cushion extreme soil temperatures.

This is a good year to practice crop residue management due to moisture conditions earlier in the season and the growth made by small grain.

Summer weeds can be controlled by using sweeps, preferably large 30 inch sweeps. Where there is extra heavy stubble, a rolling coultter may be used ahead of the sweep to cut thru the straw.

The types of equipment that should be used for crop residue management are chisel plows, sweep cultivators, shredders or flat sweeps. All types of equipment should be used so that stubble is left on or near the surface.

The Agricultural Conservation Program of Callahan County is assisting in the cost of stubble mulching for 1958. This practice

for small grain must be completed by September 1 of this year and on grain sorghum stubble within thirty days after harvest. For other details concerning the practice of stubble mulching see your County ASC Office.

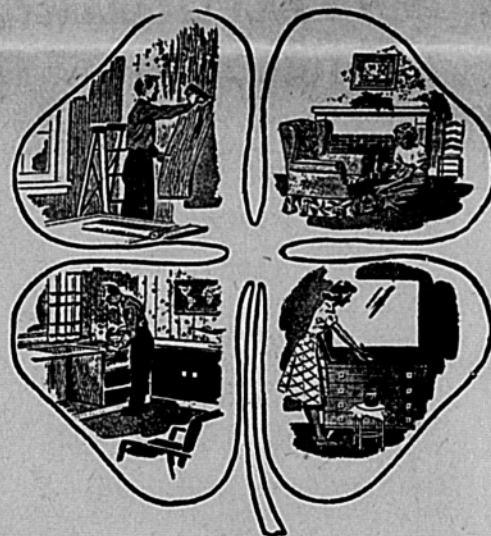

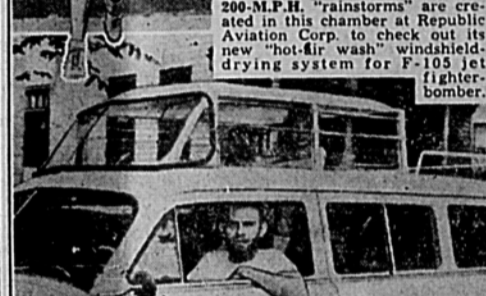

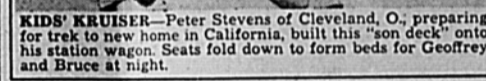

Mrs. Mullican, Former Resident Observes 93rd Birthday July 12

Saturday, July 12, was the birthday of Caroline (Mrs. E. B.) Mullican. There are probably many others in Kermit and Wink who had birthdays on that date, but it isn't probable any could claim the same honor Mrs. Mullican did. She was 93 years old.

If you should have the privilege of meeting this tiny, active, dainty little lady with the silver-white hair, don't shout at her. She can hear, and see, as well or better than any of us.

Mrs. Mullican is now living with one of her three daughters, Mrs. Mike Fitzgerald, of Wink, who retired more than a year ago after 30 years with the post office department.

In keeping with her firm belief that an idle brain is the devil's workshop, through the years Mrs. Mullican's nimble fingers have pieced and quilted beautiful quilts by the unknown hundreds. During the past year she has pieced 13 complete quilts without the aid of eye glasses, which she says she just never could wear. The only reason she

hasn't quilted them is because the quilting frames would take up so much room in the house. She reads as she pleases and writes her own letters.

Most unusual quilt is one which is now 85 years old and is in perfect condition. Top is pieced of calico and scraps of material used when Mrs. Mullican was eight years old. The quilt lining is made from cotton grown on her family's place in Tennessee, then the cotton was carded, yarn spun on the spinning wheel, and the material woven at home. Her chore was to piece together the pattern pieces, and, when her mother finally decided there were enough for one top, the little girl was allowed to put them together. Result was one full top and about half enough for another. Then, came the added job of making enough to complete another top so her brother could have one.

Her favorite is the Flower Garden, an exceptionally attractive work of art. Focal color is a soft solid green, put together with carefully chosen colors. There are no less than 10,000 pieces in this quilt, each about the size of a dime when put together.

One of the most beautiful is a coverlet of velvet scraps, pieced in squares and feather-stitched where the pieces of velvet are joined. The finish is a two-inch gold fringe border.

Mrs. Mullican has no idea how many quilts she has made, but she is positive she has made,

quilted and given away at least 60 quilts in the Lone Star pattern. How many others of how many different designs which have gone in the same way, she has no idea.

Her handiwork has gone to families which were victims of fire or disaster and to friends and relatives.

Mrs. Mullican and her husband, who died something over two years ago, lived in Baird for almost 50 years. During the last three years of his lifetime, he was ill and she took care of him and handled household chores.

A cherished item in the Fitzgerald home is a bedstead now more than 170 years old. It was carved by hand by Mrs. Mullican's grandfather. Of cherry wood, its sturdy posters stand about as high as a man's head, and was made before bedsprings came along, when cord was used to hold the shuck mattress.

For more than 30 years, Mrs. Mullican has been a member of the Baird Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. She also is an active member of the Presbyterian Church. She has eight grandchildren and sixteen great grandchildren.

Her love of creating beauty has made the life of Mrs. Mullican one of contentment and pleasure, bringing the added satisfaction of sharing liberally with those she loves. In many

homes, her busy hands will leave behind articles to be cherished for years to come.

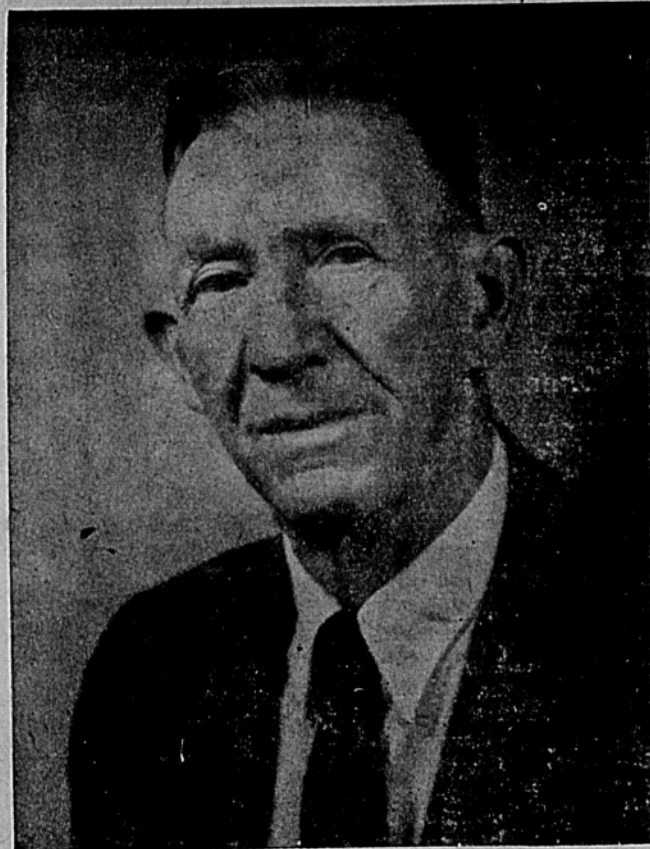
